



OFF TO SUMMERSIDE FOR 105TH REUNION

Reunion Held At S'side By The 105th Battalion

"Old soldiers never die," was perhaps never more truly exemplified than it was in Summerside yesterday afternoon when about 125 members of the old 105th Battalion, heads held high and arms swinging, marched proudly along the Summerside streets to Memorial Square where wreaths were laid before the Cenotaph in memory of fallen comrades who went over in "fourteen" and now lie in Flanders Fields where the poppies grow.

Young and old alike watched this brave company of veterans who had assembled from many parts of the Dominion and the United States to be present at the fifth reunion of the Hundred and Fifth.

With the R.C.A.F. band leading, these First World War veterans marched again as they had so many times before, under the command of Sgt. Major Norman MacDonald, up Water Street, to Central and across Church Street to Memorial Square to the Cenotaph where, after the wreaths were laid, "Last Post" was sounded by Bugler Alban Gallant.

Paying tribute to the men of the old battalion who had come back to take up once again the life of the civilian and to those who did not come back, Mr. Barnes said "Eventually our mission was accomplished and the war to end wars was over. But it didn't work out that way. The Kaiser is gone but dictatorship sprouts on every hand. Two big wars and 200 smaller ones have kept the world on edge. One can hardly be blamed for a cynical attitude today and yet the alternative to victory in the cold war can only be complete destruction.

"And so," he went on, "that age old symbol of victory and endurance - the torch - is being passed again. It would be nice to say we've done our bit, but the front line has moved to our front yard and the battle is now for the minds of men."

"In conclusion," he said "God grant that those who carry the torch in the 60's and the 70's will have the intelligence to see the enemy hiding behind a hundred disguises, the imagination to devise strategy and tactics bold enough to seize the initiative, the courage and capacity to challenge the predators, if need be.

Expect Many Teachers For Program At S.D.U. Tomorrow

A large percentage of Prince Edward Island's teachers have indicated that they will attend tomorrow the closing exercises of St. Dunstan's first Summer Session. All members of the profession have been invited.

Those who come will participate with the 70 teachers who have attended the Session in the closing program which has been given the formal title "Teachers Community Caucus." Theme of the event is "Towards a Better Use of our Human and Natural Resources."

Principal speaker will be Anselm Cormier, of Sackville, N.B. His topic will be "The Teacher a Leader by Profession."

The program will open at 2:30 p.m. tomorrow afternoon with a symposium, "The Teacher's Role in Community" in which the participants will be Messrs. Elmer O'Hanley, teacher, Mr. Charles Yeo, taxpayer, and Mr. Kenneth Cox, Principal of Nova Scotia Agricultural College.

The 2:30 symposium will be followed at 3:15 by a series of Workshops composed of various groups of teachers whose task

will be to analyze a community and appraise its human and natural resources.

At 4:45 p.m. the reports of the various groups will be received at a general meeting in the Alumni auditorium.

Mr. Cormier will speak at the dinner which will be held at 5:30 at which Mr. Kenneth Parker, Superintendent of schools in Charlottetown, will preside. The closing session entitled, "Experiment in Community Participation" will be under the chairmanship of Mr. John Martin, the Leader being Mr. Edward Arsenault of Moncton, N.B.

Deny Russian Activity Is Stepped Up

OTTAWA (CP) - German reports that Russian naval activity was stepped up off Newfoundland during the recent Middle East crisis were denied Wednesday by Canadian navy headquarters.

The reports, not carried by The Canadian Press, attributed to West German authorities at Hamburg statements that Russian surface and under-water naval elements were seen off Newfoundland during that period. The construction placed upon the alleged appearances was that they were intended as a "show of strength."

A spokesman at RCN headquarters said there have been no reports of unusual Russian naval activity in the Newfoundland area in recent weeks.

Mr. MacDonald stated that work from local sources is not sufficient to keep a plant of this size operating. "We must have outside work if we are going to keep our help employed," he said.
