

# NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

## CANADIAN.

MONTRÉAL, Sept. 27.

This afternoon at 4.40, amid the reports of torpedoes, which had been placed along the railway line to the number of 200 or so, the train bearing Sir John Macdonald, Hon. Mr. Chapleau and Mr. Vallee, M. P. for Port Neuf, arrived at the Hotel de la Gare. Many political friends from the city were present to tender their greetings, including the Montreal members and Thos. White, M. P., Mr. Mosseau, M. P., Rufus Stephenson, M. P., DeComos, M. P., P. Fortin, M. P., Hon. F. X. Trudel and others. Sir John was presented with an address by the Jacques Cartier Club. In reply he said he could not go into details of his visit, but they would be first presented to the House. He had made arrangements in the Old Country to build the road, and its construction would divert emigration from the United States to Canada. They had also arranged for running the road eighteen years after it was completed. The result would be a continuous flood of emigration into the country. The cost of construction would not be greater than estimated in 1875. They had excited in England a wide-spread desire to settle in Canada. The road would not cost Canadians one cent, and the fever created was such that Mr. Thomas Brassey had concluded to buy 64,000 acres under the shadow of the Rocky Mountains. There were great difficulties to contend with, as he found everywhere the Hon. Mr. Blake's speech; but the contract was arranged and would go on whether Parliament met in November or February. Sir A. T. Galt also briefly replied. The party went on to Ottawa.

In an interview with Simeon McIntyre, one of the Canadian Pacific Syndicate who had just returned from England, he stated that there were no Americans in Syndicate. He said it was part of the plan to build the whole road, and that Sir John Macdonald refused English reporters information on the subject until the matter was laid before Parliament. A large number of capitalists interested in the project are here. Alexander McEwen, the London financier, has gone to Quebec.

It was stated on the street to-day that Parliament would not meet until November. A Cabinet meeting has been called for to-morrow afternoon in Ottawa.

## AFGHANISTAN.

CANDAHAR, Sept. 27.

Gen. Phayre has been ordered to increase his force to 10,000 men, which points to the probability of the garrison remaining here a few months.

CALCUTTA, Sept. 27.

All fear regarding the crops is dispelled in most parts of India.

SIMLA, Sept. 27.

The Amier of Afghanistan intends visiting India as soon as possible. All quiet in Cabul.

CALCUTTA, Sept. 27.

Reports from Mandalay are that the Queen, mother and daughter have been accused of intriguing with court officials and that thirty arrests have been made. It is rumored that executions within the Palace is recommended.

## EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Sept. 27.

Steamer Ganopus went ashore in a dense fog. She was going at full speed when she struck, and it being high water she ran high on Rocky beach and remained fast. A boat from shore went to her assistance. It having been ascertained that the ship was not leaking telegrams were sent to Greenock for tugs. Men from the shore assisted to lighten her. Three hundred and fifty tons of her cargo were thrown overboard. Passengers remained on board. Should weather continue fine steamer will probably get afloat.

RAGUSA, Sept. 27.

The Montenegrins are 7,000 strong, while Albanians have 6,000 men and three field batteries. Ten Turkish battalions under Riza Pasha are near Dulcigno. It is just made known that the fleet will not start till Wednesday.

GRAVOSA, Sept. 21.

The Prince of Montenegro in an interview with Admiral Seymour expressed the strongest conviction that his troops could take Dulcigno unaided. The answer of Riza Pasha to Admiral Seymour's ultimatum was most emphatic. Riza Pasha said that his orders were to protect integrity of Ottoman territory. He would fire on any force Montenegrin or otherwise. Admiral Seymour informed Prince Nikta of Montenegro that he had received a telegram from British Ambassador at Constantinople saying that the affair was now in the hands of the British Admiral and Prince of Montenegro. At second conference Prince Nikta assured Admiral Seymour that his troops were ready to march to Dulcigno immediately. It has been arranged that no shot will be fired from the fleet near the town of Dulcigno but fire will be opened on Mazura and other fortified positions. Montenegrins have six guns.

RAGUSA, Sept. 27.

The squadron which is to actually take part in the demonstration will be divided into three columns. The first will be formed of English and Italian ships, the second of Austrian and French ships, and the third of Russian and German ships.

LONDON, Sept. 27.

A despatch from Berlin says that Montenegro has asked for a postponement of action against Dulcigno beyond Wednesday in order that she may complete her armaments.

GLASGOW, Sept. 27.

A despatch states that constables are stationed in and around the yacht Livadia, belonging to the Russian Czar, owing to

reports that Nihilists had been sent from the continent to blow her up.

LONDON, Sept. 27.

Information of a plot to blow up the yacht Livadia was received to-day from the authorities at St. Petersburg and afterwards from the police officials of Geneva. According to these advices the Nihilists had deputed emissaries to blow up the Livadia, and three individuals left London a few days ago for Glasgow with two nitro-glycerine clocks to be placed among the coals, which would explode at a certain time. The coals on the yacht are now being removed for examination, and divers are examining the vessels bottom.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.

A Dublin despatch gives the following particulars of the assassination of Lord Mount Morris. He was murdered on Saturday night at Rusheen, within a mile of Clonburn, County Galway. The scene was the neck of land between Lough Mask and Lough Carrib. He was seen to leave town about eight o'clock. Half an hour later his horse and carriage arrived home without him. Search was made. He was found lying at the side of the road in a pool of blood, lifeless. Police at once were sent for and the body was conveyed to Ebor Hall, the family seat. Mount Morris received one bullet in the head, penetrating the skull, three in the neck and two in the body, any one sufficient to cause death. He was little known, except in his own neighborhood and throughout Mayo and Galway. He had small estates, which he farmed to some extent. He had fifteen tenants, with whom he had most unhappy relations. Quite recently he obtained ejection decrees against two of them. As a magistrate he was unpopular, and at a meeting of Justices, which he had been attending, a resolution was passed calling upon the Government to adopt coercive measures.

LONDON, Sept. 27.

At a meeting of Accerington strikers the committee resolved by 39 to 5 to abandon proposed strike for the present.

LONDON, Sept. 27.

At a land meeting near the spot where Lord Mount Morris was murdered, the speakers disclaimed any connection of land league with murderers.

## UNITED STATES.

SARATOGA, Sept. 27.

A convention of Irish Republicans of the State of New York was held to-day, and adopted an address to the people in behalf of Garfield and Arthur.

GALVESTON, TEX., Sept. 27.

At Jacksboro this morning immense swarms of grasshoppers appeared, coming from the North. A farm near there was completely devastated, the cotton stalks being devoured.

A negro man was murdered near Tyler to-day by two negro women, who beat him to death with clubs, horribly mutilating his body. The man had boasted he was the father of a child of one of them. They cut his ears off.
