

Centennial Y's Men Elect Officers At Annual Meeting

Says Liberals Using Scare Tactics On Lobster Fishermen

Fisheries Minister J. Angus MacLean told a Progressive Conservative Party meeting at Flat River, N.B., Tuesday night that the Liberals were trying to use "scare tactics" on P. E. I. lobster fishermen. He said the entire lobster supply for the North American continent comes from Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Newfoundland and the New England states "so we can more or less state our own terms." There was no reason to fear American retaliation.

Lobsters in the United States are a luxury item, "they just use simply can't get enough of them." His opponents must be getting stirrer desperate to resort to the old scare tactics.

The minister thanked the people of Fourteen Queens for their fine support in June and said he would do his best to increasingly state "so we can more or less state our own terms." There was no reason to fear American retaliation.

Canadian Stained Glass Window Unveiled In N.Y.

NEW YORK (CP) — A stained glass window designed and built by two Toronto artists as representative of Canadian life was unveiled Wednesday in Canada House, a new Fifth Avenue skyscraper.

The window, the work of Angus Macdonald and Elizabeth Bang, is the first example of a new method of making such windows developed by the two artists. It has been called the first important development in the art in several centuries.

The window, 16 feet by eight feet, forms the back wall of the lobby of the 26-storey building. It is illuminated from behind by banks of floodlights.

To make the window, Macdonald and Miss Bang cemented small shaped pieces of colored glass to a large sheet of clear glass.

Under previous methods the small pieces were joined with lead strips.

Then a third sheet of colored glass was cemented over the mosaic, giving an added brilliance to the colors.

The window took a year to make.

Its 40 panels incorporate trees, waterfalls, an Eskimo paddling a kayak, a totem pole, a lumberman, a miner, a ballet dancer, hockey player, orchestra leader, lake tanker, grain elevator, oil refinery and other designs.

Princess And Townsend Are Reunited

LONDON (CP) — Princess Margaret and Peter Townsend were reunited Wednesday over a three-hour tea.

The handsome, 43-year-old former RAF officer flew into London late this morning from Brussels after the 2½-year, self-imposed exile he began when Margaret put duty before love and announced she would not marry a divorced man.

At 4 p.m. — the traditional English tea time — Townsend stepped out of a chauffeur-driven car at the steps of Clarence House, Princess Margaret's stately residence on the Mall.

It was 6:50 p.m. before he ended his visit to Margaret and the Queen Mother. That gave Margaret only 50 minutes to dress and leave for an appearance at a premiere of the movie Farewell to Arms in the Haymarket.

Miners Return In 3 Collieries

NEW WATERFORD, N. S. — (CP) — Miners returned to work Wednesday in three area collieries pending the outcome of demands for Union brakemen on diesel engines used in hauling men and coal cars to and from the pits.

Dominion Coal Company's No. 16 mine stopped work March 19 after a miner died in a collision between a diesel engine and runaway string of coal cars. No. 12 stopped work Friday. No. 18 at nearby New Victoria followed Monday.

Brakemen were ordered on the diesels when miners are entering or leaving the pits by the provincial mines inspector in Cape Breton. United Mine Workers District 26 (Ind.) locals claim union men should get the jobs. The Unions also want underground first aid stations.

Tax Cut Discussed By Liberal At Winsloe Meeting

The immediate tax cuts proposed by the Liberals were the "drastic remedial action" needed to stimulate the national economy, Liberal candidate, Ernest D. Reid told a meeting of Queens electors at Winsloe last night.

The meeting was chaired by Mr. Lem MacKinnon, Highfield. Attendance was estimated in excess of 100.

Other speakers included: Hon. Eugene Cullen, provincial Minister of Agriculture, and Mr. J. O. C. Campbell, also a Liberal candidate for the Queens constituency.

Mr. Reid stated that the tax cuts proposed by Mr. Pearson was not proposed "simply as a vote catcher" but after "careful thought" by the best economists in the land. Even the United States is ready to copy this plan to meet a similar situation, he said.

Satellites Box Score

WASHINGTON (CP) — Facts on the five earth satellites launched to date:

1. Sputnik I: 184-pound sphere launched Oct. 4; fell back to earth in first week of January.
2. Sputnik II: 1,118-pound satellite, launched Nov. 3 with live dog aboard. Expected that satellite will die about April 15.
3. Explorer I: 30.8-pound satellite fired into orbit Jan. 31. Expected to last two to four years.
4. Vanguard I: Launched March 17; highest and fastest of the satellites; 3.4 pounds; may last up to 30 years.
5. Explorer III: Closely identical to Explorer I, although containing more advanced equipment.

War Prisoner Hid For 13 Years

TOKYO (Reuters) — A former Chinese prisoner of war in Japan said here Wednesday night he spent 13 years hiding in the mountains unaware the war was over.

Liu Lien Jen, 47, escaped from a prison camp to Japan's northern mountain range in 1945. A party of hunters found him Tuesday.

Liu, who reached Tokyo Wednesday on his way home to Communist China, told correspondents that the Japanese government should compensate him for the "material and spiritual sufferings" of his long years in hiding.

Quebec Port To Open Soon

QUEBEC (CP) — The port of Quebec is expected to open its 1958 shipping season in two weeks and the leading contender for the gold-headed cane is the American freighter Mormacmail.

The Mormacmail of the Moore-McCormack line is due here April 1 from Copenhagen. Last year the same vessel arrived April 1 and her skipper was presented the gold-headed cane for bringing in the first ship from an overseas port.

The Manchester Mariner, bound for Montreal from Britain, is expected to precede the Mormacmail by a day but will not be eligible for the cane as she is not scheduled to stop here.
