WINNIPEG, Jan. 19 - (CP) - Trade increased briskly toward the close in today's Winnipeg Grain Exchange action with prices generally moving ahead and flax posting seasonal highs.

Influencing the advance was the United States market trend. There was good commercial demand in barley with processors and exporters buying flax and some oats.

American account buying was noted in rye.

Class two wheat and I.W.A. prices a bushel rose 1-8 cent.

Overnight loadings of wheat for export included 700,000 bushels to India, 180,000 bushels to the United Kingdom, 100,000 bushels to Ireland and 40,000 bushels to Belgium.

Business Spotlight

Building hospitals is an expensive business, and all the more so in these times of rising costs.

For the bricks and mortar that go to make a centre for the relief of suffering and the building of health are subject to the same economic laws as those that go into an amusement place.

This was learned well by the Hospital for Sick Children, located on Toronto's broad University Avenue but a national institution because the money for it came from all parts of Canada.

When the sod was broken in November, 1947, it was estimated that it would cost \$7,500,000; when it was officially opened yesterday the indicated final cost was more than \$12,000,000. The approximate \$4,000,000 was added through increased material and labor costs, and a slight expansion of plant.

The completed building has 16 acres, can accommodate 632 patients, and has an out-patient department of 30,000 square feet capable of handling 125,000 patients a year. Transfer of sick children from the crowded building occupied since

Island Odds And Ends

Ten thousand bags of potatoes are being loaded on a steamer at Souris this weekend, and next week another ship will take on a large cargo of spuds at Georgetown. This latter ship the S. S. Oddvar is presently discharging fertilizer at Charlottetown and will sail for Georgetown as soon as possible.

It is seldom indeed that shipping moves in and out of Prince Edward Island harbors at this time of year, and the unusual activity has port officials and old sailors thumbing the records for parallels.

Throughout last summer and autumn the M. F. Schurman Company, with several contracts under way in Charlottetown had three hundred to four hundred men on its payrolls. Most of the contracts were undertaken for business firms. This may be something of a record, at least for peace time. The Storms Construction Company employed about three hundred men building the Charlottetown Airport and training centre, during the last war.

The practically snowless winter thus far suits most folks, but is not accepted by others with much glee. Big snowstorms give work to many people for a few days at least, with the Canadian National Railway, the City of Charlottetown and a considerable number of local firms.

Another loser so long as the main highways remain open is the Canadian National Express. Private trucks move a great deal of express freight as long as the wheeling is good.

American headline writers, dependent for their pay-checks on sensationalism and the Hollywood touch have given such a build-up to Russia as a military power, that many of their gullible readers believe that "The West" is a push-over when Stalin wishes to march. But there are better informed people on both sides of the Atlantic, some of them writers who point out the chinks in the Iron Curtain. For instance, the Russian submarine fleet, not nearly as formidable as the German undersea fighters of World War II, and manned with inferior crews - the Russian is no sailor. Then Russian airpower, plenty of planes but not comparable in quality to the latest British, American and Canadian types.

Stalin of course has plenty of men, but he has also in Poland, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Bulgaria allies, whose populations are in some cases 90 per cent hostile to Communism, and ready-made for fifth column work, as soon as hostilities break out. Even within Russia itself resistance to the

regime still flourishes, especially in the Ukraine, and there was two million desertions to the Germans during the last war.

So far as the "A" bomb goes London's and Washington's intelligence departments seem to be agreed that the U. S. still enjoys a long lead both in quantity and destructive power.

Disregarding the hysteria of the American press and lending an ear to those who deal with facts rather than rubbish, Stalin is not without his troubles.

It has been said by more than one of our leading agriculturists that the Island must look to some other source than the potato crop for farm revenue, very soon. We raise lots of tubers but so do other provinces and states, and the market in Ontario and Quebec particularly seems to be closing. The farmers in Central Canada are now in a position to look after their provinces fairly well. Faced with somewhat similar situations other countries have successfully enrolled scientists to point the way out. No knowing what we could grow here, profitably, with research workers giving advice. It is said that Alberta has made great progress in agriculture under the direction and coaching of its agricultural scientists.
