AT THE ANNUAL MEETING of the Pewholders, &c. in the Episcopal Church, Charlottetown, the following Letter, addressed to D. Hodgson, Esq. from Mr. Orlebar, was read. The suggestions contained therein were unanimously adopted by the Meeting:—

"MY DEAR SIR; "As my official duties will prevent my attending the meeting of the Pewholders, &c. on Tuesday, the 6th June next, I am desirous of conveying, through you, my warm thanks to my brethren of the Church of England, and of others of this community, for their cordial support of the proposition I had the honor of submitting to them last year, respecting an Infant School-house. It is with great pleasure I see the plan so far carried out; and the little that remains to be done, I trust the religious feeling, public spirit and generosity of the congregation will soon see completed. I have the pleasure of stating, that on my part, I have secured the services of a most efficient Master and Mistress, who only await the completion of the building to commence operations, and that, deducting the expenses incurred in bringing out the Schoolmaster and in purchasing materials or School machinery, I have still about £46 to devote to his salary for the first year, and other incidental School expenses. I am naturally anxious to see the School efficiently conducted, and with that view I respectfully submit the following Resolution, &c. for the approbation of the Meeting:—

1st. That the following be appointed Officers of the Charlottetown Infant School: Patron—His Excellency Sir H. V. Huntley. Committee of Reference—Rev. Dr. Jenkins, the Churchwardens. Managing Committee—Mrs. Bayfield, Mrs. Brecken, Mrs. Jenkins, Miss C. Macdonell, Miss Hodgson, Miss A. Longworth, Mrs. Macdonald; Mrs. Orlebar, Treasurer and Secretary. Rules for the School.—Bearing in mind that this institution is especially intended for the poorer classes, the terms for children under 6 years, will be 2d. per week—for children above 6 years, 3d. per week—the money to be paid every Monday morning. The Schoolmaster to look to the Ladies' Committee for advice and direction at all times. The Ladies' Committee to meet once a Quarter, and oftener, if necessary. The Meeting to be called by the Secretary. To the Managing Committee is confided the interests of the entire school, with a certain hope, from the selection made, that they will give themselves heartily to the work of recommending the school to public notice, of raising subscriptions in aid of its funds, and of making it a most effectual means of moral and religious training for the youth of this community. In cases of difficulty, involving alterations in the House, or yard attached, the Managing Committee must apply for advice to the Committee of Reference. The Ladies to have power to replace vacancies or add to their number only from communicants of the Established Church."
