A MEETING of the officers and non-commissioned officers of the city companies of active militia will be held in the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court Room this (Tuesday) evening, at 8 o'clock. A full attendance is respectfully requested.

At a public meeting of the citizens of Glasgow, N. S., on Friday last, a resolution in favor of the construction of a system of waterworks was carried by a majority of 48. The expense of the proposed works is estimated at \$80,000.

DELANEY, the young man mentioned yesterday as beating his father on Water Street, Summerside, was sentenced by Stipendiary Magistrate McQuarrie to pay a fine of \$25, or in default to be imprisoned for sixty days. He took the sixty days.

A MAN wearing a boot and shoe, the latter looking suspiciously like that found in the yard on Sydney Street the night of the fire, and which it is suspected belongs to the incendiary, has been seen prowling about the east end of the city during the past few days.

ONE of the English mail bags, containing newspapers recovered from the wrecked steamer Oregon, arrived at the City Post Office to-day. The papers are saturated with water, and the addresses in many cases are illegible; but it is thought that after they are placed before a fire for a short time most of them can be forwarded to their destination.

ON Sunday evening about seven o'clock a grocery store on Cumberland Street was broken into, and \$4 in cash and several small articles stolen therefrom. Later on in the evening, the hay-press, on Grafton St. in which a large quantity of hay is stored, was also broken into. The police have their suspicions as to the guilty parties and are looking them up.

A CABLE states that the London chamber of commerce, the most important body of the kind in the United Kingdom has this afternoon petitioned the Government to support the Canadian Pacific steamship line, and expressed the opinion that there is a great value to imperial commercial interests in Great Britain in this new route to Australia and the East.

THE "Pioneer" reports that Mr. W. H. Belyea has disposed of his lobster factories at Black Pond and Miminigash to Mr. Holman, of Summerside, who intends to continue the business in connexion with Mr. McAllister, of Miminigash. Mr. Belyea belongs to St. John, and has been doing business in Prince County for some years. He stands in the very first rank of square, honest men, and we are indeed sorry that he has decided to leave the Province. He intends to resume the canning business in Cape Breton.

BOSTON PRICES.—Receipts of potatoes have been quite liberal during the past week, and the market is a shade easier. Prices range from 65 to 78 cents. The supply of oats is dull, and from 41 1/2 to 45 cents per bushel is the price asked. A good jobbing movement is visible in mackerel and codfish, and the outlook is quite encouraging though the demand for round lots is rather slight. The egg market is well supplied, and prices range from 13 1/2 to 14 cents per dozen.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

OTTAWA, March 22.

The House met at 3 o'clock. After several bills were referred to.

In answer to a question, Hon. Mr. Costigan said that Parliament will be asked to vote a sum of money to pay the Commissioners and Inspectors appointed under the Liquor License Act of 1883, and also to reimburse the parties who paid fees under the same Act.

In answer to a question, Hon. Mr. Foster said that the Government intend to send the Alberta again to Hudson Bay under command of Lieut. Gordon.

In answer to a question, Hon. Mr. White said it was the intention of the Government to establish one or more National Parks along the line of the C. P. R. in the territories of British Columbia.

In answer to a question, Hon. Mr. Thompson said that all the documents had been brought down asking that Riel should not be pardoned or sentence not commuted. The House then proceeded with the debate on Landry's censure motion.

Hon. Mr. Thompson, on rising, was received with great applause. He said the charge that Landry's motion was framed by the Government was not true. In the nature of things, Parliament could not and ought not to be the Court of Appeals in such cases. Partisan feeling was always present, and the Commons could not come to the question with the calm deliberation necessary. After a long and very able speech, Mr. Thompson sat down at six o'clock amidst loud applause.

HOME RULE.

Gladstone's Scheme.

LONDON, March 22.

Gladstone occupied his usual place in the House of Commons this afternoon. He appeared in excellent health and spirits. H. Campbell Bannerman, Secretary for War, announced that the Government had withdrawn the British troops on the Nile to Assuan.

It is affirmed that this evening by a person believed to know, that there never has been any foundation for the statements that Gladstone intended to ask authority to issue a loan in order to secure funds to carry out his scheme to buy out real estate owners of Ireland. It is now declared that the Premier in his scheme proposes the appointment of a commission of experts to fix the value of land properties in Ireland, which, at these valuations, are to be handed over to the Government in exchange for consols.

In this way Ireland is to be made a debtor to the Empire for the amount paid to the landlords, together with the interest, the whole sum to be repaid into the Imperial Treasury by Ireland in instalments within the term of fifty years. At the end of the term the lessees become owners. It necessarily involves Home Rule.

Shipping Disasters

LONDON, March 22.

The British bark Gloire, from St. John, N. B., Feb. 16, was passed March 10th, waterlogged and abandoned.

NEW YORK, March 22.

The bark James Stafford, reported Jan. 30, a seaman fell overboard and was lost on Feb. 5, during a hurricane. Three other seamen were washed overboard.

John Teemer, Champion oarman, offers to row Wallace Ross three or four miles with turn for \$1,000 a side. He suggests a sweepstake race between Hanlan Ross and himself, each to put up from \$500 to \$1,000. Race to take place on any water.

The Situation in Burmah.

RANGOON, March 22.

Gen. Pendergast, in command of the British expedition to relieve Genethen in Burmah telegraphs that he has met and dispersed a large body of insurgents at that town. He adds that people in the vicinity are friendly.

Sir John's Illness.

OTTAWA, March 22.

Dr. Powell to-day called in Dr. Howard, of Montreal, to consult with him on Sir John's case. The doctors agree about the treatment, and recommend quiet, rest, and great care.

Terrible Accident.

POTTSVILLE, Pa., March 22.

This morning a fall of top rock took place in a tunnel, burying about twenty workmen, mostly Italians. Several were killed and others seriously injured.
