

Traffic Constant Presents Report

A new law prohibiting overnight parking in winter months; complete elimination of parking in front of buildings housing large numbers of people; the establishing of a public transportation system in the city; and re-organization of the tax business to provide just two departmental centres are among recommendations made in the report of traffic consultant Peter Mannell, prepared for City Council and presented at City Hall yesterday.

The much-maligned report says the present overnight parking by-law should be amended to cover only the winter months and permit such parking in other seasons. The law should take effect, the report says, long prior to the expected first snowfall. It should be well publicized, and enforced.

It is the responsibility of car owners to make arrangements for parking space. The onus is on the city to remove and fast, as possible, and this cannot be done if the streets are filled with cars," Mr. Mannell said.

At the moment, I have no idea as to what success can be hoped for in the way of acquiring off-street parking on a municipal purchase basis. However, if this is even remotely successful, the permanent commission comprised of at least two merchants in each block should be formed to select and maintain and to try to tie in bits and pieces in each block, to at least 100 per cent.

BUS SYSTEM
He believes a public bus system on a 20-minute schedule on three routes to the city, and that he admits it could not be supported by fares, alone. It should be either municipally operated or carry a fixed guarantee for the operator if privately operated.

This is, I am afraid, over and beyond my scope of preference and will have to be handled by the businessmen, themselves, in conjunction with the Planning Board and Planning Director. However, I must stress the urgency of doing something before it is too late.

Son Of Former Islander Killed In Highway Crash

Word has been received here of the death in a recent highway accident of Arthur Andrew, son of island parentage, and his wife, the former Nina Maclellan of North Sydney, N.S., who were killed while travelling from their home in West Acton, Massachusetts, by their parents' present home in Lively, Ontario. Mr. Andrew, 35, was married only a year ago. His bride was 24.

No other car was involved in the accident and the bodies were found by State Troopers who were on highway patrol at the time. Both, apparently had been killed instantly.

Mr. Andrew was a son of Arthur Andrews Sr., West Acton, Mass., formerly of Woodley River in his province and his first wife, who was Miss Olga Weye, Huxley River before her marriage. The step-mother, who present Mrs. Andrews, is the former Sue Jones of Haslebrook, P.E.I.

Mrs. Andrews' was born in Sydney, N.S., and after receiving her high school education went to Ottawa Missionary College, then studied and graduated in nursing from New England Sanatorium at Melrose, Mass. Her husband graduated from Lancaster College in Lancaster, Massachusetts and for the past year has been in the medical corps in the U.S. Army.

They were married a year ago and visited here on their honeymoon. Surviving to mourn the death of Mrs. Andrew are her parents and one brother, Angus at Lively, and one sister, Elsie, a graduate nurse residing at Portland, Oregon.

Funeral services were held in the Chapel of the New England Sanatorium, burial took place at Rollingsford, New Hampshire.
