

# Rangers shut out Bruins; Maple Leafs Defeat Habs

**BOSTON (AP)**—New York Rangers handed Boston its fifth straight National Hockey League setback Thursday night, blanking the Bruins 3-0 on the opening play of Goalsie Gene (Gump) Whaley.

Red Sullivan scored two goals for Rangers, getting the only marker of the first period and closing out the second period by keeping a Boston pass in the third. Andy Balgaitz scored the first goal.

It marked the first time in 47 games Bruins had been blanked on one of their last shots in the game, also in the hands of the Rangers in March, 1957.

Whaley was sensational in the second half when he turned in 13 saves. He made eight saves, several of them on tough shots from close up, in the second period but was called upon to stop only four shots in the final period as his team's defense held firm against the disgruntled home crowd.

# Horses' Names Not Changed

**TORONTO (CP)**—The Supreme Court of Ontario has ruled against changing the names of racing horses which allegedly lapsed from the ownership of six racing circles.

The ruling was made when Orpen Rabl Mouth, who owned Orpen, owned Long Branch track, he and Morrissey argued over whether his assigned Morrissey's name should be changed to Orpen's name.

"The commission can't decide what is in the interests of good taste."
