

Local and Other Items.

Gold has been discovered near Annapolis, N. S. GALBRAITH'S BAND at the Roller Rink to-night. GREEN grapes just received at Beer & Goff's, sept 20 21. SMALL POX has broken out at Ilerville, Quebec. THE St. Stephen Enterprise has suspended publication, and its editor has gone into the grocery business. It is now denied that Prince Alexander sent a telegram to the Czar announcing his intention to abdicate. LAST week a seven-year old daughter of Mrs. Beef, of Howe Island, Ont., fell into a can of milk and was drowned. LET none forget the union temperance meeting this evening at the Y. M. C. A. Hall, to be addressed by Capt. Sturdivant and others. A DEPARTATION of Ottawa Catholics waited on Archbishop Duhamel on Friday last, and presented him with a splendid carriage and set of harness. FOR the year ended June 30th, 1886, 73,534 tons of grain passed through the Halifax elevator. During the year ended June 30th, 1885, 91,370 tons of grain passed through. A JOINT stock company has been formed in France with a capital of one million francs, for the purpose of engaging in the canning of lobsters upon the coast of Newfoundland. A CRUSADE against baby carriages is being prosecuted by an English medical man, who attributes much of the infant mortality from diseases of the brain and lungs to exposure in carriages. SENATOR HOWLAND returned from Cape Traverse on Saturday evening, bringing with him samples of the bogies obtained in the bottom of the Strait. The samples will be shown at the Provincial Exhibition. THE official statements of the Government Savings Banks show that at the end of the fiscal year the deposits amounted to \$20,014,457, an increase over the amount on deposit on 30th June, 1885, of \$2,125,922. Several schooners filled at Bras d'Or and Red Bay by a single cast of the seine. The fish are of a superior quality. The cod fishing on the other hand is poor. An action for \$10,000 damages has been entered in the Montreal Supreme Court by Hon. Thos. White against J. P. Whelan, on account of an article published in the Post, some time ago, and alleged to contain libellous statements. A PECULIAR worm is preying upon the potato crop in some sections of Nova Scotia. The worm is fully half an inch long, and exists in great numbers. They bore into the potato and eat out all the substance, leaving nothing but the outer covering. MR. R. ST. G. RICHARDSON, the colored student who graduated at the Fredericton University last June, has received a lucrative position in Chatham, Ont., where he has been appointed Principal of the Wilberforce school at a salary of \$1,400 a year. FARMERS in the vicinity of River Desert, the Peche and North Wakefield, in the Gattineau District, Ont., have been much troubled of late by bears, which are said to infest the entire district. One farmer in North Wakefield has lost 30 sheep by them. The cause of the animals appearing in such numbers is not known. News received at St. John's, Nfld., from Belle Isle indicates that a large ocean steamer has probably been wrecked or has had her decks struck in a heavy gale. Much wreckage has been washed ashore in the straits. It consists of cabins, doors and bedding, spars and other material. A number of dead cattle have also been thrown up by the sea, but nothing has yet been found by which to discover the identity of the wrecked vessel. THE Canadian Gazette mentions that Hon. David McLellan, provincial secretary for New Brunswick, is now in Great Britain to purchase horses for improving stock. It says he has already visited Yorkshire and Derbyshire, and is now in Scotland, and will subsequently leave for France with a view to purchasing a stud of thoroughbred horses. He will endeavor to obtain Percherons, Clydesdales, as well as heavy carriage horses. Of these classes Mr. McLellan will purchase from twenty to thirty, and he hopes to have them landed in New Brunswick towards the end of October. A JOINT MEETING of the Temperance and Town Council committees of Moncton, N. B., was held in the Y. M. C. A. Rooms at that place on Friday evening last, for the purpose of considering the best method of enforcing the Scott Act. After considerable discussion a resolution was passed requesting the Town Council to instruct Marshal Thibodeau to take immediate action against all violators of the Act. An indemnification fund was also started, and the sum of \$450 subscribed, Mayor Duffy heading the list with \$100. The Monctonians are evidently determined to have the law enforced. A CHILD who had been sick with typhus fever at Asburygrave, Hamilton, Ont., died some days ago. He was supposed, and was laid out for burial. A few hours afterward a relative thought she saw signs of life, and called the attention of others to it. The grave clothes were taken off, and the child put into its bed once more and revived. The following day the child was twice given up for dead, and revived each time. A doctor was summoned, and at last accounts the child was doing well and considered out of danger. Two Ottawa real estate agents are charged with having administered drugs to certain property holders with the view of inducing them to sign papers authorizing the agents to transact business for them. At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, this forenoon, the truckman charged with overloading his horse, was fined five cents without costs. Two drunks were disposed of for \$800 and \$4, each. Two men for having "digstys on their premises were also attended to. TYPHOID FEVERS prevails in the town to an unprecedented extent; and we learn that the Board of Health are about to take steps to ascertain the cause. This they will probably find in impure water, filthy yards, want of drainage, the free use of alcoholic liquors, etc. THE Freeman's Journal urges the citizens of Dublin to refrain from all manifestations of welcome to the Marquis of Londonderry, when he arrives in Dublin to assume the office of lord lieutenant. "He bears Castlereagh's hated name," says the Journal, and it adds: "Let the troops parade; that represents eviction and coercion, and a cheer from a single citizen would be a great humiliation." EARTHQUAKE stories still come in, principally from Georgia. One of the latest is about William Wilow Gunn, who, as soon as she recognized the earthquake, seized a big tin horn and blew a long and mighty blast. She did it, she said, to astonish the natives, and was entirely successful, for more than one was certain that the day of judgement had come and that Gabriel was blowing his horn. THE STORM!

Some of its Effects.

ASHORE AND WRECKED.

NO LIVES LOST.

