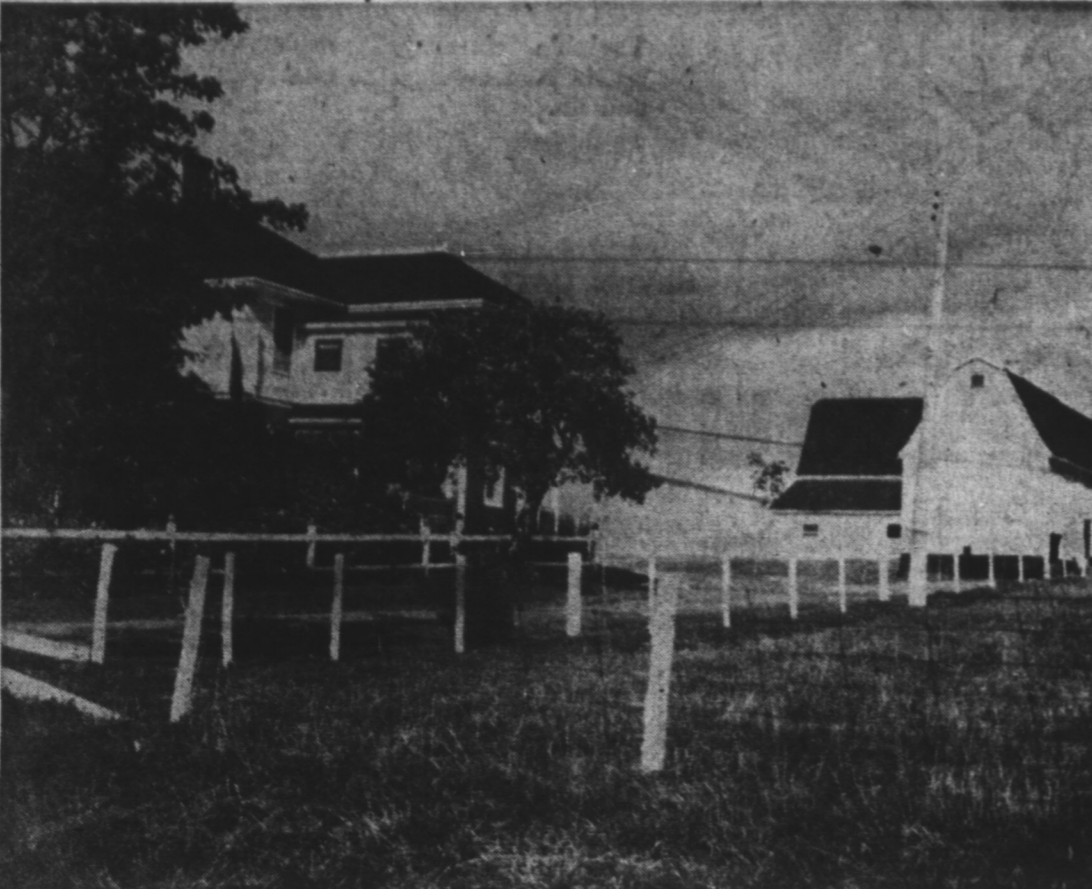
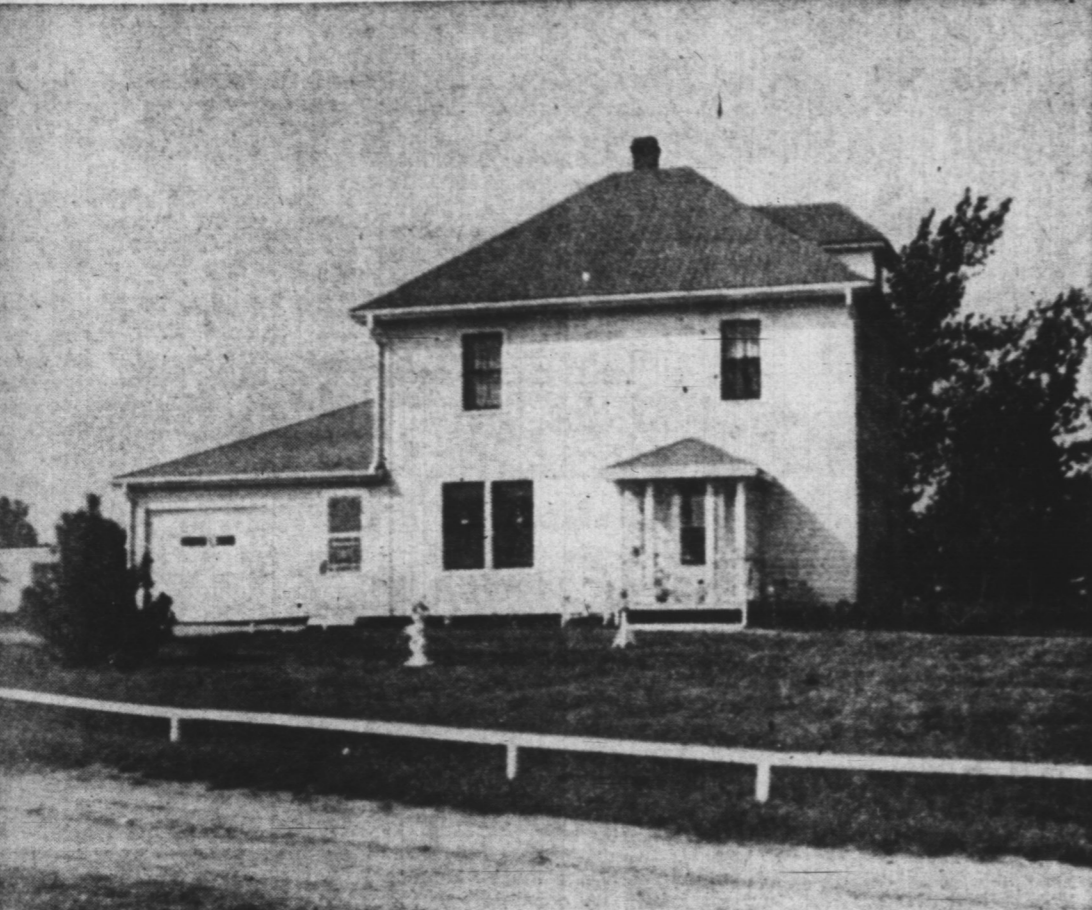


