NOTES FROM THE CAPITAL.

A Penny-Wise and Pound-Foolish Policy Condemned.

Rideau Canal Men Overworked.

OTTAWA, July 19.—The Rev. J. A. Elliott, in the McLeod street Methodist church, created a sensation at the service yesterday by denouncing the Government's penny-wise and pound-foolish policy. He said that while deserving civil servants were deprived of their statutory increases upon parsimonious principles, the Government was squandering millions upon schemes of doubtful utility.

The staff on the Rideau Canal locks was reduced from eight to five this year, and throughout all the heat of the past three weeks these men have been on duty twenty hours a day. Three of the men are now ill from overwork.

THE PEACE CONFERENCE.

Matters in the East Still Unsettled.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 19.—At Saturday's sitting of the peace conference the Turkish Minister of Foreign Affairs submitted a new frontier scheme which was unacceptable to the powers. The ambassadors thereupon informed the Minister that the conference would adjourn until he brought the written acceptance of their proposal by his government.

MAN OVERBOARD.

Drowned While Yachting on Sunday.

HALIFAX, July 19.—James McDonald, aged eighteen, was drowned on the North-west Arm yesterday. He was knocked overboard from his yacht by the boom.

THE TRADE OUTLOOK.

New York, July 18.—R. G. Dun & Co. say of Canadian trade: There is on the whole no material change in the business situation, as none is to be expected during the mid-summer season, but there are indications of decided improvement hereafter with some already realised. At St. John the lumber business shows gain, though there is not much movement in other staples. Collections continue fairly good, though crop prospects are not very bright. Trade is seasonably quiet at Montreal, with remittances somewhat slow and money easy. The banks have decided to reduce the maximum rate of interest on deposits to 3 per cent. from Sept. 1st. At Toronto the business in dry goods is unusually large for the season, and there is also improvement in groceries, teas, and canned goods, and agricultural implements are in better demand. The week's trade compares favorably with that of past seasons in Winnipeg in spite of the mid-summer quiet. In wholesale trade at Victoria local business is quiet, but the demand from outside points is fair. Retailers complain of dullness, and in dry goods the leading houses are trying to force business by clearance sales.

MEETING AT CALEDONIA.

The meeting called by Messrs. Sinclair and Warburton, at Hope River last Friday evening was a big affair for the Conservatives.

Messrs. Beaton and McLeod received an excellent hearing and were warmly applauded, while Messrs. Sinclair and Warburton's friends could scarcely raise a tramp. The meeting was further addressed by Dr. McEil, Thomas Doyis and Wm. Hogan, who in turn denounced the Peters Combination and made an excellent impression upon the electors, while J. C. Clarke, J. T. Cosgrove and T. Cullen made a faint attempt to defend the Peters Government. The tide has surely changed when prominent Liberals who have always voted that way got up and publicly told Messrs. Sinclair and Warburton they would not vote for them. Messrs. Beaton and McLeod have an excellent prospect for victory on the 21st, as dissatisfaction is heard on every side. The people of this district have awakened to the fact that they no longer want a lawyer from Charlottetown and an aged and infirm man of nearly 80 years of age to represent them, but such men as Beaton and McLeod who have been reared in their midst.
