

MONAGHAN FARMING CLUB.

At a meeting of the farmers of Monaghan, Fort Augustus, and Tarentum, at the house of Mr. P. Collins, on Wednesday, the 3d day of June, 1840.—Mr. John Lane in the chair, for the purpose of forming an Agricultural Association,—it was resolved that a Society be formed in the section of the country, to be called the *Monaghan Farming Society*, and be guided by the following Rules and Regulations, viz:

1st. That the object of this Society shall be to advance the general interest of Agriculture, by the introduction of new seeds, improved implements of husbandry, the improvement of stock, and embracing such other measures of rural economy as may be deemed necessary.

2d. That the affairs of the Society shall be regulated by a President, two Vice Presidents, Secretary and Treasurer, and a Committee of seven members, four to be a quorum, who shall manage and transact all the business of the society, under the direction and controul of the general meeting, at which meetings the office bearers are to be annually elected, and that only four of the members of Committee go out of office annually.

3d. That the Committee shall make a minute and full report of the year's proceedings, and lay the same before the general meeting annually.

4th. That the Secretary shall assemble a meeting of the Committee as often as the affairs of the Society shall require; and that on the desire of any two members of the Committee, who shall appoint the time and place, the Secretary is to summon a meeting.

5th. That the Secretary shall be considered an executive officer, and shall always have a vote in Committee, but to be under the controul of the majority; the casting vote of the President or Chairman to decide in cases of equality.

6th. That the Secretary and Treasurer be the person entrusted with the account books, and property of the Society; and that he shall receive all written communications on the subject of agriculture, and correspond with the Central Society, and other societies and institutions of a similar nature, on all subjects connected with the interests of the Society.

7th. That the Secretary keep a regular Cash Book of all moneys received and paid by the Society; and also a Minute Book, in which he shall note all their transactions—such books to be patent to all members of the Committee.

8th. That the General Meeting be held on the First Wednesday in January, yearly, when the Secretary and Treasurer's accounts be audited, and the report of the Committee received.

9th. That each member pay Five Shillings on his admission, and continue to pay the same annually, each payment to be made on the day of the general meeting.

10th. That the foregoing Rules be recorded in the Minute Book of the Society, and that the general meetings have power to add to or amend their rules as circumstances may require.

The following persons were appointed office-bearers for the current year:—The Hon. Donald Macdonald, President; Messrs. Patrick Hughes and Edward Keilly, Vice Presidents; Francis Kelly, Secretary and Treasurer. Committee—John King, John Quinn, James McCarron, James Kelly, Patrick McKowan, Peter Duffy, Owen Simpson.

Ordered, That the above be printed once in each of the Island Newspapers, and a copy of the Constitution be transmitted to the Central Society in Charlottetown.

In pursuance of the Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the Seventh Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intitled *An Act for levying an Assessment on all Lands in this Island*—I do hereby publicly notify the Owners or Occupiers of Land within this Island, for which the annual Assessment, charged thereon by the said recited Act, of Four Shillings, lawful money of this Island, for every Hundred Acres of wilderness or unimproved Lands contained in the several Townships, and the several Islands belonging thereto; and the sum of Two Shillings for every Hundred Acres of cultivated or improved Land in the said several Townships and Islands as aforesaid; and the sum of Four Shillings for each and every uncultivated or unimproved Town Lot, Pasture Lot, Common Lot and Water Lot, granted in the Town and Royalty of Charlottetown; and the sum of Two Shillings for each and every cultivated or improved Town, Pasture, Common, and Water Lot as aforesaid; and the sum of Two shillings and eight-pence for each and every Town Lot, Pasture Lot, and Water Lot, granted in the Towns and Royalties of Georgetown and Princetown; and the sum of One shilling and four-pence for each and every cultivated or improved Town, Pasture, and Water Lot, granted in the said last-mentioned Towns and Royalties, and so in proportion for a less quantity; and the sum of One penny per acre on each and every acre of cultivated or improved Land in the Royalty of Georgetown, called reserved Lands; and the sum of Two-pence per acre on each and every acre of such Lands as may be deemed uncultivated or unimproved Lands, is payable, that unless the Assessment for the current year be paid into my hands, or the hands of my Deputies, on or before the Twenty-second of December, 1840, I shall, on the last day of the next Hilary Term, at Charlottetown, make Proclamation of all such Lands as shall then be in arrear for non-payment of the sums charged thereon, agreeably to the directions of the said Act.
