

The Tignish Meeting.

Agreeable to notice, a large and important meeting to consider the Exhibition question, as now agitating the minds of Western farmers, was held in St. Mary's Hall, Tignish, on Tuesday evening, Richard Dawson, Esq., presiding, and Mr. P. H. Morrissey acting in the capacity of Secretary. The prominent men of both political parties were present.

The Rev. Father Burke, whose interest in the Exhibition movement up west is well known to all, was the first speaker. He explained the origin and scope of the agitation; dwelt at length on the absolute necessity for the fair every other year at Alberton in the interests of agriculture and stock-raising; instanced Ontario and Quebec to show that what the people were asking for was long since accorded in these provinces, and terminated a powerful speech by exhorting every man, of whatever stripe of politics he might be, to throw his influence into the movement, and it would assuredly be crowned with success, and that in the near future. Father Burke also expressed his great regret that in a matter of such importance to western Prince County politics should have been, to some extent, introduced by those who were always desirous of making capital for themselves. He felt that this was a great mistake; and hoped that a movement, set on foot purely and simply to secure to farmers up west a share of the benefits arising from agricultural shows, would henceforward be looked upon as above and beyond party differences. He was glad to see the members for the district present, and would be pleased to hear them pledge their support to the work.

Mr. McLellan, M. P. P., was the next speaker. He was desirous of doing all in his power to forward the agitation, and would certainly work enthusiastically in the good cause. He regretted that he knew nothing of the project when addressing the House during the session just closed, but would embrace every opportunity in the future of pushing the claims of Alberton and western Prince County to the fair.

The Rev. Father Picotte spoke in French, favoring the object of the meeting, and exhorting all present to lay aside party for once and fight for the common good. Father Picotte was followed by Joseph Murphy, Esq., M. L. C., who pledged himself to the movement unreservedly, as did also J. A. Matheson, Esq., M. P. P., who, like Mr. McLellan, regretted that he was not in a position in the House last session to urge our claims with all the force the present movement would afford him.

Rousing speeches were also made by Edward Hackett, Esq., of Tignish, James White, Esq., of Alberton, and John McCarthy, Esq., of Brockton, and the following resolution carried enthusiastically:—Whereas, Every succeeding year establishes more clearly the fact that the Exhibition held at Summerside is not and cannot be of much benefit to the farmers of Western Prince County, distant as they are from Summerside, handicapped by heavy railway charges and deprived of their just share of government stock; and

Whereas, The Eastern part of the County has enjoyed for years the advantages of the Exhibition and the benefits of the improved stock imported by the Stock Farm Commissioners, and should therefore cheerfully grant us like privileges in turn. Be it therefore

Resolved, That this meeting register its high approval of the agitation for an Exhibition at Alberton every other year; and further

Resolved, That Western Commissioners for the Exhibition be requested to attend the meeting at Summerside on the 27th inst., and urge our claims. Father Burke called the attention of the meeting to the impending visit to the province of Prof. Saunders, of the Government Experimental Farm, and advised that he be invited to address the farmers of Western Prince County at some suitable date during his stay. A Committee of three—the Rev. Father Burke, John A. Matheson, M. P. P., and P. H. Morrissey were named to take the matter in hand. A hearty vote of thanks was then tendered Father Burke for the ability and zeal he infused into the movement, to which the rev. gentleman suitably replied, and the meeting adjourned.

Regatta Notes.

THE SINGLE SCULL RACE—DINNER AT THE OSBORNE—OFF FOR HO-LE.

The single scull match race between Carroll, of Pictou, and Joy, of Charlottetown, postponed because of the roughness of the water yesterday afternoon, came off last evening, a start being effected about 7.30. The course was up the East River, and the water was favorable. There was some little trouble about the start, Carroll wanting the course made more inshore than it was. The judges decided against a change, and started the race. Joy was a good distance ahead before Carroll got under way, rowing a smart, steady stroke. Carroll, when he did get started, put his shell through the water at a lively rate, and on the homestretch overtook and passed Joy, coming in the winner by several lengths. The race, which was started from the railway wharf, was witnessed by a number of persons, and the winner was lustily cheered.

EUROPEAN NEWS.

A Difficulty with Portugal.

LONDON, June 26.

The Portuguese Government to-day cancelled the concession granted for building a railroad to Delagoa Bay. The British Consul at Delagoa Bay has asked that a man-of-war be sent there to protect the interests of the British subjects. It is reported Germany is backing Portugal in an endeavor to counteract British influence in Africa.

Lord Salisbury, in the House of Lords last evening, stated the Government earnestly requested Portugal to refrain from taking hasty action, to give time in which to settle this considerable difficulty. He declared it would not be within Portugal's right to refuse to arbitrate in the matter.

The Parnell-Times Committee.

LONDON, June 26.

Mr. Seaton, M. P., and the Lord Mayor of Dublin appeared before the Parnell Commission to-day. Seaton would not say that he opposed the principles of the Fenian Society. He claimed that boycotting "was a necessary evil. Attorney-General Webster is credited with the intention to claim before the Commission the right to extort from the Parnellites witnesses any information not obtainable by the usual methods, and the Parnellites are determined to resist any such effort. If the Attorney-General persists they will probably leave the court with their counsel.

Terrible Railway Disaster.

PITTSBURG, Pa., June 26.

At 2.30 o'clock this morning three freight trains were wrecked on the Pennsylvania Railway about a mile east of Latrobe. Two freight trains were telescoped and caught the east-bound train just as the latter was passing. Twenty-five cars and two engines were wrecked. Fifty-four persons were killed, one fatally injured, and several others were more or less seriously injured. A train-despatcher's misunderstanding of orders is supposed to have been the cause of the disaster.

Stealing Horses.

WINNIPEG, June 26.

John T. Cable, a well-known horseman, was arrested by the mounted police last night, charged with stealing sixty horses at Regina three years ago. He will be taken to Calgary.

An Embezzler Sentenced.

Rev. Mr. Burns, the Savings Bank embezzler, pleaded guilty to day, and was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.
