

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.

A Dublin special says before Parnell left here for Galway on Saturday a long conference was held by the chiefs of the Land League to decide what action will be taken in view of the determination of the Government to prosecute the League. It was decided to adopt measures to secure a complete organization of tenant farmers over Ireland, so that a general strike against the payment of rent might be put in force next year; also to appoint a general organizer for all Ireland, assisted by six district organizers whose duty it will be to establish a branch of the League in every parish so that the organization may act automatically in case of the prolonged imprisonment of the Leaguers. This plan will be put in operation immediately. Parnell telegraphed to Davitt, urging him to remain in America to organize aid.

At the Irish Land League meeting yesterday in this city, speeches were made by Michael Davitt, John Boyle O'Reilly, of Boston, and others in favor of the Land League.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.

A London special says the post office at Manchester is in flames and will be destroyed. All telegraph communication with London is now (12 15 a. m.) suspended. Great alarm is felt in London, as there are plain indications that the fire was set by incendiaries, and it is believed by many persons that this indicates an intention to organize disturbances in England in aid of the Land League in Ireland. Two regiments of Infantry at Devonport, which have been under orders for Ireland, have been ordered by telegraph to the suburbs of Manchester.

LONDON, Oct. 25.

A fire occurred at the central telegraph office at Manchester on Sunday, and two hundred wires converging there were melted and the whole system of telegraph wire terminating in Manchester was destroyed. Communication with Manchester by telegraph cannot be completely restored for some days.

VIENNA, Oct. 25.

Negotiations have been resumed at Mirbazar, on Montenegrin territory, which is more conveniently situated for communication with Scutari than Rjeka. The Porte submitted three other stipulations, referring to military measures, in place of two that have been withdrawn. Riza Pasha proposes a Montenegrin advance on Dulcigno by a circuitous route, instead of passing before Mazura Heights, in order to avoid collision with the Albanians encamped there.

FERRIS, Oct. 25.

The Czar's yacht Livadia is here with leakage caused by her bow striking floating wreckage.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.

Thirty roughs simultaneously cut the guy ropes of a Mammoth Republican Tent, in Brooklyn, and cut the canvas in many many places, yesterday morning. Two watchmen were buried under the canvas and nearly smothered to death. Reports of a fraudulent registration in this city are widely prevalent.

UTICA, Oct. 25.

Republican meeting of sixty thousand people was held last night. Grant presided and made a speech in advocacy of success of Republican party.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.

Congressman S. B. Chittenden, of Brooklyn, has offered a reward of \$5,000 for evidence furnished at any time during the months of October or November leading to the arrest and conviction of the man who forged the hand writing and signature of General Garfield in so-called "Chinese Letter."

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.

To-morrow, the Republican National Committee will publish fac simile of a letter over Garfield's signature, in which Garfield absolutely denies any knowledge of a letter upon Chinese question, which it is alleged he wrote to H. L. Morey, of Lynn, Mass.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 25.

The afternoon Picayune says the fight between State and United States officials upon registration question is assuming very grave proportions and a severe conflict may be expected at any moment. Arrests have already been made of parties registering within ten days prior to election as specified in the law for revision of lists. To-day Charles Cavanaugh, Supervisor of Elections informed Col Ray, Chief Supervisor, that he would resist further arrest with all power of State. The deputy U. S. marshals have received instructions to caution every person attempting to register not to do so under pain of arrest, when, if warning is unheeded, arrest will be made. Registration is going on briskly at registration office, even negroes taking advantage of the few days yet remaining.

The Canada and Newfoundland Sealing Co., whose stock is held principally in Montreal and Quebec, is going to liquidate. The Company's two steamers, the "Ice-land" and "Greenland," were put up at auction last week in Montreal, with a reserve price of \$40,000, but found no bidders.—Monetary Times.

It is announced that Pere Hyacinthe is to give up his chapel in the Rue Rochecouart and that certain American capitalists are about to build a new chapel for him.

Germany has 3,778, periodical publications, England 2,509, and France 2,000; while in America there are 9,129.

A GRIT JOURNALIST PROVIDED FOR.—Mr. George E. Lumsden, late editor of the Hamilton Times, has been appointed Deputy to the Provincial Secretary of Ontario.

THE schr. "Joseph," Capt. Delory, arrived in Souris on Sunday morning. The Captain reports that when seventy miles S. S. E. of Sctarie, on Saturday, he saw the boat and poop of a ship, and a short distance further he saw the hull of a vessel—apparently 900 tons.

THE COURTS.—The session of Supreme Court has been adjourned until Thursday, the 14th of November. The County Court is now in session with about two hundred cases on the docket.

A METEOR of unusual brilliancy was seen from this city shooting from north to south, at 8 o'clock on Tuesday evening. It was visible for four or five seconds, and cast a bright light over the town similar to that from a large rocket.

ELEVEN MEN, were poisoned at Lake Henry St. Martins, N. B., on Saturday last, by eating pork. The poisoning was not fatal but very serious. The pork was imported from the United States, and is said by Doctors, to be in some way diseased.

THE REASON.—Mr. B. Mr. McLeod further states that he expects to trot a race with the Moncton mare as soon as Lady Bagnall recovers from her sickness.—Moncton Times

DRIFT. "Canadian" cleared to-day for Hamilton, Bermuda, with the following cargo, shipped by Wright & Macgown:—1138 barrels potatoes, 800 lbs oatmeal, 486 sacks oats, 72 hams, 12 tons hay, 8 cords wood, 62 tons coal, 8 cows, 154 sheep, 250 geese, 28 half barrels mackerel, 2 barrels eggs—valued at \$3,000. James E. McDonald, Esq., owner of the vessel, accompanied the cargo and is interested with shippers.

HEAVY LOSS.—The steamships Ayton, for Bristol, and Hurworth, for London, which left Montreal on September 29th, encountered some tremendously rough weather and heavy seas while crossing the Atlantic, resulting in heavy losses of live stock. The Ayton had on board 143 cattle and 136 sheep for Alderman McShane, and the Hurworth 99 cattle and 202 sheep for the same shipper. The latter vessel has lost its entire cargo of cattle, and the former about two-thirds of her shipment.

The firm of H. Corby & Son have withdrawn their business from St. John, N. B., for reasons in which the public have no interest. The business of the firm has for the past two and a half years been transacted by the senior member—Mr. James Corby—who has, during that period, kept up a most honorable business and social intercourse with his many customers on Prince Edward Island, and has thus succeeded in gaining the confidence of every firm with which he had any transactions. We understand that Mr. Corby will, at no distant date, return to the Province to prosecute a business on his own account. If so, there is no doubt that his, hitherto, numerous customers will renew—even more fully, the patronage which they heretofore so liberally extended to the firm.
