

# Yanks Break Loss Streak; Favorites Keep Winning

BALTIMORE (AP) — New York Yankees broke a losing streak at three games and spoiled Baltimore's home opener Friday, winning 3-2 on the six-hits pitching of rookie left-hander Fritz Peterson.

Joe Pepitone's second home run of the baseball season in the seventh inning highlighted the Yankees' six-hit assault on Wally Bunker, who went out in the ninth for a pinch-hitter.

Frank Robinson hit his third home run into the left field bleachers in the ninth for Baltimore but Peterson tightened and forced Brooks Robinson to fly out and John Powell to hit to short.

The Yankees scored twice in the fourth after Baltimore had taken the lead in the first on a Brooks Robinson single, scoring Luis Aparicio.

Roy White opened the fourth with a walk, took second on a ground-out and scored on a single by Tom Tresh. With two out, Tresh took off on the pitch and scored on a bloop double to right by Cleve Boyer, which fell just inside the line.

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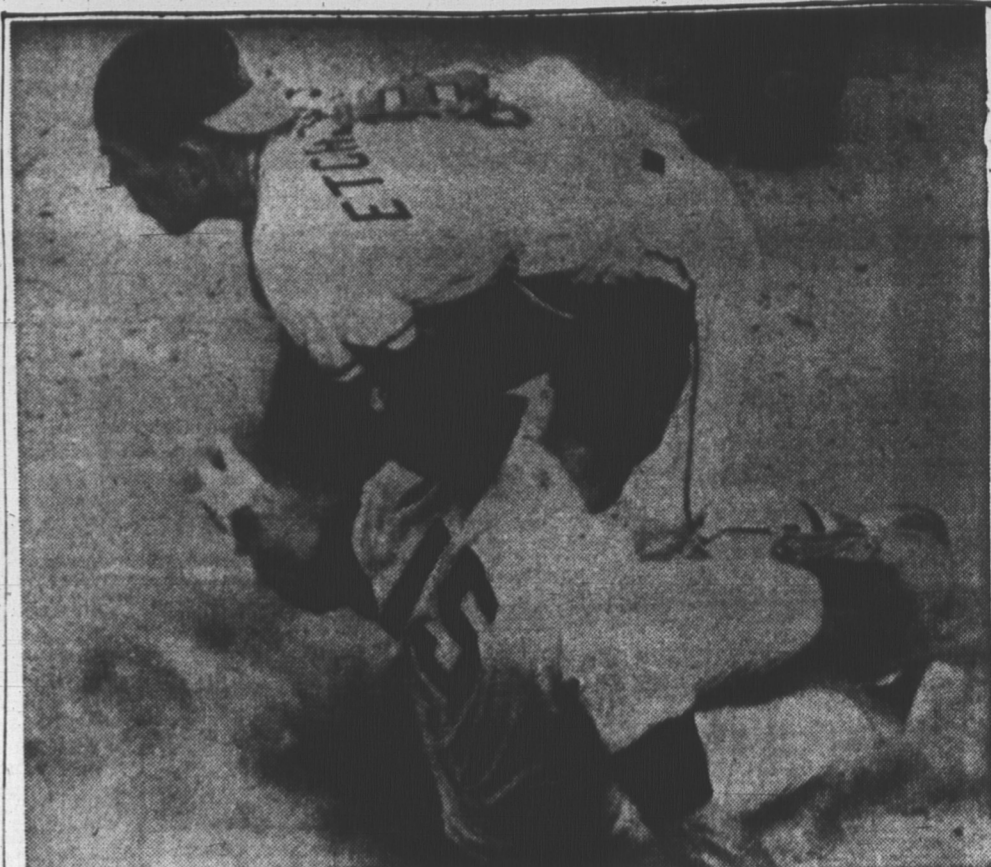

PITTSBURGH (AP) — St. Louis Cardinals backed fireballing Bob Gibson with a 13-hit attack, including two-run homers by Alex Johnson and Lou Brock, and beat Pittsburgh Pirates 9-2 Friday.

It was the 18th straight victory for St. Louis at Pittsburgh and tied the major league record set by the now Los Angeles Dodgers over the Philadelphia Phillies—from 1945 through 1946. Pittsburgh's last victory over St. Louis here was 1-0 in 10 innings, May 6, 1964.

## Roberts, And Baun Are Fined

MONTREAL (CP) — Two members of Montreal Canadiens and one player on the Toronto Maple Leafs roster are each \$50 out-of-pocket today, despite the fact their names do not appear on the published penalty statistics of Thursday night's brawling Stanley Cup contest.

Clarence Campbell, National Hockey League president, said Friday that the Leafs' Noel Baun and Canadiens' Bob Price and Jim Roberts will be assessed \$50 apiece for jumping on to the ice from their respective benches during the first-period brawl in Maple Leaf Gardens.

Canadiens won 4-1 and eliminated the Leafs in four straight games in the Stanley Cup semifinal series.

The NHL president said no additional fines will be levied against Montreal's Ted Harris, John Ferguson and Claude Larose, who picked up misconduct penalties along with Orlando Kurtenbach, Eddie Shack and Peter Stenkowski of Toronto. The automatic \$25 fine will stand in the case of these six, Campbell said.

## Females Protesting Banning From Boxing

VANCOUVER (CP)—Women have called it "horrible" and "ridiculous," and one irate matron threatens to use force if necessary to attend a fight card here at which women have been banned.

But Windsor L. Olson, of Seattle, the president of the promoting group, Thunderhill Corp., says the for-men-only edict will stand when professional boxing returns to Vancouver after a three-year absence.

Thunderhill, in its first venture into pro boxing, has matched ranking light heavyweight Eddie Cotto against unranked heavyweight Emil Umek here Wednesday. The Seattle syndicate previously promoted car racing in Vancouver.

Olson says women will be barred at the door on fight night because too many other sports have been "corrupted by the female influence."

"Boxing is the last retreat of the male animal," he says. "I've got other fight cards planned after this one and the same rule goes for all of them."

The decision to bar the women — advertisements read "men only for a man's sport" — brought a near-violent reaction from boxing fans in Vancouver. "I think it's horrible," says Mrs. Ronald Crump of Vancouver, a family friend of the Cottons.
