SCADDING SUFFERS FROM "TRENCH FEET"

General Condition Of Patient Good And Amputation Not Being Considered At Present.

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, April 24—A sequel to the dramatic rescue of two men from the Moose River gold mine was in progress here tonight as doctors tried to ease the pain of Alfred Scadding, suffering from "trench feet" caused by his imprisonment for 242 hours underground.

Amputation was "not being considered at the present time," said Dr. H. K. MacDonald in reporting from the hospital. He added Scadding's general condition was "good."

Later tonight Major Stuart Graham, Canada's inspector of civil aviation, reached the hospital with special medical equipment for treatment of the patient. Flying through a sleet storm after leaving Montreal, Major Graham brought his plane down at Moncton and came to Halifax by car.

MINISTERS APPLAUDED

HALIFAX, April 24—Lieut.-Governor W. H. Covert paid his second visit to the Nova Scotia Legislature today to give royal assent to 30 acts passed by the House, and although he made no reference to the rescue of Dr. D. E. Robertson and Alfred Scadding from the Moose River gold mine, his actions spoke more eloquently than any words.

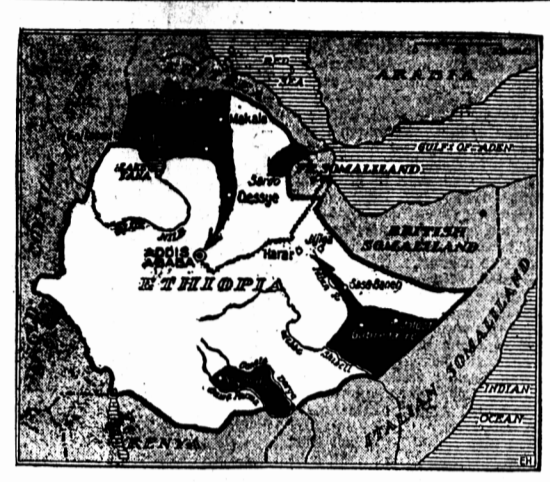

BANNISTER APPEAL IS DISMISSED

Newspapers Criticized In Judgment Handed Down By N. B. Supreme Court.

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) FREDERICTON, N. B., April 24—"The conviction must be affirmed and the appeal dismissed," said the judgment handed down today by the appellate division of the New Brunswick Supreme Court in the appeal of Arthur Bannister, condemned to hang on June 20 with his brother, Daniel, for the murder of Philip Lake.

"The learned trial judge told the jury it was murder or nothing. We think he was entirely right," said the full bench judgment read by Chief Justice J. B. M. Baxter. Defence counsel H. Murray Lambert has indicated he will file a notice of appeal in the case of Daniel but this has yet to be received by the registrar of the Supreme Court.

Reduced Fares Effective June 1

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, April 24.—Substantial reduction in railway passenger fares in Canada will become effective on June 1, it was announced today by C. P. Riddell, chairman of the Canadian Passenger Association. Basic fares for first class coach travel are being reduced approximately 13 per cent, bringing them approximately to pre-war level.

Daylight Saving Time In Effect This Weekend

Clocks will be moved forward an hour and daylight saving time will go into effect at midnight tonight (Saturday) in principal eastern cities. They will be moved back on Sept. 26.

Two Killed In Plane Crash

Rescued Men Recovering In Halifax Hospital

Dr. Robertson Makes Trip From Moose River By Plane—Tell Thrilling Story Of Experiences.

(By Ralph Morton, Canadian Press Staff Writer) (C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, April 24—Starvation and exposure during 10 days in the darkness of an underground cavern that claimed the life of their companion, Herman Magill, were behind Dr. D. E. Robertson and Alfred Scadding tonight as physicians attending the two Toronto men reported they were recovering "satisfactorily" in a Halifax hospital. Magill's body was placed on the Maritime Express today, to be taken to Toronto for burial.

The prominent Toronto physician was flown to Halifax by a Royal Canadian Air Force plane today and taken to the hospital which received Scadding on Thursday—the day the daredevil draggermen broke through to rescue them.

A bulletin issued by Dr. Ian Macdonald, attending physician, said "there is no cause for alarm over the condition of Dr. D. E. Robertson. No complications are evident." Scadding's general condition was reported "good" in a bulletin issued by Dr. H. K. MacDonald but "his feet are giving attending physicians considerable concern," the Halifax physician stated.

Awarded First Prize For Design

Ralston, Toronto architect, was awarded the first prize of \$500 in the Dominion Housing Act design competition, Finance Minister Charles Dunning announced today. Two second prizes of \$200 each were divided between John Fish, Montreal and Harold Greensides, Toronto. Two third prizes of \$100 each went to Arthur W. Davidson, Brockville, Ont., and W. F. Williams, Nelson, B.C.

King Edward Pays Surprise Visit

The contest was to encourage architects in the design of low-priced houses for the average homeowner which may be built at low cost and financed under the Dominion Housing Act plans. Dr. Robertson confirmed the belief held by his mine manager F. D. Henderson, that wisps of smoke seen by rescue workers Easter Monday were sent up by the imprisoned men as signals to the outside world that the three men still lived. For five days they walked the underground tunnels of the gold mine, hope of rescue diminishing as time passed and no rescue appeared. On Saturday afternoon the diamond drill broke through and communication with the surface was made early Sunday morning. Food and supplies were sent down the narrow tube. Early Monday morning Magill died from pneumonia in the arms of the famous Toronto physician. Dr. Robertson's medical knowledge kept Scadding and himself alive until rescue was effected.
