Public Health Department Endorses Water Fluoridation

That the application of sodium fluoride to the teeth of pre-school children who have completed all necessary dental care, as carried out in four Island centres would seem to be an excellent preventive measure as well as a means of stimulating interest in dental care, was reported to the House in the annual report of the Department of Health and Welfare tabled Thursday.

Fluoridation of municipal water supplies, states the report, is being actively supported by the Division of Public Health along with all leading medical and dental associations in this country. The construction of two plants, at Alberton and Souris, marks the culmination of a long intensive promotional and educational program aimed at creating sufficient demand for pasteurized milk so that the sale of pasteurized milk in these areas would be feasible.

Crapaud Annual Creamery Meet

The annual meeting of the Crapaud Creamery Co. was held in Crapaud Hall Tuesday, Feb. 21st, 1956. The attendance was above the average, and a keen interest was evident. The president, Mr. E.C. Holm, presided and opened the meeting with a general review of the year's operations. He was pleased to say that the Company was moving steadily forward. During 1955 the largest amount of butter was manufactured in any year to date. A new stainless steel churn was installed, the only one of this modern type on the Island, also a new fifty horsepower boiler. He felt the plant was in an excellent position to look after a large volume of cream. He was glad to know that this Creamery had the lowest mould and yeast count in the Province, and felt the new churn had some bearing on this pleasing situation. He thanked the directors for their interest and co-operation during the past year.

Leader Of Revolt In Peru Said Now Surrendered

LIMA, Peru (AP)—The government announced Saturday that Brig. Marcial Merino, who led a jungle revolt centred at Iquitos in remote northeastern Peru, surrendered Friday night. The communique gave a terse account of the break in the rebellion which started nine days ago. Merino rebelled Feb. 16 and was joined by units of the 2nd Division next day. The rebels seized Iquitos a port city of about 35,000 on the upper Amazon river, 1,200 miles northeast of Lima. The government countered by clamping a naval blockade on the city, threatening the rebels with starvation and bottling up the revolt. The first shots in the conflict were fired Wednesday. The rebels shot at government planes flying reconnaissance over Iquitos, but none was hit.

Italian President On Way To Visit Canada And U.S.

ROME (AP) — President Giovanni Gronchi and Foreign Minister Gaetano Martino left by special airliner Sunday for a two-week visit to the United States and Canada. The 68-year-old president, first Italian head of state to visit the two countries said his trip "marks the return of Italy with equal rights among the community of allied nations." "Our common aim is to preserve the principles of freedom and democracy." He added that his trip "is not intended to bring immediate results." It was "just a meeting to get acquainted with the leaders of these friendly nations." After a four-day official visit to Washington, the president and his party, including his wife, will travel to Canada, arriving in Ottawa next Saturday. He will return to the United States after three days and will make a 10-day tour of Detroit, San Francisco and New York where he will meet members of large Italian communities. Martino visited the U. S. and Canada last spring with the then premier, Mario Scelba.

of Montserrat. He left Montserrat after seven years to become Vicar of St. Saviour's Church, Barbados, followed by a period as Senior Curate at St. Michael's Cathedral Barbados. His final incumbency in the West Indies was at the Old Garrison Chapel, St. Paul's Barbados, where he was Vicar. Rev. Canon Malone came to St. Peter's Cathedral in succession to the late Rev. Canon James Simpson in 1921 and continued as Rector until his retirement in 1952. In 1950, he received the degree of Doctor of Divinity from King's College, Halifax. Shortly after retiring from St. Peter's Canon Malone was appointed lecturer at King's College, Halifax and later spent one year in a similar capacity at St. Chad's College in Regina. On his return to Charlottetown, Canon and Mrs. Malone took up residence at 11 Rochford Square where they now reside. The Canon continues his ministry as an Honorary Assistant Priest at St. Peter's Cathedral.

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Ottawa U Wins Debating Championship

LONDON, Ont. (CP)—The University of Ottawa won the national college debating championship Saturday night by defeating Ontario Agricultural College of Guelph in the finals.

It was the first time in some years a French-speaking team has won the title. The winning debaters, Jean Salois and Guy Tremblay, were awarded a trip to Europe. John Montgomery and Desmond Cunniff represented the agricultural college.

No Danger Of Sun Blowing Up

LONDON (AP) — Relax: there appears no immediate danger of the sun blowing up. Sir Harold Spencer-Jones, former astronomer-royal, gave this assurance Sunday in discussing the cosmic explosions on the sun. There were still some signs of a magnetic storm during the night after the great explosion on Thursday creating a searing fireball estimated by some scientists as the size of the earth. Asked whether the sun could blow up as a result of these solar flares, Sir Harold replied: "No, not as a result of these flares." He explained, too, that he didn't think cosmic rays influence the weather. "The difference they make is so small that it is swamped by other phenomena causing weather changes," he said.
