

Thibeau's "Confession."

HIS ACCOUNT OF HOW CHARLOTTE HILL CAME TO HER DEATH.

A Annapolis correspondent of the Halifax Herald says that Thibeau has told three or four people that he took the girl from home with the intention of conveying her to Liverpool and sending her away, so as to get rid of her; that he took money with him to give her for that purpose; that they stopped at the Meadow Road and built on a fire for the purpose of feeding the horse and lurching, and that the girl was very troublesome while there. She ran off, he says, and he had to go after her and bring her back; and finally, when he was away from the fire she threw herself on it. He pulled her off, and she threw herself on again, and was dead or nearly so when he got her off. Then he piled stones over her for the purpose of concealing the remains, and the clothes which he had torn off her in endeavouring to save her life. She gave two or three loud screeches, he adds. He garnished his story, according to one of his interviewers, by saying she poured a flask of liquor over her clothing before throwing herself upon the fire. He protests that he never intended to kill her, and that she was beyond recovery when he concluded to finish her and put her out of misery. He declares that she had often threatened to destroy herself, and did so at last.—It will be remembered that twenty-five dollars was found in the pocket of the coat he wore that day, which in a measure confirms what he says he intended to do on leaving home. The theory that he did not contemplate murder at first, but resorted to it in the Meadow Road, for some reason or other, as an afterthought, will find acceptance with those who consider Tebo too shrewd a man to have planned his bloody enterprise so clumsily.

The Latest Dominion News.

ST JOHN, Dec. 10.—Last night a colored man got caught in a cattle guard near Fairville, and his foot, which was hanging over the rail, was severed by a passing train. He was brought to the City Hospital, but before reaching it the other foot was frozen. He died to-day.

MONTREAL, Quebec, Dec. 8, 1880. An attempt was made to capture A. P. Brand, an American fugitive, who is stopping at Hemmingford, in this province, and to take him over the lines. Three men forcibly placed him in a sleigh and started for New York State, but the prisoner escaped before they succeeded in their object. Brand's antecedents are not known, but he says he is from Peru, N. Y., and has had some difficulty with the United States.

TORONTO, Dec. 5.—Some of the designs for the new Parliament buildings have been found to be quixotic, and others are what might be termed whimsical. The experts who were appointed to examine them and report, viz: Hon. Alex. Mackenzie and Messrs. W. G. Storm and R. A. Waite, of Buffalo, N. Y., have decided that the premiums of \$2,000, \$1,000 and \$500 shall be awarded as follows:—Gordon & Hellwell, Toronto; F. X. Berlinguet, Quebec, and David Ewart, Ottawa. The motto of first named was "Datur Dignior," of the second "Waterloo," of the third "Hox." The experts decided that they could not recommend the adoption of any of the designs, as none of them were worthy of the site; and half a million dollars was sufficient for the erection of suitable buildings.

QUEBEC, Dec. 9.—Only four parishes are heard from in the Montmorency election, giving 200 majority in favor of Valin, the Conservative, over Couture, Liberal. There are 5 parishes to hear from yet. We can't give the definite result before 10 o'clock. The returns have to be transmitted by signal across the river from the Island of Orleans. The general opinion is that Valin will be elected by a large majority.

JOLIETTE, Dec. 9.—McConville, Conservative, will probably have over 250 majority.

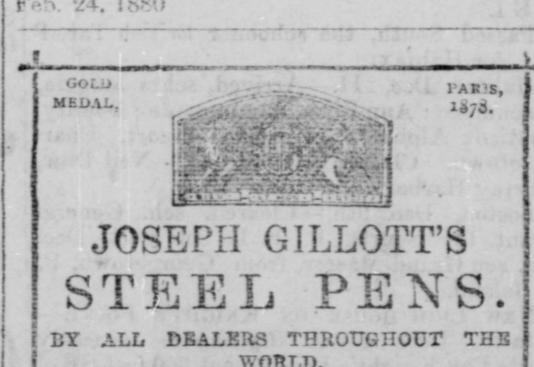
