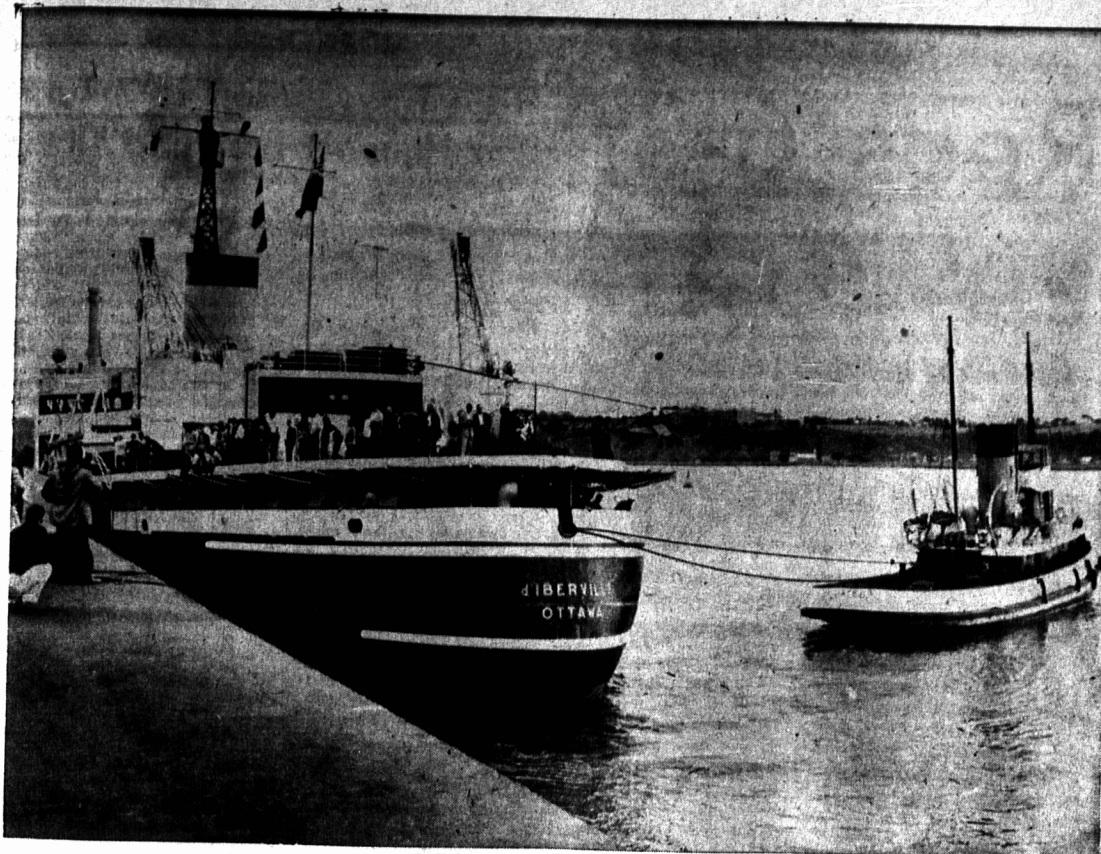
SUMMONED AS WITNESS

Pate was summoned as a witness by defence lawyer Emile Zola Berman. He is scheduled to take the stand this afternoon to talk on past marine training methods.

Canada Backs International Control Of The Suez Canal

OTTAWA (CP) — External Affairs Minister Pearson Wednesday proposed that control of the Suez Canal be vested in the United Nations.

He told the Commons that the Canadian government supports the principle of international control of the waterway "with the countries having the greatest interest in the operation of the canal sharing in that control, preferably, if this turns out to be practicable, under the aegis of the United Nations."

Mr. Pearson, opening an external affairs debate, described Egyptian nationalization — "or, if you like, expropriation" — of the Suez Canal as a "sudden, arbitrary move."

He said more is at stake than nationalization of the canal: "It is the future use for all nations without arbitrary or unnecessary interference of an essential international artery of trade and communications."

Mr. Pearson noted that Britain, France and the United States were meeting in London to try to establish international control for the canal.

CALLS FOR SUPPORT

John Diefenbaker, Progressive Conservative foreign affairs spokesman, said Canada should tell the world it gives its moral support to the big three powers in their stand against nationalization of the canal by Egypt.

Nationalization was a challenge to international law and a denial of the pledged word. Closing of the canal would endanger Britain's lifeline in its fight against Russia's economic offensive and bottle up freedom's forces in the Mediterranean.

Mr. Diefenbaker said President Nasser of Egypt has taken "the garb of Hitler and Mussolini" in his dreams that Egypt one day will control all of North Africa. Russia had helped to feed Nasser's appetite for aggression by giving him arms.

Both Mr. Diefenbaker and Allan Stewart (CCF, Winnipeg North) urged that Canada supply Israel with Sabre jet fighter planes.
