

Kromm Replies to Criticism Of Smokies

TRAIL, B.C. (CP) — Bobby Kromm has issued a blistering rebuttal to criticism of himself and the Trail Smokies after he received a losing cause at the world hockey championships in Sweden last month. He said Canadian amateur teams can win the title if they get proper backing.

Replying the recent criticism by Ivan Temple of Victoria, president of the British Columbia Amateur Hockey Association, Kromm in turn criticized what he termed Temple's inaction in Sweden in the face of press criticism, bad food and bad refereeing.

As for Temple's recent suggestion that a top National

Hockey League team should represent Canada with backing of perhaps some \$75,000, Kromm said in a letter to the Trail Times:

"I don't think we need to turn it over to the NHL. We can win with Canada's amateurs if we can get the proper backing, which we didn't have this year or any other year."

"What would it prove to have the Montreal Canadiens steamroller over the Europeans? Now four or five countries are really competitive and it is a worthwhile tournament that means something. After all, the professionals have their own tournament."

Info Received Was Unethical

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)—State Attorney-General Eugene Cook reported to Governor Carl E. Sanders Tuesday that Wallace Butts gave advance information to Paul Bryant on last September's Georgia-Alabama football game which was "unethical, improper, and unsportsmanlike."

The furnishing of such information might well have vitally affected the outcome of the game in points and the margin of victory," Cook said in a summation of his findings after a two-week investigation.

Anders ordered the investigation after the Saturday Evening Post charged in its March 23 issue that there was collusion to affect the outcome of the game between Butts, recently resigned as Georgia athletic director, and Bryant, the University of Alabama coach.

Alabama won the game 35-0.

Boxing Comm. Plans Changes

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York State Athletic Commission, reacting to a report of a legislative committee on boxing, announced Tuesday it will adopt two-minute rounds in preliminary bouts as an experiment.

Gen. Edwin L. Kravitch, commission chairman, also said that in future championship bouts in New York's eight ounce gloves will be used in rounds of six-ouncers and the mandatory eight ounce and three knockdown rules will be in effect.

Four rings ropes will be used in the state instead of three, he said.

The state legislative committee reported Monday after several months of studying into boxing. The committee was formed in the death of Benny Paret, who died from injuries received after a defense of his welterweight title in Madison Square Garden on April 23, 1962.

Last week featherweight champion Davey Moore was following a ring beating in Los Angeles in another title bout.

The legislative committee recommended that boxing be continued in New York, but suggested a number of changes, most of them designed to safeguard fighters.

Tigers Buy Coot Veal

LAKELAND, Fla. (AP)—Detroit Tigers Tuesday purchased shortstop Coot Veal from the Syracuse farm club in the international League.

The 30-year-old infielder had two previous trials with the Tigers and also played for Washington and Pittsburgh.

The Tigers also optioned third-baseman Don Wert to Syracuse and returned infielder Reno Bertoia to their international League farm club.

Ottawa Player Closes Career

OTTAWA (CP) — Gilles Archambault, 265-pound Canadian tackle with Ottawa Rough Riders of the Eastern Football Conference for the last seven seasons, announced his retirement from football Tuesday.

He received a serious knee injury in the last season.

Archambault said another knee operation would be necessary before he could play in even one game.

Even then, there would be no guarantee the knee would stand up "and so I have decided to call it quits."

Minoso Sold To Senators

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. Minnie Minoso, veteran Cuban outfielder, was sold by St. Louis to the Washington Senators for an estimated \$25,000, it was announced Tuesday.

Minoso, 40 years old last November, has been a big league stand-out almost from the day he joined Cleveland Indians in 1951.

Traded to Chicago White Sox early that season, he quickly developed into one of the American League's outstanding stars until traded to the Cardinals for first baseman Joe Cunningham in November of 1961.

Expected to be the regular right fielder for the Cards, Minoso suffered a skull fracture and broken right wrist in a collision with the left field wall at Busch Stadium early in the season. He appeared in only 39 games and batted .196.

Minoso, whose full name is Saturnino Orestes Minoso, owns a lifetime batting average of .293, with 18 home runs. He batted over 300 in seven of his 12 full seasons in the majors. His highest batting average was .326 in 1951, when he was named American League rookie of the year.

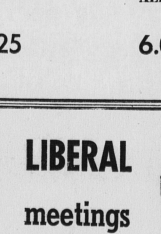
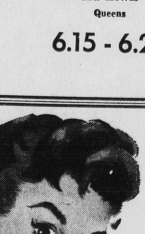
