Ch'town Man Is Acquitted On Liquor Selling Charge

George Reid, Charlottetown, was found not guilty of one charge of selling liquor without a licence to another person by Magistrate A. James Haslam in court this morning.

Reid still faces another similar charge. Hearing date for that charge is set for July 26.

Counsel for the defense, John P. Nicholson, produced two witnesses, Mrs. Marion McPhee, City, testified that at the time the offense had allegedly taken place, the accused had been attending a birthday party at the home of Mrs. Nicholson in Barlow, City, who also testified, corroborating Mrs. McPhee's testimony, that she had observed a photograph taken at the birthday party and Mr. Nicholson's name on it.

In presenting his case, Mr. Nicholson cited the implication that the crown witness was under pressure from a magistrate in Summerside to testify against Reid in order to have their own fines reduced.

It is dangerous to convict on the uncorroborative evidence of a witness, he said.

During the luncheon Premier Shaw presented the Town of Montague with a large size framed picture of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip. Requests presented

The board asked the government to finish paving the Ugg Road between Montague and the Trans Canada Highway; erection of a pier for use of small boat owners at Brudenell Park; a golf course at the same place; a vocational school for Montague; additional parks in South-eastern Kings for development of the tourist trade; and completion of Sutherland's fish pond.

Montague itself also urged completion of the fish pond project; establishment of a government garage in the town as a particular aid in winter snow-plowing; financial assistance for the town fire department; re-surfacing of main street, and a new road to the food processing plant.

The briefs were presented by Kenneth R. Macdonald president of the Montague regional board of trade; and Mayor Yeo.
