THE WINNIPEG ROBBERY.

No Trace Has Yet Been Discovered of the Missing Money.

WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 11.—Mr Durnford, of Montreal, chief inspector of the Molsons Bank, is making a searching investigation into the robbery here. It appears that of the stolen money only about twenty two thousand dollars can be negotiated with safety. Fifteen thousand dollars is in notes of large denominations that are seldom circulated in general business transactions, such as \$500 and \$1,000 bills. The smaller denominations are five's and ten's of the Dominion Government issue. Twenty five thousand dollars of the money is in legal, which are only used in making settlements between banks, and are of no use for other purposes. It is learned that the box which contained the stolen money was taken by the thieves, who evidently had no desire to waste time in transferring the booty to some other receptacle.

WAR STORES FOR THE EAST.

Three Hundred Tons of Ammunition Sent to Hong Kong.

LONDON, Oct. 11.—The Marquis of Salisbury has returned to his duties at the Foreign Office in an unusually dogged mood, a complete antithesis of his ordinary gentle treatment of the officials. He was extremely disgruntled at the way official matters concerning China and Fashoda had been coming out.

The British Premier seems to realize that trouble is brewing in the East, as large quantities of war stores are going to Hong Kong. About 300 tons of ammunition were embarked for that port today, while the first class cruiser Terrible has been ordered to join her sister ship, the Powerful, on the China station so soon as small repairs are completed. These cruisers are the largest in the world, and form a formidable addition to Great Britain's fleet in China seas.

The proposed sale resulted in a sensation.

Friends of M. Zola ran the bidding up on the first article—a walnut table—to 32,000 francs, thus producing the amount required and stopping the sale.

GREAT BRITAIN AND UNITED STATES.

Sir Edward Clarke's Opinion About an Alliance League.

LONDON, Oct. 9.—Sir Edward Clarke, the former Solicitor General, in a letter which he has written declining an invitation to support the Plymouth branch of the Anglo-American League says:—

"With all respect to the distinguished members of the general committee, I think that such an organization is unnecessary and not unlikely to be mischievous. The busy activity of a society representing one particular view of foreign affairs is very seldom of public benefit. I have always laboured to promote the most friendly relations between Great Britain and the United States, but we can all do much to secure peace between the two countries and friendly rivalry by promoting the civilization of the world, without binding ourselves to a society for whose action we should be responsible, although we could not control it.

"Great Britain and the United States have no doubt many ties of sympathy, but they are two nations and not one. They must often have divergent interests, and I prefer to be unshackled by membership in a society which binds itself to constant cooperation with the United States Government. Many have probably joined simply desiring to promote a better understanding and thereby diminish the probability of a conflict. But if this is the object I think that Anglo-German, Anglo-French and Anglo-Russian leagues are much more needed.

"Friendly relations between ourselves and the European nations are quite as important as with the United States, and with them we have not the sentiment of kinship which, in the case of the United States, goes far to allay suspicion, soothes jealousies, and prevents the peace of the world from being imperilled by any controversies over a trifling question."

IMPERIALIST PARTY.

Abdication of the Leadership by Prince Victor Napoleon.

PARIS, Oct. 11.—The Journal attributes the abdication of the leadership of the Imperialist party by Prince Victor Napoleon in favor of his brother, Prince Louis, who is in favor of the Russian court, as being due to the hostility of the ex-Empress Eugenie and influential Bonapartists. The paper adds that the fortunes of the ex-Empress and of Princess Mathilde will be left to Prince Louis, who is colonel of the Czarina's Lancers, in the Russian army.

—A decrease in the birth rate is troubling English as well as Canadian ecclesiastics. It was brought up at the recent Church Congress in England by the Dean of Ripon, who said that "if this state of things went on it was a case in which the nation must go down. It would be a case of national suicide, which was all the more terrible to them as Christians because it meant the forsaking of the natural law of God. For the sake of what? For the sake of a wretched calculation and childless homes were luxury and ease should dwell."

SPARROWS IN GERMANY.

Measures Now Being Adopted to Eradicate the Pest.

BERLIN, Oct. 11.—In many parts of Germany the authorities are warning the people against sparrows. A decree has been issued at Emden, Hanover, requiring landowners each year between October 1st and December 1st to deliver to the local officials a certain number of sparrows or sparrows' heads. The owner of 25 hectares of land must produce 12 sparrows for sparrows' heads or pay a fine of six marks.

EXCLUSIVENESS OR THOUGHTLESSNESS.

SIR.—Considerable prominence is just now given to the work of the Teachers Association, and while some things are well done there are others which, in my opinion at least, are not well done. One of the latter, on account of its evident unfairness and seeming exclusiveness, deserves some notice. Now the election of officers seems to be controlled by a few individuals who intimate to others those whom they wish to be elected, and by their persistent advocacy secure a sufficiently large following to elect them.

MR LAIRD'S RESIGNATION.

Sir,—In reply to my letter you have referred to certain sections of the Sewerage Act as an authority for Mr Laird's right to resign.

I deny that these sections (or indeed any other section in the act) confers any right on any commissioner to resign.

The 22nd sec, printed by you, by express enactment, legislates the three present commissioners into office until February, 1901. Being so elected or legislated commissioners, they cannot by their own act relieve themselves from the duties imposed on them, and it will require express authority to enable them to resign. No such authority is given in the act.

You may answer that the 28th and 29th sections, also printed by you, do confer the right to resign. If so will you state the procedure to be followed by the commissioner desiring to resign? How is he going to do so? Will he stick his resignation on the town pump, or to whom will he deliver it? Perhaps you will also slip out of these questions by referring the "conundrum" as you are pleased to designate the question in my last letter, "to the gentlemen who drew the act and had it passed."

If I mistake not, THE EXAMINER was one of the papers which strongly, and it appears, successfully advocated the retention in office of the present Commissioners until the sewerage works were completed. How do you justify one of them attempting to get out of his job?

We advocated retention of the present commissioners only until the end of the terms for which they had respectively been elected, and urged reconsideration of the section providing that they be continued in office until the sewerage construction was completed.