SOME RURAL BEAUTIFICATION WINNERS

Treatment Centre Expects No Change Under New Plan

While some changes will necessarily take place in the present Rehabilitation Centre under the provincial hospital insurance scheme, it is expected to be more in administration than in practice.

However, it is possible that the Centre will be included in the list of recognized hospitals under the insurance plan.

As such the principal change would be in its patient age limitation where 16 years is the maximum age at present. There would be no age limit under the plan.

However in practice this would make little difference, health authorities state, as the three principal hospitals on the Island, Prince County, Charlottetown and Prince Edward Island Hospitals, now have physiotherapy facilities, and it is expected they will continue to treat adults requiring such care.

The Rehabilitation Centre, located in the Provincial Sanatorium here, is primarily concerned with special treatment required by polio victims, and those suffering from tuberculosis of the bone.

Officials state the rehabilitation units in the three main hospitals are too new as yet to accurately forecast their full role in the future.

Madonna-Like Apparition Reviewed In Russian Press

WARSAW (AP)—The Communist press took notice for the first time Monday of reports that a madonna-like apparition has been seen atop St. Augustine Roman Catholic Church. The story has had Warsaw talking since last Wednesday.

The evening newspaper Express Wieszczony broke press silence on the biggest crowd attraction in Warsaw with a satirical article.

The newspaper suggested that the apparition was merely a reflection of light or a chemical reaction from the copper-covered steeple.

The apparition was first reported seen last Wednesday. The word spread quickly by grapevine. Thursday watchers saw nothing. But on Friday and Saturday people again claimed to have seen a luminous madonna-like figure on top of the steeple.

Descriptions vary. Some said they could see a face and outstretched arms. Others said they saw only a vague luminous form surmounted by a brighter light that might be a halo or crown.

