A FARMER SPEAKS.

He Denounces The Pineau Government.

DEAR SIR,—We had much pleasure at the meeting at Wheatly River on Monday in hearing the Hon. Messieurs Wise, McLean and Shaw denouncing in such forcible terms the extravagance and rascality of the present Government. They showed the people plainly that if such men are allowed to rule, our Island will become utterly bankrupt. All its available resources have been shown, and the expenditures of the present party have far exceeded them.

Premier Faubusson tried to tell the people that it is quite right to borrow money for future generations to pay. Now, if that is not taxation without representation we want to know what it is? Who have they in the House to represent the children not yet born who will have to come into the world already cursed with the bondage of an unjust debt, that he and his colleagues have imposed on the people of this province? No, we want no more men holding such unjust ideas, elected to hold office in matters pertaining to the interests of the people; for all are concerned in this,—every man, woman and child living in this country, and those yet unborn.

This is a farming country, and why is it that so many men who take little or no interest in what concerns the majority of the electorate are elected to do the business of the people? Farmers, we look to you to rise to a man, and hurl from power those who have shown themselves to be so unworthy of the confidence which has been placed in them. You have fed and fattened those sharks, till now they want to make you as lean as the kine of Pharaoh's dream. We want farmers of Mr. Shaw's stamp who will take a lively interest in those things, and qualify to meet all their bold and audacious statements of untruth as he did at that meeting till they dare not come before an intelligent audience with such statements and till they learn that economy and honesty must be the ruling principles of the men that the farmers of this district want to represent them in Parliament.

Turn out the traitors who have promised prohibition and given license, have promised economy, and cursed us with debt, promised purity and have bribed and corrupted till the smell of the skunk has permeated the whole Dominion,—and I think they can smell it in the United States by this time.

Now, farmers, what are you going to do about all this? Are you going to allow such things to go on till your children and grand-children shall come into the world the bond slaves of a despotic Government? No, turn out, manfully, regardless of party, and tell to the world that the people of P. E. I. shall be free-born citizens and not serfs.

Turn these fellows out, and let them go back to their former mode of fleecing the public, which will be somewhat narrowed to most of them, and send men who by hard work and honesty will be more fitting to represent a country like ours.

Mr. Joseph Wise has been most unjustly deprived of his seat in the House, and certainly deserves the support of every just and honest man in preference to the other candidate.

DROWNING.—Thomas Perry, a young man about 20 years of age, and belonging to Summerside, lost his life by drowning in the Northumberland Straits at North Shore, about eight miles from Cape Tormentine, on Sunday, July 1st. He was engaged with others in moving out a raft of lumber, and was returning to shore. Perry had a companion in his boat, which was being raced with another boat. The sea was rough and Perry's boat swamped. Before the other boat could come to the rescue Perry had drowned. The other man, Chesley Burns, was caught in time. Perry's body was not recovered. Deceased was in the employ of Mr. P. G. Mahoney loading vessels.

Mr. Gilbert DesRoches, of Miscouche, was in the city yesterday and went west this morning.

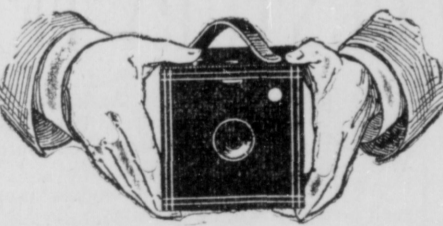
Mr. Barret Henderson went west this morning en route to Calgary.
