Expropriation Proceedings Are Frequently Abused

In a sense it might be considered that the ownership of land is a special privilege even though such ownership in no way makes a person superior to one who does not. However, it is probable that the people whose own land are in many cases jealous of their rights and have had on many occasions been put to the necessity of protecting themselves against invasion of their rights.
Farmers as a class own more land than any other group and for this reason have been the most exposed class to attempts to deprive them of their rights. Many of the laws relating to the ownership and expropriation of land have been devised by people who do not own any, in many cases they were more interested in fine clothes, soft living and good entertainment matters which are not usually associated with farm land. The good farmer or those who try to be a place a very high value on their land. It is in effect their bread and butter, they try to improve it, to increase its fertility, to rid it of weeds, of beautify it and make it produce more and more. In practically every part of the civilized world governments crown corporations and groups such as hospitals and university boards have acquired the right to seize land and in some cases without even notifying the owner. In the province of Ontario these powers were so abused by hospitals, universities and con-

servations authorities that they have been divested of expropriation rights.
The change in the law now places the authority to seize private land in either the crown or where public necessity is shown in the courts. In that province there is an estimated 4,000 people who can sign a piece of paper which parts a farmer from his land. This power is absolute. The piece of paper does not come before a minister for approval, nor does the landowner get a chance of a hearing in the matter.
Our readers will, we suspect, agree that this is pretty high handed business and only happens in a place where government is so big that it operates in an impersonal manner. Surely the like of this would never take place in a small province like

Prince Edward Island where consideration of such matters can very quickly be arranged.
LAND GRABBERS
Nevertheless the Department of Highways in this province can certainly qualify with the best of land grabbers to say nothing of the most discourteous anywhere. Land is surveyed, stakes are driven in the crops and machinery moves in to destroy the land without the owner even being told that the land is being taken. No opportunity is given the owner to discuss the matter and there is no regular authority to which he can appeal.
The farmer who knows a great deal about land is forced to state his case to people who know very little about it and may even have a profound contempt both for it and its owner. The eng-

neer may be a wizard with slide-rule and level and be prepared to bend the earth to his book-based theories of engineering.
We must, of course, admit that there will certainly always be cases of proven necessity where in the interest of public good land must be seized but this does not preclude the owner being given the opportunity of discussing the matter and of being officially advised as to what compensation if any, he may expect and of having the right to the judgement of an impartial person or committee.

The writer has recently had the experience of seeing land invaded and destroyed for productive purposes land which this year produced 600 bales of hay, true the foreman of the construction company did co-operate in providing an opportunity that this year's hay crop be salvaged but no public official concerned himself in the matter and the only information received by word of mouth was to the effect that crop compensation for hay is at the rate of \$15.00 per acre which in the present case would be about one-third of the value of the crop.

TOO MUCH FREEDOM
Generally because of the public great interest in good roads there has been far too much freedom given highway officials in the matter of entering upon land.

What appears to be needed are processes which will require the land grabbers to give public notice of intention to enter upon the land whether for survey purposes, or construction or for expropriation. Due notice having been given then there should be procedures which will afford the owner the opportunity of dealing with responsible officials on such questions as need, value and compensation.

FARM SAFETY WEEK
The Canadian farming community will join with the rest of the continent between July 24 and 30 to participate in Farm Safety Week, according to the National Safety League of Canada. The Canadian Highway Safety Council will concurrently promote safety on rural roads and emphasize safe procedures for drivers of farm vehicles on public thoroughfares.

Leading cause of death on Canadian farms, according to the League, has been machinery, and prominent in this category is the tractor. However, the home, chicken, construction and vehicles play important roles in the drama of death and suffering on the farm. Gay McLaren, general manager of NSL has issued a plea to the farming community to make Farm Safety Week a time to assess the dangers on the farm and plan to avoid or eliminate them. The League urged all organizations such as 4-H Clubs, agricultural societies and associations

and safety councils to concentrate on farm safety during the July campaign so the safety of the rural community of Canada may benefit through the year.

DOCTORS FOR SAIGON
LONDON AP—Britain is sending a medical team of four doctors and six nurses to work in a children's hospital in Saigon. The ministry of overseas development announced Wednesday that the project is being undertaken at the request of the South Vietnamese government for technical assistance. The program is expected to run for five years.
