THE STATE OF INDIANA scraped against the side of Howal Wharf last evening while docking, displacing several planks. REWARD OFFERED.—The Government offers a reward of \$1,000 for such information as will lead to "the discovery, apprehension and conviction" of the person or persons who set fire to the stables of W. D. Robertson and W. P. Colwell on the night of the 2nd July. The proclamation appears in the Royal Gazette, on this morning.

AQUATIC.—James A. Ten Eyck and George H. White has accepted. Joe Goddard, the Australian pugilist, defeated Joe Chyrenski of California, in four rounds for a purse of \$10,000 and the championship of Australia. The battle came off at Melbourne on Monday.

Tarte-McGreevy Investigation

An Important Witness

No Money Paid to Sir Hector or His Son.

Exposure of Gross Irregularities

On the Part of Inspectors and Contractors.

OTTAWA, July 22.

In the Tarte McGreevy inquiry yesterday Martin Connolly, bookkeeper for Larkin, Connolly & Co., was again examined. He swore that he never knew or heard of any moneys having been paid by the firm to Sir Hector Langevin or to his son. He admitted that moneys had been improperly paid to the inspectors of Quebec Harbor Commissioners who reported upon the firm's work. These sums, he said, were paid to the inspectors to get them to make false returns of the work done. The practice had been commenced by Murphy long before he was book keeper. He believed that Nicholas Connolly knew about the practice, but he had never spoken to him about it. He had taken receipts from the inspectors; but last summer, when the talk commenced, he destroyed the receipts and erased the entries from the books, so as to save the inspectors from trouble. Martin Connolly was then ordered to go through the books and make a statement of all such irregularities of payment.

THE PROPOSED TUNNEL

Borings Postponed Till Next Year.

OTTAWA, July 22.

Senator Howland and Mrs. Howland leave here for the Island to-day with some friends, but he will re-urn.

The mining engineers have reported that it is now too late to make tunnel borings this year owing to the advanced season. The work will require three months of good weather at the lowest calculation. So the Government has determined to abandon the borings for this year.
