SUCCESSFUL ARTILLERYMEN.—The annual report of the Dominion Artillery Association for the year 1892 is to hand. Looking over the prize list we find that the P. E. Island Brigade carried off \$100.50 in prizes at the firing competition held in Halifax last fall. Of this amount, \$40 out of the \$50 offered for officers' competition were won by Lieuts. E. Stewart and W. S. Easton, of Georgetown Battery, who won 1st and 2nd prizes respectively. The remainder was won as follows: No. 3 Battery, \$35.50; No. 5, \$25.

FAR-OFF FIELDS LOOK GREEN.—Some months ago a young man who had a steady job in this city left for the land of the free in pursuit of wealth. The other day friends here received rather a doleful letter from him. He stated he had been unable to secure employment, had spent what little money he had, and was about to start walking for home—rather a long tramp, the letter being dated in a town some 30 miles on the other side of Boston. The young man said there were hosts of people in the same predicament as he, and would gladly return to the land of their nativity if they had the wherewithal.—Moncton Times.

SCOTT ACT EXCITEMENT.—A Moncton despatch of the 16th says: "The Scott Act is being prosecuted vigorously in Westmorland and Albert counties. The latter has always been regarded as one of the most intensely temperate counties in the province and the county council refused to grant licenses for years before the Scott Act became law. Of late, however, liquor has been sold quite openly and the temperance people have organized to crush out the traffic. A detective has been employed and a number of convictions secured. Now the lawyer employed by the liquor party, Mr. D. Grant, of Moncton, has sworn out a warrant charging George Barnett, a Hillsboro justice of the peace, with perjury. The case causes much excitement. In Moncton all the leading hotels which have had their bars open without restriction beyond an occasional fine, are now being prosecuted on second and third offenses, and as the latter is jail without the option of a fine, they are resorting to every legal device in order to state off the enforcement of convictions until after the Scott Act election, which is expected will be brought on in July or August.
