THE M. A. STARR.—The steamer M. A. Starr, Captain Ferguson, arrived from Halifax via intermediate ports about half-past two o'clock yesterday afternoon. She brought the usual general cargo and one passenger and sailed on return at midnight.

THREE CAPTIVES.—An Indian at Mitchell's River, near Cardigan, trapped two black foxes last week. He sold the skins in town for a large sum, and returned home and took out himself a wife. The Indians at that locality will now-wow until the cash runs out.

SHIPPED BY RAIL FROM SOUBIS.—During the month of October the following goods were shipped by rail from Souris:—334 cases lobsters, 208 do. eggs, 992 barrels potatoes, 24 do. herring, 1,081 do. macaroni, against 218 barrels shipped in October of last year, 6,080 lbs. codfish.

NEW MANSE.—A new manse is being built at Montague Bridge for the Rev. Mr. Spencer Freestonian minister at that place. The building is very pretty and substantial, and will be completed in about a fortnight's time. Mr. D. G. Cameron, of Commercial Cross, is the contractor, and the builder is Mr. Taylor, of Montague.

A NEW DEPARTURE.—Among the cargo of the steamer St. Lawrence, which arrived from Pictou on Sunday afternoon, were seventy-five carcasses of beef for A. L. Bridges & Co. The cattle were killed and dressed at Pictou Landing by Mr. Bridges and two assistants between five o'clock on Thursday evening and three o'clock on Saturday morning.

MISSIONARY MEETING.—The annual missionary meeting will be held this evening in the Second Methodist Church, to commence at 7.30. Addresses will be delivered by the Rev. Robert Wilson, President of the Conference, and the Rev. Y. Hiraiva, of Japan, who will appear in Japanese costume. A collection will be taken in behalf of the missionary fund.

SOMETHING NEW.—We write to-day shown a very nice specimen of an engraved coffee-plate. We understand that the plate had previously been painted but the paint had come off. NEW BAKERY.—Mr. Wm. Knight, late of the firm of Knight & Son, Ch'town, P. E. I., is opening a bakery in Moncton, near the corner of St. George and Botsford streets. Mr. Knight has purchased the Walker property, and the buildings have been moved into position, and he has commenced the erection of a bakery and shop, and expects to open in about three weeks.—Transcript.

DEATH OF MRS. CAPTAIN FRASER.—We regret to learn of the death of the wife of Captain Robert Fraser, of the S. S. Coban, which sad event occurred at her residence, Prince Street, this morning, at nine o'clock. Mrs. Fraser had been ill since August last. Captain Fraser, who is now en route to Sydney, C. B., from St. John's, Newfoundland, has been telegraphed for, but will probably not arrive in time for the funeral.

STIPENDIARY MAGISTRATE'S COURT.—Yesterday morning, a young man for being drunk and fighting on the streets was held over one week for evidence, and a disorderly was dismissed. The defendant in the larceny case referred to on Saturday, failed to connect, and his bail was ordered to be estreated. This morning four Scott Act cases constituted the docket. One defendant was convicted and fined \$50 and the other three were held over for further evidence.

AN ISLANDER ABT O D

Captain Warren's Complaint.

OTTAWA, Nov. 7. Capt. Warren, who has been nearly ruined by the American system of piracy in Behring Sea, is here for the purpose of bringing his claims to the notice of the Government. Capt. Warren is a native of Prince Edward Island, and has been for thirty years engaged in the fishery trade on the Pacific coast. He is the owner of five of the seized sealers, and estimates his loss at \$150,000. He states that four of the five vessels were steamers, and that the boilers are now useless owing to the neglect of the United States officials, and it is therefore impossible to remove the vessels, even if they should be released.

The Agitation in Ireland.

