out of the Korean peace conference was no reflection on India. But he added that disarmament from the peace conference was the price India must pay for the privilege of refraining from the fight against Communist aggression during the Korean war.

Italian Tempers Flare Italy-Italian tempers flared over Dulles' remarks about disputed Trieste. At his press conference the secretary obviously angered the Italian government by saying the United States is open-minded about a Trieste settlement.

Japan-Dulles called on the Japanese at his press conference to increase their internal security forces to guard against possible subversion. He said the United States is carrying too big a load on behalf of Japan at a time when the Japanese government seemed to find money to spend on non-essential projects.

Japanese embassy officials were obviously upset at this public criticism of their policy, especially since their 1945 constitution disarmed Japan permanently, with American approval.

Five Victims Of Crash Buried In Gaspé Wilderness

MONCTON, (CP)—The remains of five victims of a Maritime Central Airways plane crash in the Gaspé wilderness 18 months ago were buried in Gaspé Wednesday. Capt. H.S. Jones, chief pilot of the airline, said here Thursday.

Capt. Jones returned to Moncton from Gaspé. He accompanied an investigating party to the wreckage of the DC-3 which disappeared March 22, 1952 with two crewmen and three passengers aboard while on a charter flight from Saint John, N.B., to Goose Bay, Labrador.

Aboard the plane were John McClatchie of Charlottetown and Kenora, Ont.; pilot; John E. Boudreau, Moncton, co-pilot; James A. Robb, Westmount, Que.; David Herbert, Reston, N.B.; and B.A. Kaminski, a German immigrant recently arrived in Canada.

The passengers were en route to Labrador to work for Fraser Brace Terminal Construction Company of Saint John.

Capt. Jones said there were indications at the crash scene that all five persons aboard the plane were killed instantly. The plane burned with an estimated 500 gallons of gasoline in its fuel tanks.

The investigating party included Capt. Carl Bruce, Charlottetown, president of MCA, and Ray Goodwin, Moncton, Department of Transport inspector. They traveled 40 miles from the village of Gaspé through swampland and bush country to reach the wreckage.

Two Canadian Warships Visit New York City

NEW YORK, (CP)—The Canadian aircraft carrier Magnificent and the cruiser Quebec arrived in New York for a four-day visit Friday and 400 of their officers and men immediately volunteered to donate blood to the American Red Cross.

Seamen and officers alike stretched out on tables laid over the canvas awnings of the Quebec's quarter-deck while Red Cross nurses took their blood. Officers said it was the first time in their memory a quarter deck had been used for such a purpose.

Hon. Ray Lawton, Canadian consul-general in New York who welcomed the ships to U.S. navy docks in the lower Hudson river, said the blood donations were a token of the close friendship between Canada and the U.S.

The "Magnificent" and the Quebec broke off manoeuvres with units of the American fleet in the Atlantic Thursday to make the New York visit. After a round of entertainment for the 1,700-man complement of the two ships here, they will leave Tuesday, the Magnificent this is a step in the right direction and that much good will come from the experiments and tests. Pacific Railway. Certain key shipping points in Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick will be chosen and the test shipments will be made from those points. Cereal Crops Being Harvested At Farm

Everyone connected with the work at the Experimental Farm has been busy this week in harvesting cereal crops from the many plots at the Farm and on the Illustration Stations throughout the Province. The plots cover all those used in variety tests, disease resistant tests, and others, including plots used to test control of the barley joint worm.

An excellent grain crop is reported in the Province, but regret is being expressed at so much of it being torn down by heavy storms of the past.

Mr. R. C. Parent, Superintendent of the Farm, is leaving Tuesday morning by plane for the Magdalen Islands where he will look over the two stations established there to handle experiments in soil fertility and variety tests. While there he will give two illustrated lectures on Grindstone Island with the first of them before a group at Etang du Nord.
