Daily Mail Wanted.

THE business men of Murray Harbor are not unnaturally disappointed and annoyed because tenders have not been asked for the carrying of mails on the same old plan.

Places of much less importance have the great advantage of being able to communicate daily with the rest of the world, and the people of Murray Harbor think that they ought to have that advantage too.

They do a large amount of business now, and with the Postal Service improved as they desire, they would undoubtedly do still more to the mutual advantage of themselves and the Post Office.

Murray Harbor has been deprived of the railway facilities to which she was entitled, and now she cannot get a daily mail which would have come with the railway as a matter of course.

No fault can be found with the postal officials here, or the driver of the mails, Mr. Angus Martin, who has given the utmost satisfaction; but the case is, particularly for the Murray Harbor men of business, a hard one.

We trust that this grievance will be remedied ere another year has passed.

More "Blue Ruin."

We observe that at the recent annual meeting of the Bank of Montreal, special attention was called to the reduction of the earning power of money in Canada, as a result of its abundance.

The Fishing Bounty.

When the fisheries estimates were before the Dominion House of Commons last session, a somewhat animated discussion took place upon the matter of the distributing of the annual grant of \$150,000, or, as it is better known hereabouts, the bounty to aid in the development of the sea fisheries.

"Blank forms of claims are supplied to the fishermen through the fishery officers and collectors of customs, or other persons, at specified points, authorized to assist in the distribution of the bounty. The claims, when completed, are delivered to the above-named officers, and by them certified and transmitted to the department.

Notes and Comments.

It is now almost certain that the Quebec elections will be held in October next. The prospects of a good harvest in Russia, which is a great exporting country in cereals, are not bright this year.

An Ottawa despatch says the report that the Ayers had commenced a suit against the Government is premature. No such action has yet been commenced, although one for \$200,000 has been threatened by Ayers' solicitors.

Supreme Court.

WEDNESDAY, June 12.

Donald C. Ramsay vs. Alex. Livingstone.—This was an action on a promissory note and has been tried before, and at each trial a verdict was found for the defendant. The Court set both these verdicts aside as being against the weight of evidence.

Bentley vs. Cail and another.—This was an action on a promissory note, made over six years ago, and the question was whether a payment made by one of the defendants within the six years kept the note in date against the other. Mr. Justice Hensley held that as the note was made before the Statute of 1883, that the payment did not keep the note in date.

The bigamy case was not proceeded with as the defendant was not to be found, having made his escape from jail and since been unheard of by the authorities.

Several undefended cases were tried and verdicts rendered, and at five o'clock the Court adjourned.

Telegraphic Tips.

VIENNA, June 11.—The town of Zeberaz, in Austrian Galicia, has been almost entirely destroyed by fire. Many lives were lost.

LONDON, June 11.—A severe storm prevailed yesterday at the mouth of the Thames. Much damage was done by high tides. Traffic was almost suspended.

NEWAIGO, Mich., June 11.—The village of Croton, 30 miles from Newaigo, has been completely inundated by back water from a jam of logs in the river.

BERLIN, June 11.—The government has notified the Swiss authorities that they cannot possibly agree to the proposal they made for the settlement of the question arising from the expulsion from Switzerland of Herr Uohlgumoth, German police inspector, who is charged with bribing the Swiss to act as agent provocateur.

SEATTLE, W. T., June 11.—The town is rapidly quieting down, though vigorous measures have been taken to maintain order. Families are living in tents. It is not believed that more than five persons perished, and the suffering has been alleviated by the arrival of bounteous supplies.
