## Music Festival Dates Announced For 1960

**MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN**  
At a well attended executive meeting of the Prince Edward Island Music Festival Association, held last night at Montague, the president, Gordon Bennett, announced the dates of the 1960 festival which are: Dancing and choral reading on March 31st, April 1st and 2nd, followed by the music section from April 25th to 30th.

Mr. Bennett also announced that plans were well advanced for the establishment of a central festival office at Charlottetown.

Several committee conveners reported on the work accomplished to date. The 1960 syllabus was distributed to members attending the meeting and will shortly be available to the public.

Mrs. L. C. Calbeck, in giving the report of the membership committee, paid tribute to the late Mrs. C. B. Matheson of Hunter River. Mrs. Matheson was a faithful and energetic member of the committee, and ever strove to promote the work of the festival. It was also noted with regret at the meeting, that Mr. and Mrs. John Harris were leaving the province for Peterborough, Ont.

Mr. and Mrs. Harris were ever ready to assist when called upon. The illness of Miss Lillian MacKenzie and Mrs. Raoul Raymond, prominent music teachers, was mentioned and best wishes were expressed for their early recovery.

Following the meeting lunch was served by the Montague ladies.

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the velocity of water passing through it carrying large ice formations which would collide with the bridge structure, presents a problem in the design of the piers.

"The construction of a berm protective ledge on each side of the causeway on which an ice barrier would form providing additional protection is being considered to safeguard the causeway itself from ice damage.

Other ice problems concern the building up of ice on a bridge section as a result of a freezing spray and the effects of changed ice conditions on navigation.

4. "The department of fisheries is studying the problems that would be raised for the fishing industry as a result of causeway construction. This involves consideration of the migration of fish throughout the whole of the Maritimes, changes in water depth and temperatures which could affect salmon, lobster and possibly shellfish, and the effects on the fishing industry of changes in shoreline erosion.

5. Navigation through the causeway is required for large ships, as well as for smaller craft, navigation problems would be created by the tide differential forcing water

through the gap at high velocity. In view of this, consideration of being given to a navigation lock, and possibly a lock for small fishing craft.

"The five points referred to above are just some of the examples of the difficulties involved on which full information is not yet available. For each proposal, the data obtained has different applications: Arrangements have been made to collect additional data on which a sound decision can be made on the points now in question.

"For these obvious reasons a complete study of this project is taking longer than was heretofore anticipated," the report concluded.

### Traffic Figures Show Decrease

A decrease in passenger, auto and truck traffic for the month of November compared to the same month last year was noted in figures released by Northumberland Ferries Limited. Passengers were down by 1977, autos by 639 and trucks by 206.

However an increase was shown in passenger and auto travel for the period May-November in comparison with the same period last year. Passengers were up 4300 and autos up 2512. There was a decrease of 74 in trucks ferried.

## One Slightly Cut In Head-On Crash

Two cars collided nearly head-on early last evening on the Trans-Canada Highway about a 100 yards east of the Hillsboro Bridge.

A Parkdale man, George Wilson reported to have been the driver of one of the cars involved, was taken to the P.E.I. Hospital but after receiving several stitches for cuts was allowed to leave.

The driver of the other car, said to have been travelling towards Charlottetown, is reported to have been Jack Amear of Montague. He was unhurt.

The Montague car was a 1958 Buick while the other car was a 1954 Buick.

Both cars were badly damaged as they collided on the left front and side. The highway at this point, is nearly straight.

Crash debris littered the highway and traffic was delayed for a short time until the wreckage was removed by towing trucks. The Charlottetown detachment of the RCMP investigated the collision.

## Store, House Lost In Blaze

MacLean Brothers' General Store, North Wiltshire, one of the province's oldest business stands, was destroyed by fire Thursday morning.

An adjoining residential building, lived-in by store operator Morrison MacLean, his wife and five children, and Mr. and Mrs. Gordon MacLean was also destroyed in the blaze.

Fire losses were heavy. Clothing, household appliances, furnishings, and personal belongings of both families were lost in addition to the store. No estimate has been made yet on the amount of the loss.

It is not known as yet how the fire started. Fire fighting equipment from New Glasgow was called in to fight the blaze.

A long-time landmark in the area, MacLean Brothers store was originated by John and Murdoch MacLean and carried on by members of their family after their death.

Priced at four cents a copy, the first edition of the paper had a press run of 800 copies but "we hope to build it up to 8,000 or 9,000 some day," Ian Burnett said Thursday night.

Carrying mostly local news, the paper is printed in Guelph by the offset process and has a staff of seven.

## Weight Limit For Bridge Is Clarified

Weight restrictions on the old Hillsboro Bridge will not apply in emergencies, Hon. Philip Matheson, minister of highways, said yesterday. The department plans to issue special permits for emergency traffic such as fire engines or departmental snowplows.

The present weight limit of 9,000 pounds for vehicles is approximately the weight of an unloaded gravel truck, Gordon White, deputy minister, said today. This means that such gravel trucks may cross the bridge unloaded, but must drive around when loaded.
