

MISCELLANEOUS NEWS.

THERE has recently been a further advance in the price of horseflesh—in the United States.

EX-STATE TREASURER JONES, of Georgia, is being sued for \$325,000, misappropriated by him when in office.

THIRTEEN million five hundred thousand gallons of lager beer were sold in New York city for the year ending May first.

Two handsome silver trowels, with ivory handles, are to be presented to the Marquis of Lorne and Princess Louise, on the occasion of their laying the corner-stone of the new Queen's College building, Kingston.

A POOLING arrangement has been agreed to between the Wabash & C. C. and I. Central Railroads, which terminates a five years' bitter quarrel, and ensures a dividend by January.

THE thermometer registered half a degree below freezing point last night; and there was white frost upon the ground this morning. In this city, vegetation does not seem to have been effected. We have not yet heard how the frost effected the country.

THE writer of a letter in the London Times points out that an ounce of bread wasted daily in each household in England and Wales means about 25,000,000 quarter leaves, the produce of 50,000 acres of wheat in a year; while an ounce a week of meat wasted amounts to some 300,000 sheep.

An adept in ocean travel urges those who fear sea-sickness to take a ten-grain blue pill the night before sailing, and a dose of citrate of magnesia the following morning. Then eat breakfast and go on board. He has followed this practice for several years, and been entirely free from qualms. All those who have imitated have been equally fortunate.

ON Sunday afternoon one of the patients in the small-pox hospital at Ottawa escaped and made a race down to the Rideau River, being followed by an attendant, who succeeded in capturing him just as he reached Cumming's bridge. The patient, who is a young man, had become delirious from his sufferings, and shouted as he ran down towards the bridge. His face presented a revolting appearance, being covered with large blotches.

A step toward alleviating one of the greatest annoyances of travelling has been made in the invention of a device for preventing the discharge of steam, consisting substantially in discharging the steam through a small chamber filled with glass or metal beads. The beads are from a 1.4 to 5-16 of an inch in diameter, held in place by copper gratings, and, in finding its way through the tortuous passage they afford, the steam escapes quietly and freely, but with little back pressure.

HENRY WARD BEECHER, who will accompany the Brooklyn regiment, as its Chaplain to Montreal this week, to take part in the celebration of the Queen's Birthday, was last Sunday announced to preach next Sunday morning in the St. James' Street Methodist Church, Montreal. The minister making the announcement warned the weak members of the congregation liable to fainting fits to absent themselves on the occasion. It is not very probable, however, that there will be many absentees, though the caution was a wise one.

MINING IN NEWFOUNDLAND.—Mr. Ellershausen commenced operations in Bett's Cove in 1874. In four years he raised 102,400 tons of copper ore, value £512,000 or \$2,248,000; and in the last two years he paid in wages \$409,600. Tilt Cove Mine, owned by Messrs. Bennet and McKay, was opened in 1864. In twelve years the value of the ore shipped from this mine was £223,840. Very rich deposits have recently been discovered at Tilt Cove, while the old workings show no signs of exhaustion.

It is stated in Ottawa, in well-informed circles, that Sir John A. McDonald, Hon. Dr. Tupper and Hon. Mr. Tilley are all expected to visit England during the coming summer. Sir John goes home to be sworn in of Her Majesty's Privy Council, and it is even hinted that some further honors will be conferred on him. Hon. Dr. Tupper goes home in connection with the Pacific Railway policy, and Mr. Tilley in reference to the Dominion finances. It is said that Dr. Tupper will leave at an early day, but nothing definite on the subject is known.

A poor Hungarian lately showed a black pearl to a Pesh jeweler, and begged him to value it and give him what he could for it. He was told that the pearl was of great value, and that he had better take it to Biederman or Vienna, which he did, and was naturally asked where he had obtained possession of such a rarity. The Hungarian answered that he had got it from the valet of the late Count Louis Bathanyani. It turned out that it was one of three black pearls which, more than 150 years ago, were stolen from the English crown, and which were for a long time vainly sought for, it being at that time supposed that these were the only three black pearls in existence. The British Government has bought the black pearl for \$8,000.
