

Beach Point Man Burns To Death

Charles Hampton Osborne, 26, of Beach Point, P.E.I., was burned to death early Sunday morning in his trailer home. He had recently moved the trailer and parked it adjacent to the home of his brother John with whom he was engaged in lobster fishing.

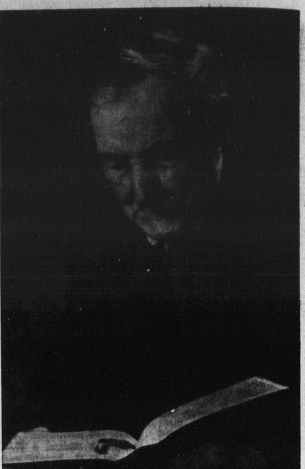
Mr. and Mrs. Osborne discovered the fire about 3 o'clock Sunday morning when they heard what they thought at first was a car door being closed, but on investigation found the trailer about three-quarters demolished by flames.

The Montague detachment RCMP and coroner, Dr. G.S.A. Inman were called on and investigation the coroner decided that an inquest was not necessary.

The fire is thought to have started from an overheated oil stove, which may have exploded. He leaves to mourn his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Osborne now living in Nanaimo, B.C., as well as the following brothers and sisters: John "Buddy" whose home trailer home was parked at Beach Point; Reginald, and Joseph, both at Beach Point; Ira, Port Elgin, Ont.; Grace, Mrs. Ralph Gougan of Toronto; Rala, Mrs. Jack Watts of Suffolk; Patsy, Linda and Trudy, all with their parents at Nanaimo.

Funeral arrangements had not been completed last night.

North Side Reports Lobster Gear Damage

SOURIS — It was reported last night that the heavy windstorm of Friday night resulted in extensive damage to lobster gear, particularly in the North Lake and Naufrage areas. Along the east coast of the province no reports of damage were received, due to the waters of that section being protected by the lee of the land.

In some cases damage to traps and lines was said to run anywhere from 10 to 40 per cent in the Naufrage district, and slightly higher at North Lake. Some lobstermen in the latter area reported that some of their gear was discovered washed up on the beach.

In both of these localities few if any traps were hauled resulting in little more than a total of a few hundred pounds of

broken all boats being landed. In Souris, two fishermen were reported to have brought in catches ranging slightly over 600 pounds each. Both men reported that their hauls were good. This one-pounce average has been approximately the daily take since the season started last Tuesday.

Where the lobstermen are reporting damage is a small haul, the picture for the dragger fishermen is quite different, with two draggers returning to Souris with substantial catches. On Friday the dragger North Bay, arrived in port with approximately 33,000 pounds, the majority of which was ood. As a result the Usen Fisheries packing plant swung into full operation Saturday.

Late Saturday the second dragger, the Donald and Eugene, tied up at her berth, and commenced discharging some 80,000 pounds for the Eastern Packing Company, which plans to get into full production at P.M. today.
