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New South Viet Nam Upheaval Dominated By Anti-Americanism
than ever to worry this time. They have been many political religious upheavals and coups in three years, and many have had anti-American overtones. This time, anti-Americanism is a dominant theme.
During the bloody summer of 1963, the Buddhists headed a political drive against Roman Catholic president Ngo Dinh Diem. The United States supported the Diem regime until its final couple of months, and anti-American signs began to appear at Buddhist demonstrations.
After the army coup of Nov. 1, 1963, in which Diem was overthrown and slain, relations between the Buddhist leaders and Americans improved—but the honeymoon was short-lived. The Buddhists objected to most new national governments. America had to support such governments, and tensions between Buddhist organizers and the Americans mounted.
MONK SOUGHT REFUGE
In 1963, the Buddhist political movement was an underground organization in which communications were whispered in back alleys and monks did their planning in secret cells in slums. On the powerful monk Thich Tri Quang remained at large to direct activities, and he was quickly forced to take refuge at the U.S. embassy from Diem's police.
All that changed after the coup that ousted Diem. Leading monks such as Thich (Thick means venerable) Tri Quang and Thich Tam Chau now travelled by limousine and plane rather than bicycle-taxi.
No politician or government leader could ignore them.
South Viet Nam was without a constitution or legislature and without any legal basis for forming a government at all. In this vacuum, the Buddhist hierarchy has served almost as a senate, without whose advice and consent no government has been able to get far.
The top monks have frequently said they would not accept formal government posts themselves. But they have made it clear they want to be consulted on any major changes in government.
Despite the street battles that have sometimes erupted between Buddhists and Catholics, there has never been a basic religious conflict between followers of the two faiths here. Catholic and Buddhist anti-government extremists have sometimes joined to bring down governments.
10 PER CENT CATHOLIC
It is generally accepted that about 10 per cent of South Viet Nam's population is Roman Catholic and that perhaps 70 per cent are at least nominal Buddhists or in related religions. The Hoa Hao and Cao Dai sects claim 1,000,000 followers. There also are Protestant Christians.
Normally followers of all these faiths get along with one another, and religious fanaticism is rare in this country.
A much bigger source of trouble is the cultural and linguistic differences among the North Vietnamese, central Vietnamese and South Vietnamese.
With a few exceptions, the Saigon government has been dominated since Vietnamese independence in 1954 by north and central Vietnamese. In the present military government, both the chief of state Gen. Nguyen Van Thieu, and the premier, Gen. Nguyen Cao Ky, originated in the north.
This is a source of irritation to many South Vietnamese, who feel the nation should be ruled by southerners.
Ironically, it is the single most decisive force in Vietnamese Buddhism, too. The two

top monks in South Viet Nam are Thich Tam Chau, a North Vietnamese, and Thich Tri Quang, a central Vietnamese. Most of the other dozen or so leading monks also are either northern or central Vietnamese. The Buddhist movement has never had militant power in the populous Mekong River delta.
GAINED POPULARITY
The loose structure of the Buddhist organization, the vagueness of its programs, and its lack of regional identity with the South Vietnamese people would probably have doomed it to political obscurity, if it had not been for Diem's attempts to subdue them.
Since 1963, the Buddhist organization has kept itself powerful by maintaining its image as the defender of the people. Buddhist leaders have been sensitive to popular pressures in their congregations, and quick to pick up popular themes.
There is real danger when Buddhist pressure turns directly against the American presence here, as it now appears to have done.
Vietnamese women are often offended by well-meaning but rude U.S. soldiers in the streets. And when an agitator tells a Buddhist crowd that the quarter-million American troops are all eating steak every day and thereby depleting the nation of meat, the crowd believes it.
Actually, U.S. forces import practically all the food they eat. But mobs are prepared to believe the worst.
In the cities, the American military presence has a sententious far beyond the reach of most middle-class Vietnamese.
SHARE VIEW CONGRUOUS
The similarity between the Viet Cong and Buddhist propaganda lines lately has struck almost all observers. No one has yet offered proof that any responsible Buddhist leader was working with the Viet Cong, but their programs frequently dovetail.
Meanwhile, in the countryside, non-combatants are being killed at a staggering rate by artillery and air bombardment. Representative Clement Zablocki, a Wisconsin Democrat, said recently he believed 200 civilians were being killed by U.S. forces and their allies for every Viet Cong killed.
Against this background, American popularity in Viet Nam has reached possibly its lowest point in history.
Ky flew to Honolulu to meet President Johnson two months ago, and the two leaders issued a determined joint communique.
Many Vietnamese were angry. Some said Ky was dancing to the American tune. Ky was charged openly with being too close to the Americans—a charge that has proved fatal to many a politician in the past, and which puts teeth in the North Viet namese insult: "Lackey of the imperialists."
One Buddhist layman reminded reporters recently: "You don't have to be a Viet Cong to be anti-American."

