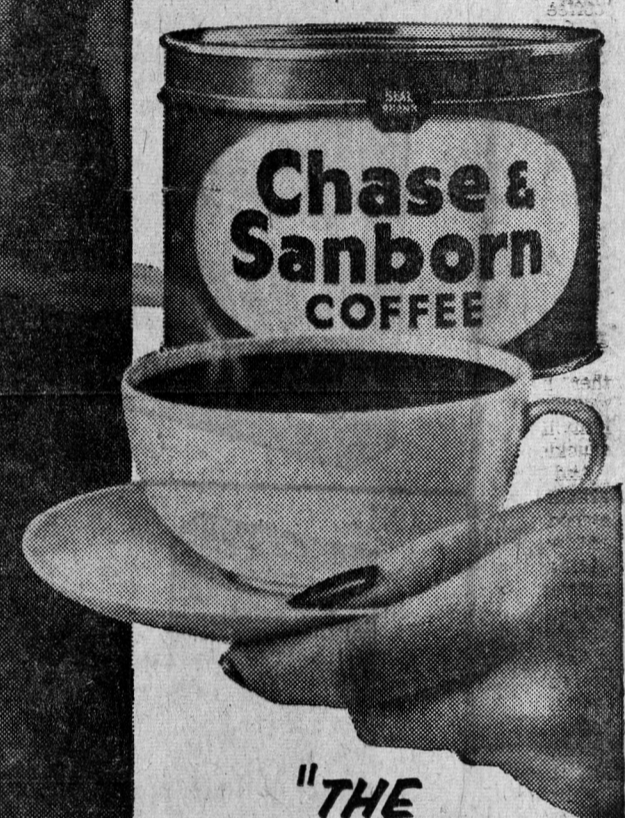
Meeting closed as usual, and lunch was served by the hostess and committee in charge.

Maryland Spoon Bread (Happy Memory Food to Hosts of Southerners): In a qt.-size baking dish, combine 1 c. fine enriched cornmeal, 2 tbsp. bacon drippings, 1 tsp. sugar and 1 tsp. salt. Gradually beat in 1 c. boiling water. Cool.

Add 2 well-beaten eggs, 1 c. buttermilk or sour milk and 1/2 tsp. baking soda dissolved in 1/2 tsp. cold water. Beat thoroughly. Bake 30 min. in a moderate oven, 325-350 degrees F.

Note: If using sweet milk add 2 tsp. double-acting baking powder instead of the baking soda.

Trick of the Chef: Add 1 (2 oz.) can sliced mushrooms and liquid to the pan drippings before making gravy.
