### Precious Roots Protected From Winter's Icy Breath

"There's the rift of the sunrise!" we said to James, watching the dawn break over the hills of the morning. So good it is to see the sun brighten these short fall days. It lifts tenderly the faces of the flowering house-plants on the sills. And we think ourselves smilingly the bowls in which the housewives mix those frosty mixtures that provide a backlog for Christmas.

So this December day was sunny, bright and pleasantly cool. And clean underfoot for Alex when out about, where remain many interests to charm a small lad. Cat held under an arm, we saw him stand for some time looking in at the new nanny for an interval stabled, as Mack said today, "to get accustomed to the place," before she goes to join her new lord and master for months now pastured with the sheep.

Now that the cattle are stabled, excepting the few younglings loose-housed at another barn of the farms, our farmers' chores have increased. For them now there are the tidings of stables and sties to the fields. And in the spreading they see, as do we, the smiling crops that will grow in the wake of it—the purple clover, and above it the June — song of the bees; the bended plumes of grain, the lush grass of pasture for cow and sheep.

Because winter was hurrying them, counting away the days of grace with long cold fingers, an end of banking about this old house was completed today. This included on our account, the mounding of a precious climbing rose against a kitchen wall and the honey-suckle vine of last spring's planting, which grew amazingly well and gave us blossoms up to the frost of the fall-time.

Now that the wood fire crackles cheerily and the kettle sings its best tune, we remember one important item of the farmers' day: the purchase of more insurance, to give added protection in the event of the dread disaster of fire.

Fire is a dreadful master at

any time of year, but more particularly now to the farmer since all his livelihood is gathered to barn and stable and cellar about. "I don't carry any fire insurance," a visiting farmer said when James spoke of this today. "I know I should. But there are so many things we need, I haven't managed it yet."

James smiled. "I'd say," he offered, "folks can do better without other things than they could without a roof over their heads!" And sunshine was ours this second day of our workaday week and a clean bracing wind o' the west.

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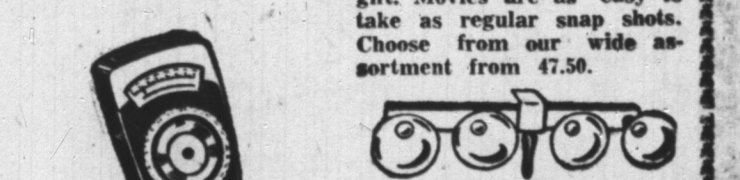
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## Marriage Vows Exchanged In Double Ring Ceremony
