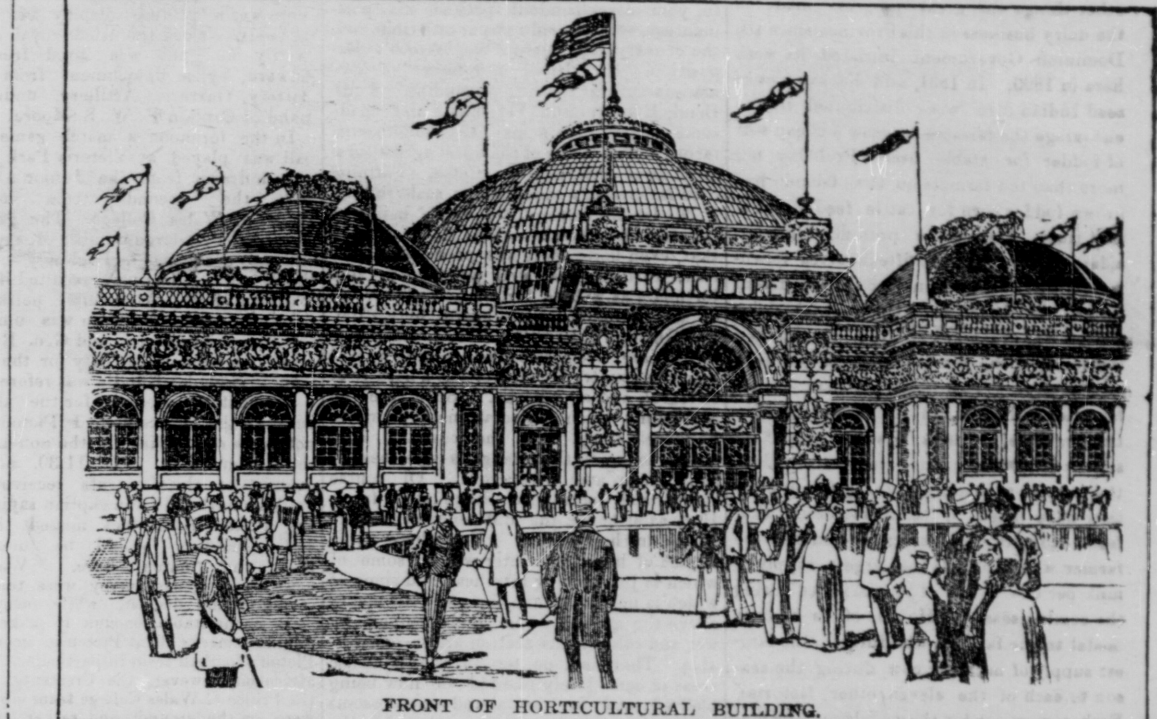

A Farmer Heard From

The fact is too evident that many of the country that our representatives, although in opposition, should enquire into the spending of the people's money by the heads of the departments, but now we find they have been ignored while in session, and the necessary material for deceptive replies is given to the editor of the Patriot when it is safe from the questions of the people's representatives. The fact is plain, Sir, if this manner of Government continues, the election of representatives is a farce. Peters, McLean and McMillan will be a triumvirate here, with Mr. Laird as semi-fictitious apologist.

A Great Railway Scheme.

ANOTHER TRANSCONTINENTAL LINE FOR THE DOMINION.

A Montreal despatch of the 21st says: The second biggest railway scheme exploited in Canada was consummated on Saturday by the organization of the Atlantic and Lake Superior Railway Co. The new line is in direct opposition to the Canadian Pacific Railway. At the meeting to-day the following officers were appointed:

President—Hon. J. R. Thibideau, President of Royal Electric Light Co.
First Vice-President—C. L. A. R. Chisholm, of New York.
Second Vice-President—Doctor Bergin, Conservative M. P. for Cornwall.
Secretary—Charles N. Armstrong.

The Board of Directors consists of the merchant princes of Canada, A. F. Gault, Montreal; R. R. McMillan, Conservative M. P. for Grenville, Montreal. The capital of the company is \$10,000,000, with power to issue debentures to the extent of \$20,000,000.

