N.S. Federation Of Music Festival Formed

HALIFAX, Nov. 23 - (CP) - A Nova Scotia Federation of Music Festival, representing 27 autonomous festivals with a 1952 entry list of nearly 10,000, was organized here yesterday with Charles Legrow of Yarmouth as president.
The organization was the culmination of preliminary meetings over the year aimed at encouraging the festivals movement and the general enjoyment of good music.
The federation will become a source of information and advice for smaller festivals and will set up a panel of adjudicators which can be called upon where necessary.
It is in fact a clearing house for an exchange of information and ideas. Its supporters hope that it may some day result in a truly representative provincial festival.
It is almost unique in Canada and represents the big festivals like Halifax with 1,500 entries, as well as the smaller festivals with only 70.
