The demand for oysters is good with prices holding up well.

**Five Years For Aiding In Armed Robbery**

SHERBROOKE, Que. (CP) — David Faith, 45-year-old Bramford, Ont., truck driver, was sentenced to five years in penitentiary today for participating in a \$17,639 armed robbery from the Julius Kayser plant here.

Sentence was passed by Mr. Justice William Mitchell. Douglas Howard of Sherbrooke, counsel for Faith, said the conviction and sentence probably will be appealed.

Faith was accused of hiring, counselling and aiding Walter Pilon and William Waring, both of Sherbrooke, to commit the holdup here last September, Pilon and Waring have already been sentenced to penitentiary terms.

and spirit into the production, and was indeed a major modern contribution to the art of the theatre. Speaking on the set and properties used, Mr. Wetmore suggested a more harmonious picture might have been contrived, and that costumes should, above all, fit the actors and actresses perfectly. Should they be uncomfortable they are apt to get in the way of the mood of the players wearing them, provoking a feeling of uncertainty and worry.

"It is these minor details," he said, "that remind the audience every once in a while that they are watching a performance by an amateur group."

"Diction is a great responsibility of the director and should be watched closely by the director," Mr. Wetmore continued, "and there should be unity of pronunciation, without localisms creeping in to bring the local of the play back to Prince Edward Island."

**LONG REMEMBERED**  
Taking the production as a whole, Mr. Wetmore termed it a most interesting production, and one which will be long remembered by all those fortunate enough to have been a part of the enrapt audience.

Maureen Beagen, in the title role, was commended by Mr. Wetmore for her visualization of a very difficult role, stating that although he had thought her a little cold at the outset, he soon found her developing the character of her part and bringing it to full fruition by the end of the play. He did say that he thought the vital scene between Antigone and Creon, as played by Arthur Seaman, did not quite come off, and wondered if this was because the players did not realize the sensitivity of the scene. He suggested they should work on this particular scene until it was brought to the point where the conflict was not so much between two people but between their feelings and beliefs.

Mr. Seaman, who had undertaken his role on only five days notice, brought a feeling of maturity to the exacting role of the King, but unfortunately sometimes slipped almost into a philosophic mood.

The ease with which Andrew MacDonald fitted the role of "Chorus" was commented on by Mr. Wetmore, who suggested that a spotlight on this particular character would have helped the actor

fill the part of the "commentator" even better.

Speaking on "Heamon," as played by John Stevens, Mr. Wetmore said the actor had a sincere understanding of the part, and would have enjoyed the characterization even more if the actor would find it possible to lower the pitch of his voice. "This could be accomplished," he said, "by consistent practice."

Marv Cameron was complimented on the feeling of hysteria she conveyed across the footlights in her role of "Ismene," but unfortunately sometimes confused loudness of voice with emotion.

"Feel the age of your character," Mr. Wetmore said to the "Nurse" as played by Rosella Devine, and told this actress that if she gave it more emotion and watched her diction, she could ably fill the role referred to as "Mother Hen," and "Old Suddicor."

The adjudicator grouped the three guards together in his comments and stated he found them vigorous and vital. A little more variety could have been used in characteristics of the three, and they should look deep into the background of each for suggestions as to how each one could be a separate and individual personality. He found the first guard doing quite a satisfactory job in his role, but with a little tendency to wander, physically. These parts

were taken by Dick Noonan, Tom Grant and Patrick McQuillan. Mr. Wetmore said he found the "Messenger," as played by Richard Johnston, very enthusiastic, and suggested that this actor remember the rule which applies to all actors and actresses: "Think, visualize, then act." The part of the "Page" was taken by Louis Saint Maur, and the adjudicator was very agreeably impressed with the manner in which this young actor handled himself on the stage and spoke his lines.

Trophies and prizes will be awarded at the close of this evening's competition, and a capacity audience is expected to be on hand when the curtain is raised at 8:15.

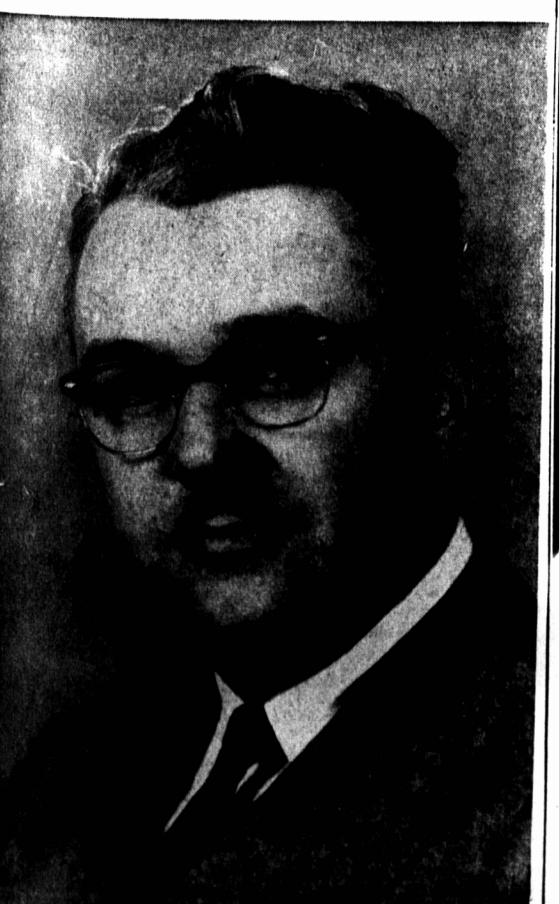
