THE SOURIS MYSTERY. Evidence at the Inquest. VERDICT OF THE JURY.

Through the kindness of the Prothono-
tary we are to-day enabled to present our
readers with the most important evi-
dence taken at the Coroner's inquest:—

Dr. Cox, re-called, and having, at the
unanimous request of the jury, held a *post
mortem* examination on the body of the
said Sarah Swallow, testifies on oath as
follows:—I find no marks of violence on
the body. Over the left eye, and on the
left cheek, and on the lower lip and left
ear, I find slight abrasions, which I be-
lieve to have been caused by nibbling of
fish after death. The heart, lungs, liver
and other viscera I found normal. The
uterus contained a male foetus from three
to four months old. From the appearance
of the state of the lungs, and from other
evidence, I am convinced that deceased
came to her death by drowning.

MARGARET McBETH (sworn.) I was ac-
quainted with the deceased Sarah Swallow
for about a month. I saw her last alive
about 7 1/2 o'clock, p. m., on Sunday even-
ing last. We were standing at Dr. Cox's
stairs. She said on leaving that she was
going for a walk. I knew that she kept
company with Alfred Cahill. She told me
that was his name. I saw the deceased
and Alfred Cahill talking together at the
pump, about three weeks ago last Monday.
She told me that Alfred Cahill was keep-
ing her company for nearly four years. I
saw them talking together also last
Thursday. I did not hear all they said.
They did not appear to be disagreeing then.
I don't think they were quarrelling. David
Smith, who worked in the lobster factory,
walked with her two or three times at
night. She told me Alfred Cahill heard of
her walking with Smith. She told me
that there was only one that she cared any-
thing about. Last Thursday night she
went out for walk with Thomas Mayo.
She came in that evening about 9 1/2 o'clock.
On the Sunday evening I saw her last she
said she was going across to Mrs. Mc-
Wade's to see her servant girl—Cassie
Fitzgerald. I never saw her anything differ-
ent at one time or another. She was always
jolly and good humored. When she was
leaving I asked her to take a book to Miss
Mayo, I had borrowed. She said she
would. She took the book, and she said
she was going towards the westward. She
had been talking for some time before of
going out to Mr. Keeffe's in Rollo Bay, and
when she did not return, I thought that
she had gone out there. I talked with
Alfred Cahill last evening. He said it was
a pity about Miss Swallow being lost. She
was, he said, a nice girl. He did not think
any person would be bad enough to drown
her. He said they had lots of trouble at
their place now. He referred to his
brother being insane. I told him I was
subscribed to-day on the inquest. He said
I might say it was a good while since he
was walking with her. I said I will tell
the truth. He appeared to be about the same
as usual. I saw no difference.

ing last. I don't know what time exactly.
It was before sundown. She was going
down towards the beach. There was a
man with her. He was not over tall.
I think he wore a black hat. They were
talking to each other. She turned around
when passing and laughed, looking at me.
It was not Thomas Mayo that was with her.
I don't know who was with her. She was
dressed in black clothes—sque and dress.

MRS. ANNIE SWALLOW (sworn)—I am
stepmother of the deceased Sarah Swallow.
I saw Alfred Cahill only once. Sarah
Swallow told me that she and Alfred Cahill
were going to be married. That his people
were opposed to the match. That Alfred
was going to sell some land he had, and
that they would then go away. I don't
know of her keeping company with anyone
else. She told me she did not meet Cahill
anywhere in Fortune but at John Mc-
Kenzie's. She was always a very light-
hearted girl. She was never despondent.
I saw her last four weeks ago last Sunday.
She was in her usual spirits then. She was
at home then. I do not think that the
deceased drowned herself.

ALFRED CAHILL (sworn)—I knew Sarah
Swallow. Have known her for three or
four years. I saw her last, this evening
fortnight, down at Dr. Cox's. I saw her
there more than once—some five times. I
think I spoke to her three times while she
was at Dr. Cox's. I was in the habit of
walking round with her in the evenings—
since she was at Cox's. I only saw her
once for the last three or four months before
she came to Cox's. It was in Fortune, I
think, about the latter part of June, I drove
in the wagon with Sarah Swallow and a
Mrs. McLean. I knew nothing bad about
the girl, I found her decent and clever, I had
no improper connection with Sarah
Swallow. I do not know who had anything
to do with her. I took a drive to Bear River
last Sunday evening week. I think it was
four or five o'clock when I drove out to
Dennis Costello's. The last time I was in
Souris was Wednesday or Thursday evening
before that. I was not in Souris, Sunday
week at any time—day or night. I have a
brother, James, who is not sound in mind.
He took bad on Sunday week. He was out
at Costello's that Sunday also. He went
out alone, and fell in with Charles Mc-
Cluskey there. I understood they were at
McDougall's that night afterwards. It was
about ten o'clock when they came in to our
place. He was not in the habit, to my
knowledge, of keeping company with Sarah
Swallow. I only noticed that he was not
right about a month ago. I was not in to
Souris from Sunday until Wednesday
evening.

MARGARET McBETH, re-called, On Sun-
day week, Miss Sarah Swallow was in bed
at Dr. Cox's all the afternoon. She got up
between four and five. She did not go out
to walk that evening until about half-past
seven o'clock, which was the last time I saw
her. I don't remember when Sarah
Swallow walked with David Smith last. It
was on a Sunday. He went in the boat
from here last Friday week. Miss Swallow
had a black hat on that evening she was lost
—Sunday evening week.

MRS. ANNABELLA WILLIAMS, re-called,
The man that I saw in company with Sarah
Swallow on Sunday evening week, was not
the man now pointed out to me as Alfred
Cahill. I would not know David Smith or
James Cahill, but I saw this man, Alfred
Cahill before. The man I saw with Sarah
Swallow that evening, I never saw before.
I first heard of Sarah Swallow's death on
Wednesday the day she was found.

THOMAS W. MAYO (sworn.) I knew
Sarah Swallow, only since she came to Dr.
Cox's, about a month ago. I saw her last
on Sunday morning week on my way to
Church. She was at Dr. Cox's door, and
she curtsied as I passed. I never saw her
since then. I was alone at the time. That
Sunday afternoon I drove to Basin Head
in company with Neil McDonald. I came
back that evening between eight and nine
o'clock. The lights were not out in the
Church. I returned a wagon to Mr.
Carlton, that I had borrowed, and then
went home. My mother asked me who
would put out the lights in the Church, and
I said I would go up and put them out. I
walked a part of the way up to the Church,
but the lights were put out. I met a young
lady, and I walked up the street to the
eastward apiece, I met another young lady,
and came back with her to Dr. Cox's. I
remained there about three quarters of an
hour, and then went home. I only walked
with Sarah Swallow one evening alone. I
saw a Cahill with her once, the man I think
you point out. I saw David Smith with
Miss Swallow only twice I think. The
morning I saw her last she appeared to be
in her usual good humour. I never knew
of anything improper in the conduct or
conversation of Sarah Swallow.

The following verdict was returned:—
"That the deceased, Sarah Swallow, came
to her death by drowning, whether by acci-
dent or otherwise the jury do not find suffi-
cient evidence to determine."

The Secret of Beauty.
