Grand River Man loses Life In Highway Accident

While the body of Aeneas McIntyre, 41, of Grand River, lay under water in the wrecked auto, his truck, his 16-year-old son, Edwin, was rescued just after dark last evening from the overturned vehicle.

The accident occurred at 5:30 p.m. while Mr. McIntyre, accompanied by his son, was en route to Tyne Valley with a load of lumber.

Just after passing the oil truck the left wheels of the driver's car, Mr. McIntyre apparently lost control of the vehicle and the car rolled over the road which was somewhat elevated.

At a point where the bridge spans the channel of the Grand River, this bridge is narrow abruptly by

approximately 18 inches on each side of the bridge, and it appeared that this variation in the width of the road contributed to the accident, for it was at this point where the truck apparently was in collision with the railing at the end of the bridge.

Having witnessed the accident, Mr. Yeo stopped his truck immediately and taking a flashlight ran to the scene where he found and rescued 16-year-old Edwin McIntyre who apparently had been thrown into the water.
