Mercurys To Play 30 Games In Europe

LONDON, Jan. 4 — (CP) — Edmonton Mercurys, Canada's hope for the Olympic hockey title, will play more than 30 games in 19 countries and will probably participate in three tournaments after their arrival from Canada, it was announced today.
The Mercurys, scheduled to arrive at Prestwick tomorrow by air from Montreal, get on their skates almost immediately. The play an exhibition game at Ayr tomorrow night, at Perth next Wednesday, at Falkirk Jan. 11 and at Paisley Jan. 12.

Then they go to London for a one-game stand before starting a continental tour which includes six or seven games in Germany, two in France, two in Belgium, two in Holland, three or four in Sweden, one in Norway, five in Switzerland and three in Italy.
These do not include tournament games. Apart from the winter Olympics at Oslo starting Feb. 14, there will be two major competitions. The first, to be held in Sweden starting Feb. 26 is a new tournament and will probably involve Canada, United States, Sweden and Czechoslovakia.

The winner will receive a trophy presented by J.F. (Bunny) Ahearn, well-known British hockey official.
Also up for competition will be the Churchill Cup, won last season by Lethbridge Maple Leafs. Dates and details have not been arranged, but this will probably involve a straight two-way struggle between Canada and a British team.

fall they were back again and among the purchases were the filly Betsy Volo, winner of the \$17,000 Coaching Club Oaks Stake at Goshen, New York, and the three-year-old trotting filly Hattie Song, winner of the \$14,000 Stallion Stake. These went to Count Orsi Mangelli, Milan, Italy. Others heading for foreign homes are the stallions Joe's Pride, 2.03 1/2, White Hanover, 2.04 1/5, and several others.
Johnny Simpson is no longer the youngest of the more than 100 horsemen who have driven a mile in two minutes or better. He was dethroned last month by Jimmy FitzPatrick, aged 20, son of the famous Harry FitzPatrick, who for several years campaigned the E. J. Baker Stable. Jimmy drove Hal Senator in 2.00 flat. Simpson had held the "Youngest Driver" title on the strength of a two-minute drive behind the pacer My Birthday in 1942. He was then 22 years old.

Just at the end of the year we had a letter from A.K. (Ollie) MacNeill, Fort Qu'Appelle, Sask., whom we are glad to notice is one of the principals in a move to establish a racing circuit in the northern part of the province. At a meeting there recently, Ollie was elected president and a strong directorate set up. Fort Qu'Appelle was named as the first town on the coming season's circuit and the season will open there May 24. The Fort Qu'Appelle track is considered by horsemen as one of the best on the circuit and quite a number of them will move there a few weeks prior to the opening. Ollie states that they had some real good racing last year and enthusiasm is growing. For some reason harness horse racing had a set-back in Western Canada and is now starting to pick up lost ground from the runners. Years ago some of the fastest pacers in the world were bred in Western Canada.
