

Giants Nip Mets 6-5; Braves Sweep Series

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS as the Chicago Cub right-hander Willie Mays and Willie McCovey each hit two-run homers as National League leading San Francisco Giants beat a five-run lead, then fought off New York's scrambling Mets 6-5 Thursday.

The victory, which went to untested Billy O'Dell, was the Giants' third straight at Candlestick park and boosted their home record past the 500 mark. They're 9-8 at home, 13-8 on the road.

Big Earl Wilson threw a two-hitter at Los Angeles Angels and pitched Boston Red Sox to their fifth straight victory, 5-1, in the only game in the American League.

Ernie Banks singled in the only run Larry Jackson needed.

Jones Proves Mark No Fluke

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—Rufus (Parnell) Jones proved his unofficial Indianapolis Motor Speedway record was no fluke by running two faster laps Thursday in practice for the opening time trials for the 300-mile Memorial Day race Saturday.

The Torrance, Calif., driver, first to break the 150-m.p.h. barrier at the old track last year, did one round Thursday at 153.557 and another at 153.302.

He toured the 2 1/2-mile course Wednesday at 153.129 against his own official record of 150.729 for one lap and 150.570 for four.

All of Jones' fast practice laps were clocked with the track's electric timer but only speeds made in the qualifications and actual race are accepted.

The probability that Jones will win the pole position Saturday did not change observers' opinion that the outfit to beat in the race will be Bob Wilkie's Milwaukee racing team of Roger Ward, Len Sutton and Don Braun. The three look turns running at 150 Thursday.

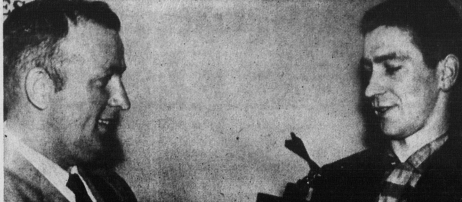

Willard's Trainer Dies In N.Y. At 76

NEW YORK (AP)—Tex O'Rourke, who trained Jess Willard for his heavyweight championship fight with Jack Johnson in Havana in 1915, died at 76.

Officials of Polytechnic Hospital, where O'Rourke died Tuesday night after surgery, tried to learn the whereabouts of O'Rourke but a brief ring carter that ended when a piece of spring from an exercise machine struck him and caused temporary blindness in one eye.

His manager was the original Bat Masterson, gunfighter, cowboy and Indian fighting scout. Later, O'Rourke was associated with the late Tex Rickard in boxing promotion. He was secretary of the National Boxing Association in the 1920s.

O'Rourke, who weighed about 200 pounds, was fond of telling how he trimmed Willard from 287 to 167 for his fight with Johnson, in which Willard won by a knockout in the 26th round but the title that Johnson had held since 1908.

"When I finished with him his face was puffed in brine and baked in the sun until it bore a peculiar resemblance to the inside of a catcher's mitt. It was to be a 45-round fight, but two days beforehand we made Jess go 20 rounds just to make sure."
