Further Decrease Shown In U.S. Potato Figures

The Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board was advised yesterday that the early August potato production forecast in the United States is approximately 81,000,000 bushels, a decline of about 5,000,000 bushels compared to the July production estimate. This would represent a decrease in United States production this year of almost 90,000,000 bushels compared to 1950.

MacDonald, Board chairman, "is certainly in the right direction as far as our market prospects this year are concerned. A further decline in actual production of about 10,000,000 bushels would mean that the United States this year would have barely enough potatoes for their own minimum requirements, and would naturally mean that any surplus Canada might have would be in keen demand."

Ottawa Announces Crackdown On Illegal Lobster Fishing

OTTAWA, August 10—(Special)—A crackdown on illegal lobster fishing and the taking of undersized lobsters in waters of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Quebec was announced today by the Federal Fisheries Department.

From the official announcement, it appears that Newfoundland does not as yet come under the new tightened regulations, an exemption probably granted temporarily pending adjustment of Newfoundland's fisheries to the Canadian pattern.
