SEAL ISLAND HAS  
DRAMATIC WILD LIFE

What is declared by naturalists to be the greatest wild life drama to be found in the world is on show at Prince Edward Theatre Saturday, in Walt Disney's factual Academy Award short feature, "Seal Island," print by Technicolor, as the first of its new True Life Adventure series.

"Seal Island," which sets the pace and the character of the new fact-is-stranger-than-fiction series, depicts the untamed turbulent life cycle of the Alaska fur seals on their summer rookeries in the remote and misty Bering Sea.

On the surf-beaten reefs annually some 3,000,000 of these handsome mammals haul up to bear where they were born, and enact an animal epic like no other on the globe.

The patient cameras were trained on the most rendezvous for three months to capture the animals in live action—their swift courtship, plural mating, fierce jealous battles, rearing of cute youngsters, playful antics of the brides and young mothers, and the final balm of instincts satisfied.

In much the same fashion, other factual True Life Adventures, follow "Seal Island" will deal with human and animal life far off the beaten paths on every continent.

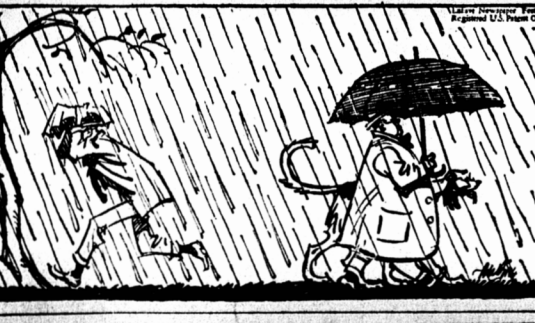