The largest crowd, estimated in the tens of thousands, assembled Sunday night. Police patrolled the area and restricted the number of persons permitted in the street in front of the church. As those drifted away, more people from behind the barriers were allowed to enter.

Whether the phenomenon was seen then was disputed. Some people claimed they saw it for a short time. Others said what they saw was an eerie reflection of light from the copper peak and golden ball of the steeple.

Those who claimed to have seen the luminous figure on Saturday said it was much clearer. The waiting crowds Monday night were smaller. It rained all day.

CLAIM SKEPTICISM

Express Wieszczony claimed the majority of the people viewed the apparition with skepticism from the beginning. Then it added:

"But unfortunately everyone did not have sound reasoning at his disposal. Fanatical women started an attack. . . . The story spread throughout the town and ubiquitous rumor did its job. . . ."

Property owners L. MacKinnon and R.H. Duvar said they had objected to the plan to Mr. Storey. All owners present said they had not agreed to the plan with Mrs. MacKinnon saying "we were not even asked about this \$600 tax."

PASTURE LAND

Mr. Peake pointed out that at present the large areas of land lying idle were taxed only as pastureland and said if lots were sold the city would collect more in taxes from one single lot owner than it was now receiving on the entire property.

Mr. MacKinnon and Jack Smallwood remarked that this development had been necessary for years but other city councils had just stalled. Mr. MacKinnon also said he had told councillors that if the development were not done the big building program necessary in any expansion would continue to go out to Parkdale, and across Southport way and the city would be losing a tremendous revenue in taxes.

NOT FEASIBLE

Mr. Peake said the project would defeat itself in this way because with the heavy tax facing them the lots would stay idle and result in a heavy revenue loss to Charlottetown. He also questioned the correctness of the figures quoted by Mr. Storey and said he would disagree with the quoted cost of \$1,295 per lot. He also seriously doubted that if the city paid for it as it did in other sections of the city that a tax increase would be anywhere near the figure mentioned by Mr. Storey. The former commission chairman had said last week he feared city taxes would have to be increased by one-third.

Other property owners in the area attending the meeting included D.M. Gass and F.A.S. Jones while George Johnson, unavoidably absent, had authorized another of those present to present his views which were in agreement with those stated.

A & B Lamb Grades Pay

"Farmers who have market lambs for sale are urged in their own interest, to take every precaution to have them fall within the A and B grades, dressed weight, of from 35 to 51 pounds," says J. Lincoln Dewar, secretary of the P.E.I. Federation of Agriculture. These are the grades on which the government floor price applies.

Lambs under or over these weights are subject to quite heavy discounts, explains Mr. Dewar. The desirable weights will be approximately from 80 to 100 pounds.

"It will mean real money to the lamb producer," adds Mr. Dewar, "to get his product into the desired grade."

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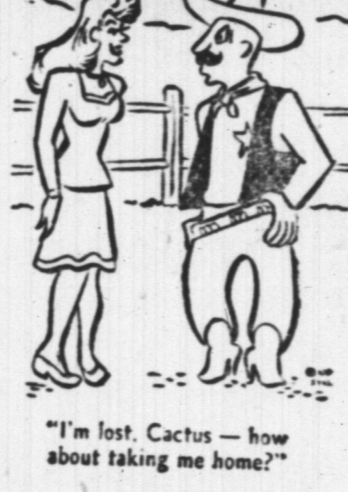

CLC Probes Problem Of Yank Labor Curbs

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian Labor Congress is cautiously exploring the possible Canadian effects of new United States legislation putting clamps on labor leaders.

Whether the congressional legislation can stretch across the border in the case of international unions is a point which the congress leaders want to take up with the Canadian government.

Congress officials said Thursday they are trying to get a meeting lined up with Justice Minister Fulton for an interpretation of the U.S. law as it might apply to Canadian branches of U.S.-based international unions.

The meeting was expected to be held next week. Meanwhile, the congress has not been dealing either with the external affairs department or Labor Minister Starr.