QUINCY, Ill. (AP)—An 18-year-old youth was charged with murder Sunday in the double slaying March 22 of two Quincy career girls. State's Attorney Don Adams said the youth is Ronald McCleery, also known as Ronald Glas, who lives several doors from the apartment shared by the girls. The victims of the knife and shotgun murders were Judith Greening, 22, and Donetta Pickens, 21. Both worked as secretaries.

Spencer's Year In Spotlight Sparked Six Judicial Probes
OTTAWA (CP)—George Victor Spencer had less than a year in the national spotlight but that was long enough to spark three judicial inquiries linked to security matters.
While the inquiry by Mr. Justice Dalton Wells of the Ontario Supreme Court was set up to investigate whether Spencer was treated fairly when he was dismissed from his Vancouver postal job, after being linked to a Russian spy case, it was the continuing turmoil over his case in the commons that led to two other inquiries:
—A full royal commission inquiry into espionage and security in Canada, and
—A one-man royal commission inquiry into the Munsinger affair.
The inquiry into the broader aspects of security and espionage is still being organized and an announcement has been promised by the prime minister within the next few days.
The Munsinger affair, involving allegations of sex and security, broke out in the Commons Friday, March 4, when Justice Minister Cardin was under fire for refusing an inquiry into Spencer's case.
(The following Monday, Prime Minister Pearson ordered the inquiry.)
During the heated Friday explosion, Mr. Cardin asked Opposition Leader Diefenbaker to tell the house about his participation in the Munsinger case when he was prime minister of this country.
CAME FROM GERMANY
While it took a couple of days to untangle the confusion in names, Mr. Cardin's challenge finally was identified as involving the activities of Gerda Munsinger, who, Mr. Cardin said, had been involved with "two or more" Conservative cabinet ministers and also "engaged in espionage work" before coming to Canada from Germany in 1955.
The Munsinger affair replaced the Spencer case in the spotlight and finally March 14, Mr. Pearson announced Mr. Justice W. F. Spence of the Supreme Court of Canada would conduct a one-man royal commission into Mr. Cardin's charges.
The Spencer case came to light May 8, 1965, when the external affairs department announced two Soviet Embassy officials had been expelled after paying thousands of dollars for information from two Canadians, one a civil servant in a minor post.
Spencer identified himself to a newspaper man as the civil servant involved, and on Nov. 28 Mr. Cardin confirmed the identification. The opposition insisted Mr. Cardin's action had branded Spencer a spy.
The government said Spencer wouldn't be prosecuted because he was dying of lung cancer. He later had a lung removed.
CULDN'T REVEAL SAME
The government then said much of its evidence against Spencer was inadmissible in court—and would reveal secret security procedures.
These statements gave the opposition parties the ammunition to belabor the government when the new Parliament opened this year and the opposition attacks had reached a peak when the justice minister mentioned the "Munsinger affair."
The Munsinger affair also has its confusing aspects.
Mrs. Munsinger was reported to have died of leukemia in East Germany shortly after leaving Canada in 1961. But she was located very much alive at a flat in Munich.
In an interview, she denied she had ever been a spy but said she had known two ministers in the former Conservative cabinet. Pierre Sevigny, then associate defence minister, and George Hees, then trade minister.
But since her first interview parts of her story have changed and Mr. Hees has been investigating a possible libel action against a German magazine for an article based on Mrs. Munsinger's experiences.