DUBLIN, Nov. 7. Eight thousand persons assembled in front of Tullamore Jail last evening, accompanied by bands playing God Save Ireland. O'Brien appeared at the window and waved his handkerchief. On motion of Thomas Sexton, M. P., the city corporation adjourned to-day without the transaction of business as a mark of respect for O'Brien. Sexton said he was horrified by the reports of the barbarous treatment of O'Brien in jail. The Government tried to break O'Brien's gallant spirit, and failing in that are determined to take his life. Pyne, member for West Waterford, has decided not to answer the summons served upon him under the Crimes Act.

Chamberlain Arrives.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7. Mr. Chamberlain arrived to-day. He was taken from the steamer at quarantine by the revenue cutter and landed at the Barge Office. He was received by Wm. Lane Bocker, British Consul-General and Wm. Smith, Deputy-Minister of Marine, of Canada. He would say nothing about home politics. He said he would not commit himself on the Irish question while in America. He saw no reason why the Fisheries Question might not be speedily and satisfactorily settled. He intends to spend a couple of months studying American Institutions before returning home.

Pugilistic.

LONDON, Nov. 7. John L. Sullivan arrived to-day. A crowd of 2,500 betting men, pugilists and roughs assembled at the railway station to welcome him. When the train arrived, a wild rush was made for the car Sullivan occupied. When Sullivan alighted he was presented with a bouquet tied with his ring colours and wildly cheered. He found great difficulty in escaping the mob. He was driven to the office of a sporting paper, on Fleet Street. The greeting there was also very enthusiastic.

Inter-Provincial Conference.

MONTREAL, Nov. 7. Premier Mercier states that the resolutions adopted at the recent Inter-Provincial Conference at Quebec will be published simultaneously in all the Provinces next Thursday.

Petition Withdrawn.

TORONTO, Nov. 7. The petition against the return of Mr. Dawson, Liberal Conservative M. P., for Algoma, has been withdrawn.

Judge Armour Promoted.

OTTAWA, Nov. 7. Judge Armour has been appointed Chief Justice of the Court of Queen's Bench of Ontario.

OTTAWA, Nov. 7. Arthur Audit, of the Quebec bar, has been appointed Registrar of the Exchequer Court.

TORONTO, Nov. 8—10 a.m. Fresh to strong south-west to west winds; fair weather, with local rains to-night.

Wrecked at East Point.

The schooner, owned by John Agnew, of Alberton, and commanded by Capt. William Ireland, loaded with potatoes and bound to Pictou, was wrecked on Saturday morning near East Point. She had come to anchor off the north side of the Point, but the wind suddenly changing an attempt was made to get her again under way, which proved unsuccessful, and she came bounding ashore, the crew saving their lives with difficulty. It is thought that she will prove a total wreck, which, along with the potatoes (28,000 bushels), is quite a serious loss at this season of the year.

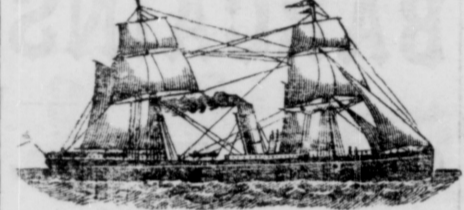

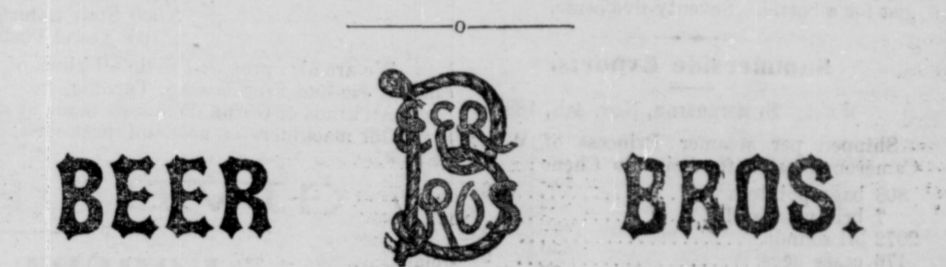
