Blackwell Goes On Yank Retirement List

PHILADELPHIA, (AP)—Ewell Blackwell's attempted baseball comeback ended in failure Monday as New York Yankees' towering righthander went into voluntary retirement.

Blackwell, whose sizzling offerings earned him a variety of nicknames, including "The Buggy Whip" left the slumping Yanks to pick up his wife in New York and head for Tampa, Fla., and at least temporary exile from the major league world.

The Yanks didn't have much to say at the 30-year-old pitcher's departure they had enough troubles of their own. Besides, what does another baseball player say in a situation like that?

Even the normally loquacious Casey Stengel was terse.

"Blackwell just decided it hurt too much when he tried to throw hard," said the Yankee manager. "He hopes a long rest will solve his problem."

In his heyday with Cincinnati Reds, now the Redless, Ewell was the bane of National League batters. He racked up 22 victories in 1947 on a Cincinnati ball club that finished fifth with a total of 73 wins.

The lanky hurler was hampered by a sore arm all this season. He was acquired by the Yankees last August after being waived out of the National loop. The Blackwell deal sent four players—pitchers John Schmitz and Ernie Nieve and outfielders Jim Greengrass and Bob Marquis to Cincinnati along with \$35,000 in cash.

Blackwell contributed only one victory in five Yankee appearances in 1952.

Plagued with physical complaints this year, Blackwell hurled 19 2-3 innings before his retirement. He was credited with two victories and no defeats.

He said he would rest at Tampa until next spring, then try once more with the Yanks. Always a stickler for good conditioning, he showed up at St. Petersburg, Fla., last March weighing 210 pounds, more than 20 over his normal figure and said he felt better than ever.

To take Blackwell's place, the Yankees called up left-hander Art Shallock from Kansas City of the American Association, where he had a record of nine wins against three losses.

NEW YORK, (AP)—Veteran infielder Red Schoendienst of St. Louis Cardinals and George Kell of Boston Red Sox are threatening to run away with the major league batting race.

As the teams enter the second half of the 1953 season, Schoendienst holds a 23-point advantage over his nearest National League competitor, Frankie Baumholtz of the Cubs and Jackie Robinson of the Dodgers. Kell boasts a 14-point lead over Pete Suder of the A's in the American.

Schoendienst tops the National loop with a .351 average and Baumholtz and Robinson are tied for second with .328 each. Kell heads the junior circuit with a .342 mark, while Suder is runner-up at .328. Figures include Sunday's games.

Baumholtz, who finished second to Stan Musial last season, climbed into fifth as he boosted his average 13 points to .320.
