Saints Turn Back Acadia to Garner First Victory

Staging a spectacular comeback in the second half, St. Dunstan's Varsity trounced Acadia Azeens 20-7 in an Atlantic Football Conference battle at S.D.U. field Saturday afternoon.

It was the first triumph for the local collegians this season. Saints looked anything but winners in the first portion of the contest and they were mildly fortunate to trail by only a 7-0 score as the half whistle sounded.

The Axemen widely outplayed the Red and White in those first 30 minutes and the Wolfville Collegians deserved a wider spread as they rested for the third and fourth quarters.

The Charlottetown scholars were equally as unimpressive in the early minutes of the third quarter but things started clicking when quarterback Fred Ripley hit Dick Tingley with a 20-yard pass. Saints suddenly caught fire and began moving steadily to Axemen's goal line.

Before the quarter was ended, Ed Bivens' boys had grabbed a 13-7 lead on a major by halfback Len Ellis and a convert by Perry.

Merrill hit halfback Holts with a 15 yard pass and then on the next play, Gilmore raced to the Saints' 25. Merrill took the ball on the following play and was finally stopped two yards from the goal line. A terrific tackle by Jim Griffith gave Saints possession and pulled them out of a bad situation.
