Moore Glad To Fight Durelle

NEW YORK (AP) — Charlie Johnston, manager of light heavyweight champion Archie Moore, said the veteran would be glad to meet Yvon Durelle or the title "if the money is right."

Johnston said he has been contacted after Durelle's victory over Willie Besmanoff at Detroit Wednesday night, by promoters from Montreal, Louisville and Miami. He also said he expected to sit down in a few days with officials of the International Boxing Club.

Moore was guaranteed \$90,000 for his defence against Tony Anthony last week at Los Angeles.

Johnston is asking \$100,000 for the Durelle fight.

At Detroit, Durelle was challenged to a 10-round bout with light heavyweight Chuck Spieser in a match to be held before Durelle would meet Moore.

Joe Spieser, brother and manager of the Detroit boxer, said a Spieser-Durelle fight in Detroit would draw \$50,000.

"Right now a Moore-Durelle fight wouldn't draw anything and Archie knows it," Spieser said.

"If Durelle wants Moore, then he'll take this fight with Chuck," Spieser continued.

Chuck Spieser has been idle since he was knocked out by Anthony in Detroit last spring.

Hopes Farm Will Provide Talent

ST. LOUIS (AP) — General Manager Frank Lane of St. Louis Cardinals — one of baseball's foremost traders — apparently plans to slow down a bit.

Lane said Thursday he hopes the Redbird farm system would provide talent for the club's outfield in 1958.

Tight relief pitching by Lou Sleater and Duke Maas preserved the victory for starter Paul Foytack, who was knocked out in the seventh inning after allowing only two hits to that point. The Tigers made six of their nine hits in the first two innings off loser Bill Fischer.

"The terms for 1958 are very satisfactory," Lopez said.

Yankees Saving Mick For Series

NEW YORK (AP) — Mickey Mantle and Bill Skowron remained behind when New York Yankees left Thursday for their last road trip of the season—a three-day visit to Boston.

Manager Casey Stengel said he wanted to give both men a chance to rest at home for the world series that opens Wednesday against Milwaukee Braves.

Mantle still is badly handicapped when he has to hit lefthanded against a righthanded pitcher. The switcher isn't bother when he bats righthanded, so presumably he will be ready to swing freely Wednesday if Warren Spahn, a southpaw, starts for Milwaukee, as expected. Mickey's left leg shin splints that sent him to hospital for a period still bothers him.

Although Mantle is expected to be ready to play in the series, hobbled or not, there is no certainty about Skowron. He injured his back several weeks ago and tried to play too soon. As a result of the re-injury, Skowron has been unable to bend freely.

Mantle and Skowron are the only two Yankee s who are not fit and ready.

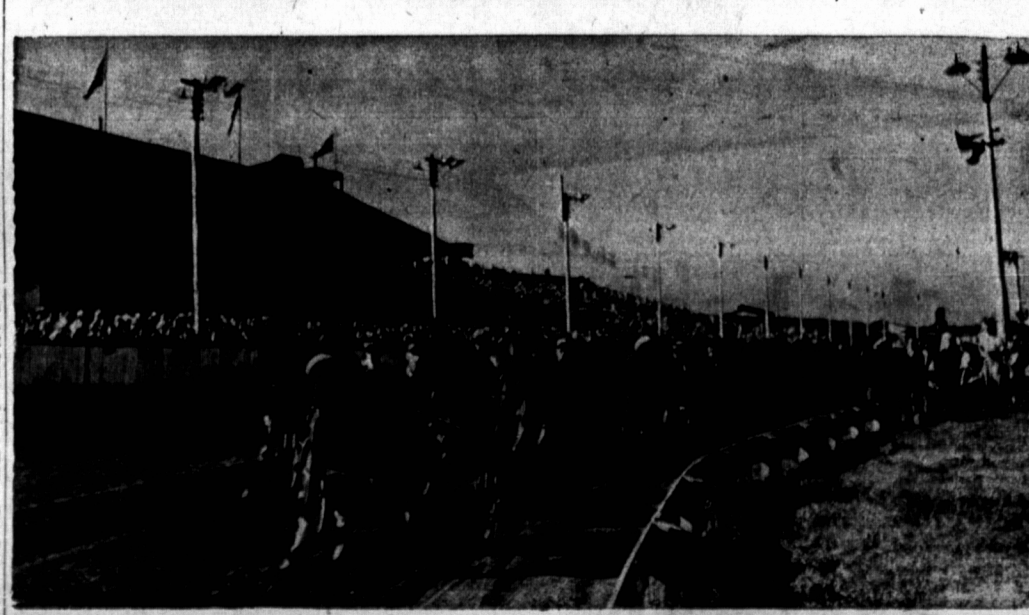
