**Women "At Home" At Expo
Goal Reached By WAC**

Early this year, at a press conference in Toronto, an announcement was made which was hailed with delight by members of our Women's Advisory Committee for Expo 67. For with the news that the natural gas companies of Canada will sponsor a hospitality pavilion for women at Expo, one of the main goals of the Women's Advisory Committee had been reached.

Trans Canada Pipe Lines, Consumers' Gas, Northern and Central Gas, and Union Gas have joined this Natural Gas Hospitality Pavilion, and women attending the gigantic world exhibition next year may enjoy the luxury of their own "Women's Home at Expo."

The Hospitality Pavilion will stand near the Cite du Havre (MacKay Pier) entrance to Expo while nearby will be other pavilions of interest to women, such as: the Art Gallery, Habitat 67, the Expo Theatre, and the Music Pavilion. In their own centre, women from different parts of the country can meet and entertain each other; and also it is hoped, enjoy the association of other women from all over the world. There will be special exhibits of interest to them, including conferences and fashion shows, for this pavilion will have been designed with just such activities in mind. There will be a public lounge for visitors, opening onto a terrace where food can be served. This lounge can be divided to make room for private functions. There will also be a large auditorium for conferences and fashion shows. The Women's Committee will be provided with offices. A well-appointed kitchen is planned, which can be used by caterers when teas or dinners are held.

At the entrance to the pavilion will be the "Torch of Progress," a tall pylon flowering at the top in a "blossom" of flames. Around the four triangular sections of the pavilion, will be a garden of dancing flames, illustrating the progress of natural gas. In the foyer, a large mural will depict the story of natural gas, and in the hall beyond, another exhibit will complete the picture.

Special programs of interest to women are now under discussion; and women going to Expo 67 can be assured of particular attention to themselves and to their interests in this Natural Gas Hospitality Pavilion.

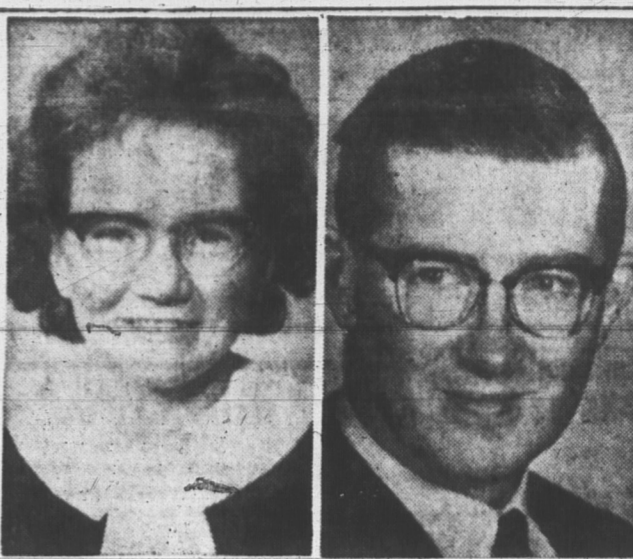
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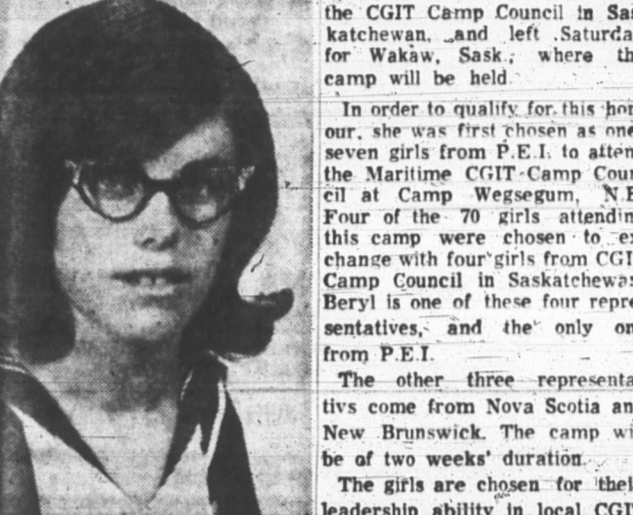

HAMBURG SUPPER DISH