SOUSIS, Sept. 20. The storm of last night and this morning was very severe here. The sea ran exceedingly high, and the strength of the breaker-water was tested to its utmost. In the height of the storm two schooners went ashore. Their names are the Mary Joseph, owned by Capt. McCarthy, of this place, and the Col. J. H. French, Captain Harris. The Col. J. H. French is a large two-topmaster, and is likely to be a total wreck. Her crew were saved with great difficulty, and the captain was the last man to leave the wreck. The schooner Alice, of Wellfleet, Mass., lost her seine boat and seine. The schooner C. M. Adams had her sails badly tattered. The schooner Fanny Young lost her flying jibboom and her seine boat. Four other schooners are said to be ashore between this place and East Point. About fifty sail are safely anchored here. KENSINGTON, Sept. 20. The schooners Ellen W. Sawyer and Eliza A. Thomas, both of Portland, Me., while attempting to beat into Malpeque Harbor on Saturday night, the 18th inst., about nine o'clock, collided off Cape Aylesbury, Darnley Point. The damage sustained by each was so great that in order to save themselves from sinking where the collision took place they were obliged to run for the shore. Both are now lying east of Darnley Point full of water. They had between them about four hundred barrels of mackerel. Efforts are being made to save the riggings and cargoes, but it is thought that both vessels will be total wrecks. They are both splendid schooners—over one hundred tons each—and one is almost new. The crews of both were saved. The schooner Nesketia, of Lockport, N. S., while endeavoring to make Malpeque on Sunday night, went on the bar and will likely be a total wreck. There is a heavy gale blowing and it is almost impossible to board the schooners.

THE RING.

A Rough and Tumble Fight.

ALLEGHANY CITY, Sept. 19. The Sullivan-Heard fight last night drew an immense crowd. In the first round Sullivan made one of his famous rushes. After a minute's fighting the men clinched and fought desperately, being finally separated by the attendants. Heard did not look much worse for the rough treatment. In the second round Heard was the attacking party. He tried to get at Sullivan's face, but fell short. In an instant he was in the embrace of his antagonist, who pounded him with all his force until Heard slipped away and gave Sullivan a drive under the eye, that was the only clear blow he got in on the champion. Then he gathered himself and with an upper cut sent Heard flat on his back. The fight had now become mere rough and tumble. Heard slipped and fell when the police separated the men. Referee Newell announced that Sullivan was winner; and though entreated to revoke his decision, Newell insisted on giving the fight to the champion.

YACHTING.

Result of Saturday's Race.

NEWPORT, R. I., Sept. 19. Yachts men are all disgusted with Saturday's race. The result of Saturday's drift is as yet unknown. Commodore Gerry says the following is the order the big sloops passed Brenton's Reef Lightship: Galatea, 10.52.30, Mayflower, 10.52.40. It would seem from this that the Galatea finished before the Mayflower but such was not the case.—The Mayflower passed the lightship one length ahead of the Galatea, and the discrepancy was in the time of the watches used on the different yachts. It is impossible to state whether the race will be given to the Mayflower or the Galatea, though the fact that the Mayflower finished a length ahead and was handicapped beside would seem to leave no question.

THE "ADAMS CASE."

Reporters to the Front.

HALIFAX, Sept. 20. The reporters have engaged Professor Russell to watch their interests in the Adams case. At the court on Saturday, Russell—twitted Meagher unmercifully about the unheard of request made by counsel to have his own witnesses excluded from the court, and that he was resorting to a trick, as subpoenas were for the 30th while the argument is set down for the 28th. The press men were reinforced on Saturday morning by others who had not been subpoenaed. As soon as the court opened Saturday, Meagher demanded the exclusion of the subpoenaed reporters, when Russell told the commissioner he had no authority to make an order for the exclusion of any person. Mr. Graham refused to assent to an adjournment of the case which Meagher moved for, and Meagher said there was nothing for him to do but retire from the court. MORE BLOODY RIOTING.

FATAL RESULTS.

BELFAST, Sept. 19. There was desperate rioting to-day. There were only four constables within the barracks when the mob attacked the building, smashing windows with stones. The constables within fired eleven rounds, killing one man and wounding several others. A woman who was wounded has since died.

A Lamented Death.

HALIFAX, Sept. 19. Herbert Bayne, P. L. D., Professor of Chemistry and German at the Royal Military College, Kingston, died at Pictou on Saturday. His demise at the early age of forty is regretted by all, as he had just begun to make experiments that were winning for him a reputation in scientific circles.

Riots at Liverpool.

LIVERPOOL, Sept. 19. Two serious riots occurred here to-day. One resulted from an encounter between Orangemen and Nationalists; the other originated in speeches made at a Socialist meeting.

Movements of the Cruisers.

Writing from Paspheiac, Bay Chaleur, on the 16th inst., Commander Smetzer, of the fisheries cruiser F. E. Conard, says: This is our last visit to this port this season, we having been ordered to the north and east of P. E. Island and Cape Breton, to assist the cruisers there, as by late reports the American fleet have all moved in that direction and consequently the presence of all the cruisers is required to keep them from violating the laws relating to our fishing grounds. The new steam cruiser Acadia arrived here a few days ago and sailed again for Pictou. I had the pleasure of being shown through her by Capt. Scott. Her purchase by the government shows their good judgment in this as well as in other matters, for, in my opinion, she is all that can be desired for the purpose for which she is intended; as with her high rate of speed she is capable of keeping the north side of P. E. I. (the principal coast in our waters which vessels in search of mackerel frequent) clear of all poachers twice a day in ordinary weather, as she can run the entire distance back and forth during that time. Thus, it will be readily understood how efficient she will prove in keeping off American fishermen who, it appears, are always ready to trespass on our waters when and where opportunities offer.
