Yale Alcoholism and the Public Schools

Editorial review by Ernest Gordon on "Alcohol and Social Responsibility."

After repeal of National Prohibition, those responsible for repeal announced their next objective to be "the breaking of the stranglehold which the Drys have on the public schools."

When one thinks of the immense and brilliant literature on the subject, one can but be indignant that such a limited survey should be presented to the public and especially to the teaching profession by the Yale School.

It is hard to think of this textbook as misleading any person of sound and independent judgment, much less anyone with definite knowledge of the alcohol question in its scientific phases.

Dr. C. C. Morrison states of this book, "...millions of good citizens would rise up in wrath if their children were taught the harmfulness of moderate drinking. Yet in spite of blandly polite presentation is probably at the back of this book and of Yale alcohol literature in general."

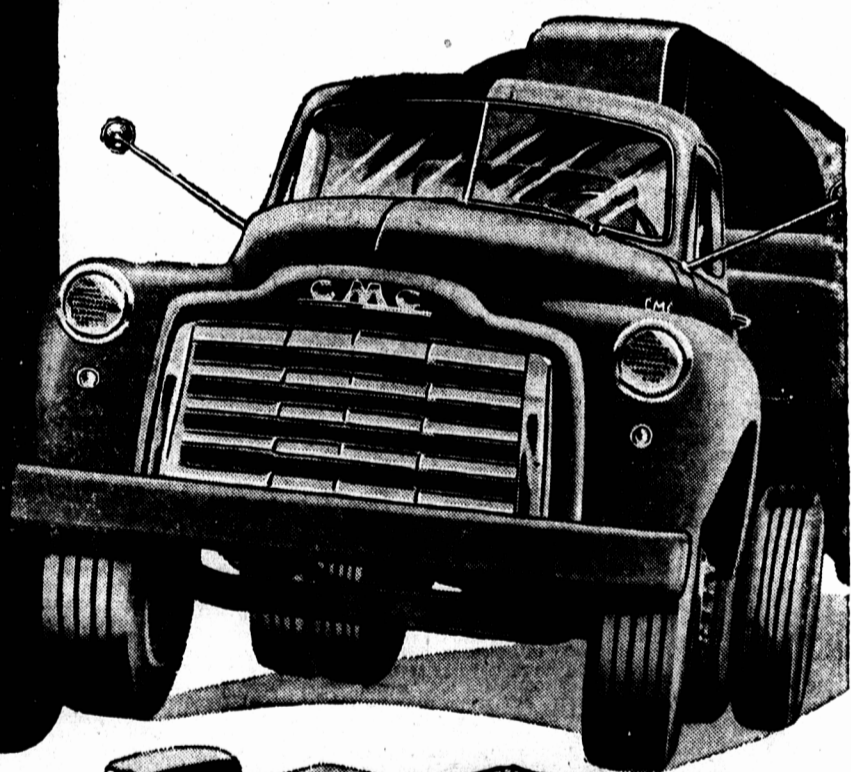