The route of the road is as follows: From the Canadian "Soo" to Ottawa, filling in uncompleted links of the Ottawa and Parry Sound railway; from Ottawa to Montreal over a new line for which a charter has been granted by Parliament or by acquiring one of the existing roads, notably the Canada Atlantic; at Montreal it is proposed to bridge the St. Lawrence at a cost of \$5,000,000, Montreal city being expected to grant a bonus of one million dollars. The road will terminate at Gaspe Basin on the Baie des Chateaux, the most eastern point of New Brunswick. A line of steamships will run from there to Europe. From the "Soo" to Duluth running rights have been acquired, and at Duluth the road will connect with either the Northern Pacific or the Great Northern, thus completing another trans-continental and trans-Atlantic route.

Green Goods Secrets Out

A SEIZURE AT BRIDGEPORT DISCLOSES SURPRISING FACTS.

A late Hartford, Conn., despatch says: Anthony Comstock has been revelling in the land of steady habits for the past few days, and the pastures have proved exceedingly fertile for the anti-vice agitator. In the first place he landed in New Haven and there got his name in the papers by running down a man who had been sending obscene postal cards through the mail. As if playing into his hands, fate ordained that just as he reached Bridgeport the greatest seizure of green goods ever made in that State occurred there. In the steamboat New Yorks cargo, which was being unloaded, there was a large box which was accidentally broken open as it was being carted off, revealing the complete outfit of an extensive green goods establishment. The man in charge of the store to which the goods were billed was arrested, taken to New Haven, and handed over to the superior court. He gave his name as Louis Stevens, and said he was the agent of Simpson & Reid, New York, the owners of the property seized. An examination of the property seized shows that the firm has for the past fifteen years carried on a business of mammoth proportions. Mr. Comstock says the seizure is the most important that has come under his notice. There were 24,000 circulars in each envelope, addressed to 80,000 individuals all over the country. One of the circulars gave eight fictitious addresses to which money or telegrams could be sent. One of these addresses was 304 Morris Avenue, Elizabeth, N. J. The swindlers have no office there, but get telegrams so addressed in some way through the Western Union. During the last six weeks similar circulars have been deposited in lots of 6,000 to 8,000 in the New York post office, and in large quantities in a number of Western States. The envelopes are sealed, and they must be forwarded to the post office designated, notwithstanding the absolute prohibition by the United States postal laws. Last December the gang was operating in Jersey city. Mr. Comstock says he was instrumental in breaking up their workings there. He says he was still on their trail when they shipped all their stock in trade by boat. Besides the circulars the seizure included the entry books, "tastering" books, and what is perhaps most interesting, a complete list of the victims who have been swindled by the gang since April 1. A single instance will show how the profits of the swindlers are distributed: George Vicker, of Mitchell, Ont., was "roped" by Frenchy and Oliver, two "ropers" in' of the gang, and they got \$300 out of him. This was divided as follows: "Joint," place where operations are carried on, \$15; "steerer," \$15; "outlook," who guarded against police interference, \$10. The balance, \$260, was divided \$150 to the persons who sent out the circulars and are instrumental in "roping" in the victims. The boss pays for the circulars, envelopes and stamps, and those who send out the circulars secure addresses and attend to the mailing. Since April 1 the gang has secured 110 victims, who have been fleeced out of \$40,185. If the gang had as good business every month they would clear nearly half a million dollars a year. A list of victims which is published in memoranda showing the steerer's name (in all cases nick-names were used) and the members of the gang sharing in the spoils.

At Park Corner, on May 16th, after a short illness, Mr. Cuthbert Montgomery, youngest son of Senator Montgomery, aged 38 years. He leaves a wife and infant son to mourn their irreparable loss. The deceased was highly respected by all his acquaintances. From boyhood—for about 24 years—he belonged to the Temperance Society, and was known in the community as a man of sterling integrity, kind disposition and consistent Christian character.
