### Macmillan May Resign After Scandal Dies Down

LONDON (Reuters) — Prime Minister Macmillan is expected to survive today's parliamentary showdown on the Profumo affair but probably will quit his post after the scandal dies down, according to political sources. The sources forecast Sunday that his successor as prime minister probably would be either Deputy Prime Minister R. A. Butler, 60, or Viscount Halifax, 65, the minister for science.

### Albertans Vote Today After Quiet Campaign

EDMONTON (CP) — After six weeks of quiet campaigning, Albertans vote today for a new legislature. The Social Credit government, headed by Premier E. C. Manning, seeks another five-year mandate on the Social Credit Credit took 61 of the 63 seats in the last general election.

There are 62 seats at stake today. Redistribution reduced the number of seats to 61 and one of these was filled two weeks ago when Agriculture Minister L. C. Hazlett was re-elected by acclamation in Taber-Warner.

The Social Credit party nominated candidates in all ridings. The NDP has a slate of 56 candidates. Liberals, Progressive Conservatives 33 and there are 18 other labels.

An estimate of 715,000 persons are eligible to vote compared with 606,678 in 1959. The turnout in the last election was 63.6 per cent, a figure not expected to be matched this time. Polls open at 9 a.m. MST (1 p.m. ADT) and close at 8 p.m. (midnight ADT).

CHARLOTTETOWN, N.B. (CP) — A Maritime Central Airlines DC-3 landed at this northern New Brunswick community Saturday to open officially Redoubt municipal airport and link by air for the first time the neighboring pulp and paper centres of Campbellton and Dalhousie with the rest of New Brunswick.

MCA, to be merged with Eastern Provincial Airlines of St. John's, Nfld., will operate three times weekly through the \$100,000 airport on its Moncton to Sept-Isles, Que., route. Charlo is about 150 miles northwest of Moncton.

## Man in Cosmosaut Show Jubilation

MOSCOW (AP) — The world's first woman cosmonaut, a dark-eyed blond named Valentina, and her Russian comrade-in-space spun around earth in their separate spacecrafts today toward a possible link-up in orbit.

As the astronauts dropped off to sleep Soviet officials were silent on whether they might attempt a rendezvous in space. It seemed unlikely, however, since Valentina Tereshkova—sent into orbit Sunday—is not trained pilot and might not be able to carry out her part in complicated manually controlled link-up maneuver.

There was no official indication on precisely how close their ships are to each other but officials said both spacecraft had lost a little altitude.

At the same time rumors—not taken too seriously—circulated in Moscow that a third Soviet cosmonaut might be sent to join them.

The Soviet Union shot Miss Tereshkova, a pretty 26-year-old former pilot, to a worker aloft at 12:30 p.m. (6:30 a.m. ADT) Sunday. Lt. Col. Valery Bykovsky, already in orbit, was rocketed into space Friday.

### Private Yank Comment Praises Space Effort

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — U.S. space agency personnel had no official comment on the orbital flight of a Russian woman Sunday but privately they applauded the Soviet space achievement.

Most felt that the woman cosmonaut, Valentina Tereshkova, would try to hook up her Vosk VI spacecraft with the Vosk V vehicle which Lt. Col. Valery Bykovsky rode into orbit Friday.

Several U.S. astronauts were here for a party honoring Gordon Cooper's 34-hour flight last month but they withheld any comment on the Soviet Union's latest twin flight.

If the man and woman cosmonauts link their ships in space, the Russians will accomplish what is the next big goal in the U.S. man-in-space program. It will be at least 1965 before the United States attempts to join a two-man general space craft with an unmanned satellite.

The official connected with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's manned space flight program commented that, while the U.S. generally has rejected for the present the role of women in space, "Prokopski obviously realized the possibility value of putting up the first girl astronaut."

### Russia Denies Ivanov Involved

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union broke its silence Sunday on charges of a Russian role in Britain's Profumo-Keeler scandal. It denied that its former naval attaché in London was involved in the affair which has shaken the British government.

The Tass statement was issued after the Soviet ambassador to Britain, Alexander Solodov, flew to Moscow Friday, apparently for consultations about the case.
